Volunteers for the School of the Blind



The volunteers for School of the Blind is a student group that dedicates their Saturday mornings to teaching English to students at the Delhi Blind School. Aiming to improve children’s conversational English, the AES students engage them in discussions in either a group or one-on-one on topics varying from describing a seasonal holiday to sharing dreams and aspirations.

Eco Club

Eco Club at AES focuses on single use plastic use on AES campus. Students conduct surveys, advocate for change and aim for the possible removal of single use plastics on campus. Students participate in various ways such as creating announcement posters, videos, interacting with administration and on campus facilities to minimize plastic use at major AES events as well as daily school life.



Hope Foundation



The Hope Club consists of a group of students who hope to encourage the creativity of children in challenging situations and raise awareness of these lives within the AES community. Working alongside the Hope Foundation, we visit the Tigri School once a month to do just this. Volunteers also plan for activities such as the Month of Hope.

Make a Difference

MAD’s main focus is to teach English to students from the Vivekanand slum. 2 days a week, volunteers teach, support, and engage with students in eight different grade-like levels as they strive towards a college education. Through the recently developed Access to Education Scholarship, over 10 students have been fully funded and enrolled for a college education, and with the help of AES students this number is set to increase.

Reach Out



Reach Out promotes interaction between high school students and disadvantaged youth living in Vivekanand. arranging for health care for the mothers and their children through a concerned physician. Reach Out meets weekly in 13 different stations - from art to hygiene.

Recycling Club

Recycling Club is a student-run organization of student volunteers. It’s main focus is to do with recycling papers and volunteers meet every week to collect and sort the papers from all the AES campus. The club redistributes the single-sided papers for reuse in classes, and sells the non-reusable for donation to local NGOs. Some organizations Recycling Club has worked with and are working with are Chintan and Mobile Creches.

Roots and Shoots

Roots and Shoots is a program that promotes and advocates for an environmentally conscious school community. Through cleaning up the Delhi Ridge, planting trees, and organizing various projects throughout the year, Roots and Shoots spreads advocacy in the AES community and beyond, specifically for programs such as Clean Yamuna and promotion of water conservation.

Scrubs Club



Scrubs club envisions a Delhi where everyone has access to proper health care regardless of their socio-economic status. Scrubs is involved with various community service activities ranging from helping at the first aid station during school activities and beyond. Furthermore, volunteers receive training in skills such as First Aid, CPR, and giving sutures and shots. Volunteers organize monthly medical camps for underprivileged girls at Kasturba Gandhi Girls School and

other local hospitals, and the group also organizes donation drives.

Tamana



Tamana works with around 15 students from the Tamana Special Needs School in Vasant Vihar, and focuses on building relationships with the Tamana community. Working on also developing students' fine motor skills, volunteers play team sports such as Basketball, Cricket, and Soccer. Overall, the club is uniquely positioned to promote sports coaching, community service and leadership skills.

Teach India

The Teach India after school program is designed to provide one-on-one tutoring services to students from poor areas that need support in their learning at their respective schools. The activities include computer-training , arts and crafts, public speaking and English reading and writing.
