Improved Learning Through **Cleaner Air**

Studies by the Danish Technological University (DTU) demonstrate a clear connection between air quality and air temperature and the performance of students. This has led to a greater focus on so-called "fresh air learning", where students are taken out of the classroom and into the countryside to provide a better learning environment for students. Even though Gibraltar's small size may prevent our school from doing this, it did make the British Lung Foundation's talk on air quality all the more relevant.

Ms Cook presented us with some of the campaigning that BLF does to put pressure on corporations and authorities to act upon the issue of air quality and also brought to our attention the dangers of breathing in bad air. As a result, we were left with an air quality monitor to install around the school. After weeks of staying in the same position, the monitor will be sent back to BLF and will be tested for nitrogen dioxide, a toxic chemical which has been linked to stunted lung growth, and 36,000 premature deaths each year in the UK. Hopefully the installation of this air quality monitor will be the start of a mission by Prior Park School to improve learning through cleaner air quality, despite the lack of countryside on the rock.





The British Lung Foundation (BLF) is a London-based charity founded in 1984. Their aim is to research various lung conditions and offer support to those who are currently suffering from a lung condition. They also campaign for cleaner air for all, and that's what brought BLF's Director of External Affairs Alison Cook, to Prior Park School in October. Since the opening of Prior Park School Gibraltar in September 2016, we have made the community a huge priority for us, through our Prior Passport co-curricular programme, the regular charity events held in the school and our school


Prior Park School Gibraltar offers an extensive assortment of school subjects and co-curricular activities to its students. These are lead and taught by intelligent and enthusiastic teachers from a variety of nationalities. The co-curricular sessions are set within three groups; sports & physical activities, creative activities plus leadership & community outreach. Students are taught the importance of participating in hobbies and interests outside of school, and with the offer of taking part in less common activities such as water polo and sailing, the school encourages looking outside of the box to find something you could be interested in.

Furthermore, we sent a survey out to students in the school involving questions about the academic subjects and co-curricular activities to find out which areas students enjoy the most.

Two popular school subjects were geography and maths. A number of students had said they are both very enjoyable and interesting subjects, in addition to maths being relevant across many other subjects. One student quoted, "geography is my favourite subject as we get taught with a lot of passion and everything is explained to the point which we understand thoroughly." This highlights the way in which a subject is taught can influence how enjoyable and understandable it is. Another student stated, "maths and geography are my favourite subjects as I find them fun to learn about and understand them the most. Also, I feel that Mr Lozano's and Mr Martyn's way of teaching is organised and structured." Finally, another student said, "Maths is my favourite subject because as well as having good teachers, I find that maths in particular educates a healthy and analytical train of thought."

The most common 'favourite co-curricular activity' was Duke of Edinburgh. Many students had voted for this, explaining why they enjoyed it so much with one student describing that, "Duke of Edinburgh teaches you important life skills and gives you the opportunity to go on an adventurous journey." Another stated that, "It gets you involved in a wide variety of extra activities outside of school." This demonstrates how taking part in one activity can lead to discovering a love for another.

An honourable mention from the co-curricular results was from a student who passionately described why tennis is so important and valuable to her; "Tennis is my favourite because I love sports and tennis helps me deal with physical, mental, social, and emotional challenges, which increases my capacity to deal with stress. Tennis is a sport that is based on evaluating angles, geometry and physics to get the best result, which translates into better problem solving off the court."

Many adaptations have been made since the school was established and has now been expanded upon. We have many more students, more staff and even more classrooms.

As the number of students increased more classrooms needed to be made as the school could not hold many more students. So, the solution was to build walls between the larger classrooms to split them in two, creating more space for the new students. Recently, our Anti-Bullying Team were lucky enough to work with Voice of the Young People (VYP). We planned and ran a school assembly together on bullying, with a special focus on VYP's Anti-Bullying campaign this year: Acts of Random Kindness (ARK).

The ARKs include: 'ring your grandparents for a chat', 'make happiness bookmarks and hide them in the library', or 'give someone your time'. VYP have now 'passed on the baton' to us; let's see how many Acts of Random Kindness our pupils can do over the coming weeks!

A massive thank you to VYP for giving up their time to come in and encourage us to be kind and considerate to one another.

The team is currently in the process of handing out surveys to a few students from each year to find out how much of a problem bullying is. On the survey there are questions about the inclusiveness of the school and hurtful banter between the students. There is also a survey which has been given out to new students with similar questions but are more focused on how welcoming the school has been. Through the answers from the surveys the team will then take appropriate action to address any issues raised and reduce the amount of hurtful words used in day-to-day conversation.

In the future, Mr Younge hopes that the Anti-Bullying Team will become successful amongst students, with reducing the mean words used in jokes and when speaking to each other. He also hopes that the team will eventually be completely student-led and run.

