Each day we are taking stock of our lives; thinking hard about what is important and why. The coronavirus pandemic has made all of us more acutely aware than ever that meaning in our lives is vitally important.

Naturally, at times, we have all felt that our life lacks meaning, whilst at the same time, looking with envious eyes at someone who “has it all” and leads, what on the face of it is, a wonderfully meaningful life. It is, perhaps, the biggest challenge for any school – to ensure that all our students lead what is for them a meaningful life.

In using the term meaningful, we suggests a kind of depth, a sense of purpose and a sense of fulfilment. None of us want our children to lead lives which are empty and devoid of meaning; lives which are boring, difficult and futile.

We can sometimes associate the word good with meaningful – a good life is one which is full of meaningful activities and actions. But do we actually know what constitutes a life which is meaningful? Indeed do our students know what is going to be meaningful to them in their lives?

Crisis such as the one we are all experiencing affords us the opportunity to reflect. In pursuing a meaningful life we want our students to find something they love doing, be involved with things that they really care about and which give them a huge amount of joy. We know that “going after” their passion is essential because in doing so it will give them happiness: they will be fulfilled. But is this sufficient? Is the point of fulfilment nothing more than finding an activity, any activity, that one enjoys and then to make every attempt to pursue that? Or is it possible that some activities are more worthy than others? Fulfilment might be achieved, but should we care about the sorts of things that may give rise to that fulfilment?

I personally think that there is more to be said; that something larger than oneself should be at the heart of our pursuits. I suspect that we, as parents, all want our children to be involved in something greater than themselves, something other than themselves. At SWPS in all our discussions about kindness, values and generosity we urge our students to rise above their needs and desires – desires and needs that potentially serve themselves.

I believe that every SWPS student will make a positive and greater contribution to the world – in short leave the world a better place than the one they entered. It is our task to facilitate that – huge task yes and possibly too much. Yet, education is undoubtedly the place to start; by ensuring that those values of integrity, commitment and kindness are part and parcel of the daily activities of our students at SWPS, we shall set firm foundations for them to pursue a meaningful life.
