We are delighted that our pupils have continued to work enthusiastically with their remote learning and are most grateful to you all for your continued support.






Sadly, some children did die in the fire but many were saved. Could the death of many of them of been easily avoided?






Finally I did my guitar practice, read some books and then went to bed. It was a very busy and fun day so I will hopefully sleep well tonight!