Teacher Talk

A regular feature of this magazine will be Teacher Talk, when we interview certain members of the teaching staff around Prior Park School and get a glimpse into their lives. In this first issue we speak to Ms Easter (ME), Mr Lozano (HL), Ms Owen (RO) and Mr Kennedy (AK) and ask them to give us a different perspective of life at school.

Q - What subjects do you teach?

ME - English, Psychology and French

HL - Maths and Psychology

RO - RE and History, but I taught Geography last year. Actually, before I came to this school, I had never taught a history or a geography lesson!

AK - Chemistry and Physics

Q - What is your favourite subject to teach?

ME - Probably Psychology at the moment, I look forward to those classes the most

HL - Both Maths and Psychology are quite similar, but maybe Maths a bit more. I like when you are reasoning, and you are doing a problem, and the satisfaction you get when you get the right answer. I think life is very complex and Maths seems to give you a sense of security.

RO – I think I prefer History to RE, now that I have had the opportunity to teach the other.

AK - I'd have to say Chemistry because I always did love it and I think it is a really interesting subject.

Q - What do you like the most about teaching?

ME - I like that I get to meet so many new people and I think the most rewarding thing about teaching is seeing how the pupils I teach progress and mature as they go through the school. I just find it amazing that I'm there from when they start school to when they move up through the years and I see how they are growing into the fantastic young adults that they are!

HL - I like being in a classroom with young people and that feeling when my students understand and improve - that's the best part of teaching. It's something that I think no other job has, to see the positive effects of what you're doing immediately and also in the long term: that's why I think it is the best job.

RO – As geeky as it sounds, I like learning things and being a teacher gives me the opportunity to do that.

AK – I like interacting with other people. I remember working in the lab in university and you would spend hours on end stuck in the same room, without talking to many people. I think with teaching there is more interaction as you are in a room with twenty students most of the time, it's lively, it's interesting and it is the thing I probably like the most about teaching.

Q - What is your favourite year group to teach?

ME - I think Year 7s because I don't teach them, plus all the Sixth Form! Honestly, I really like teaching the Sixth Form because I like the intellectual challenge of it, I like small groups and I find a lot of them to be very enthusiastic and keen to learn.

HL - I like Year 10s and 11s the most. I think they are mature enough to reason with and understand complex topics. I feel I can talk to the students as adults and show empathy for what is being discussed. I feel like students are ready to understand certain topics at a younger age, but it just is something you cannot do with a Year 7 or a Year 8 group.

RO - I normally like older students to be honest, so probably Sixth Form.

AK - I can't answer that because it would depend on the day of the week and the time of the day that you ask me, because the year groups are so different. For example, I can go from teaching Year 13 to teaching Year 8, and they're both very different types of lessons. I like certain aspects of the Year 13s but I like other aspects of the Year 8s that are completely different, but overall I find both very enjoyable.

Q - What is your favourite memory about your time at school?

ME – My favourite memory of school was the drama productions I took part in, especially Joseph and The Wizard of Oz. I also really liked the friends I had in school.

HL - My favourite memory was probably having a group of friends that I know I'm going to see every single day and was the best thing. I also liked having structure and meeting deadlines and also that everyone else was going through the same thing. We all have the same exam, we all have the same teacher which disappears eventually as everyone goes their own way with life after school.

RO – I had a best friend called Jenny and we used to go everywhere together and whenever we weren't seen together, people always asked where the other one of us was. One great thing is just how much fun everything is at that age and being with your friends all the time really helps.

AK – The friends you make is probably the best part. When you look back, it's a cliché to say those are the best days of your life, but they really are in a lot of ways. You meet so many people and so many friends and you make some friendships that last a long time, so it is that daily interaction with friends that made school special for me.

As Michael Pitts made it clear, reducing what we use will always be better than simply recycling. With this in mind, Green Club's next big project is to organise a 'swap shop'. The event will offer students, staff and parents the chance to swap the books they've read, games they have played and clothes no longer worn with other pre-loved items that members of the school community bring to the swap. Green Club plan to donate any unswapped goodies to a local charity so that nothing goes to waste. Green Club is also putting together a campaign to introduce 'meat-free Monday's' to the school cafeteria in a bid to reduce meat-consumption amongst the student body; a low meat diet has significant health and environmental benefits. The club believe with this nudge towards plantbased eating, students will eat more meat-free meals at home. This would reduce their chance of developing type two diabetes later in life and help them contribute to decreasing greenhouse gas emissions!

Through all these initiatives and more, Green Club hopes to achieve 'Green Flag' status for the school. Green Flag status is awarded by 'Eco-schools' a UK government initiative that reviews and recognises how effective schools have been in lessening their negative impact on the environment.
