Dear Suffield Community & Town Employees,

To date, the Health Department confirmed 92 COVID-19 cases and 17 related deaths in Suffield. For context, cases for nearby towns follows:

We will continue to update the <u>Emergency Alert</u> website page and <u>Town Facebook</u> with new figures as available.

Though numbers are still growing in Suffield and our focus remains undeterred, efforts now include planning for the next phases - reopening and recovery of our town. This undertaking involves a collaborative approach with the State of Connecticut, the North Central District Health Department and neighboring communities as our boundaries and activities directly impact one another.

The Town's tasks also entail the creation of long-term recovery committees to both identify unmet needs and determine ways to fill them. All of us can play a part – please let us know about anybody needing a helping hand.

#### **Public Safety - Wearing Face Masks in Public**

As a reminder, Governor Lamont's Executive Order 7BB requires the use of masks or cloth face-coverings in public. Our friends at Highland Park Market, who have gone above and beyond the call of duty to keep our pantries full and families fed, ask residents to please use masks while shopping at Highland Park for the safety of each other and their valued employees.

#### Tax Deferment Offered to Suffield Residents Affected by COVID-19

On April 22, 2020, the Board of Selectmen adopted the Governor's Tax Deferment program to provide relief to taxpayers during the COVID-19 crisis. The program, created by Governor Lamont's Executive Order 7s, provides a three-month grace period to those taxpayers adversely affected by the pandemic. Typically, this grace period runs from July 1 until August 1, but the Tax Deferment allows qualifying taxpayers to extend the grace period until October 1, 2020 without interest or penalties. Water Pollution Control Authority fees can be deferred under the program as well.

To qualify, taxpayers must apply by *filing a form with the Tax Collector prior to July 1, 2020*. The form, issued by the CT Office of Policy and Management, follows:

#### Suffield Community Aid COVID-19 Crisis Relief Fund

The State of Massachusetts reports a 20% unemployment rate with the State of CT approaching these numbers. We know some of those unemployed or underemployed are Suffield residents with the CT Department of Labor currently noting 528 residents (<u>unemployment claims</u> from March 15 - April 12, 2020). We expect those numbers to increase as the data is updated.

In collaboration with Suffield Community Aid, the Town's social services provider, we have formed a COVID-19 Crisis Relief Fund.

Objective: To help preserve the financial well-being & dignity of all residents impacted by the recent pandemic. Serving as a safety net, this special fund will target assistance to those individuals and families who do not qualify for other need-based programs and services.

#### Considerations:

- Aid will focus on "bridging-the-gap" for residents who were financially on track before the crisis, but are now struggling as a result of pending return to their job commitments or due to an interruption of consistent income.
- Eligibility for monetary assistance will take into consideration that the help given is both practical and impactful in preserving their economic well-being.

Any funds, not used specifically for Covid-19 relief, will be earmarked for purposes of alleviating hardships caused by other catastrophic life-changing events for the benefit of Suffield residents.

#### **2020-21 Budget**

This week, the Town Boards (BOS, Board of Education and Board of Finance) completed their budget process for fiscal year 2020/21. Mindful of COVID-19's financial impact on our residents, we are proposing a conservative budget containing a slightly reduced mill rate from last fiscal year.

## • **Budget Adoption Meeting** Thursday, May 21, 2020 at 7 p.m.

As discussed at the April 22, 2020 BOS Meeting, we hoped to hold a drive-thru Town Meeting similar to one hosted earlier this week in Vernon, CT. This innovative approach would uphold the democratic process and ensure that all residents have the opportunity to vote on the FY 20/21 budget. However, we received word today from the CT Conference of Municipalities and the CT Council of Small Towns that the Governor's office intends to clarify Executive Order 7I as MANDATORY. The Order requires the town's legislative body (or the BOS where the legislative body is the Town Meeting) to authorize its budget-making authority (the BOF) to adopt the municipal budget and set the mill rate. The Governor's position reflects his belief that holding in-person town meetings poses a serious risk to public health during COVID-19. Given that direction, a joint virtual meeting will be held on Thursday, May 21, 2020 at 7 p.m. for the BOS to authorize the BOF to approve the FY 20/21 budget and set the mill rate.

Budget information will be available on the Town and BOE websites early next week. As public involvement is still key to the process, we encourage residents to review the budget, submit any questions to <a href="www.budget2021@suffieldct.gov">www.budget2021@suffieldct.gov</a> prior to the Public Hearing, and participate in the call.

#### <u>Presidential Primaries – August 12, 2020</u>

A double primary is scheduled for August 11, 2020. Please note the following important voter information:

May 11<sup>th</sup> is the last day that an enrolled elector can transfer from one political party to another and be eligible to vote in the August 11 primary of their new party. There is a three-month waiting period, when switching from one political party to another, before attaining voting privileges in the new political party.

**Seventeen-year-olds can vote in a primary if** (1) turning 18 before November 4th, (2) a U.S. citizen, (3) a bona fide resident of Suffield, (4) pre-registered to vote and (5) enrolled in the political party holding the primary.

#### Parks & Recreation Late Spring & Summer Update

For the past month, Parks & Recreation offered well-received free virtual activities via social media which included physical activities for kids and adults, field trips to parks and museums, as well as other fun points of interest. Spring programs that were unable to be rescheduled or that registrants chose not to attend, will receive full credits applied to P&R accounts to be available for use through July 2021.

P&R remains cautiously optimistic regarding summer programs and facility openings but continues to plan for more in-depth virtual options including virtual camps. The timeline for the potential virtual camps reflects an earlier launch than usual with the start date slated to immediately follow the end of the school year. A "Camp in a Box" concept includes virtual content, craft supplies ready to go, live feedback, and guest speakers. If P&R is able to offer physical programming this summer, a virtual option will still be offered for those unable or who do not want to attend a traditional camp setting.

P&R, Kent Memorial Library, the Senior Center, and Youth Services are also collaborating on a

"Speaker Series" via Zoom. This will bring in speakers on a variety of topics from: travel, cooking, outdoors, sports, and other areas of interest. Some of these will be interactive, round-tables, and others will be a traditional presentation.
