
SPORT

FOOD TECHNOLOGY



MATHEMATICS






A message from our Chaplain

Where is hope?

This week we've seen lockdown restrictions starting to be relaxed in some nations - hope for our return to some sense of freedom and normality. But as I write this morning (Friday 1st), there are some news stories about possible second waves beginning to appear in those European countries that thought they might be past the worst. Whatever our faith, we are called to be a people of hope, yet even for those of faith, there are many times when our hopes are tested.

As the Christian community recently marked Lent, members of the Islamic community find themselves now in the month of Ramadan. Both times of deep reflection and prayer in which hope and certainty might be tested and faith deepened. My Muslim friends talk of the great challenge of keeping the fast when normal life continues. For those members of our school community, who by the end of



Ramadan would normally be in the midst of the exam season, it will be an extra challenge to keep focussed and full of hope when the pangs of hunger bite, for whilst many exams might not take place, work will still need to be completed and deadlines met - the shared lftar will be all the more joyous when the time is passed; something to hope for when the work is done.

In the Fenham community, we see a great deal of hope in challenging circumstances; from hope generated by our school communities that are doing their best to nurture the future to the hope seen in small acts of love like the donations to our foodbanks and care homes. But this hope can often feel tainted by the other side of the story, the story of loss of all sorts of things, and of course the tragic loss of friends and family, if not in our personal community, then from within the wider community.

Christian hope is founded in that great Easter resurrection promise. This week, the Archbishop of Canterbury shared a short message with schools in which he spoke a little more about where he finds hope in the darkest of times. If you would like to watch the video, please click here.

As this week ends, and we look towards the next, I encourage you to find time to reflect and remember the moments of hope in the week that has passed and in the challenging moments. As you reflect, here's a modern paraphrase of the **Beatitudes for a Global Pandemic**.
