Message From the Superintendent



Dear Members of Our School Community:

Among the highlights of the summer always has been the week in which our calendar is published and distributed to our students and their families across our county.

The calendar represents a sense of unity and collaboration, a reminder that it is in sharing ideas and working together that the impressive achievements of our students are made possible.

Academically, in many categories, our teachers and students continued to outperform their peers in Virginia and across our nation. Our strategic goal for all students commits us to those results and more. In addition to academics, however, our goal also includes good citizenship.

Through the truly remarkable and dogged efforts of unusually talented and passionate high school students, legislation was passed by the General Assembly and signed by the Governor to improve the health curriculum throughout the Commonwealth. Specifically, these improvements were centered on an increase in mental and emotional health services for students. These same students prevailed upon our School Board to expand counseling services to their middle and high school colleagues.

We saw the same commitment to the well-being of others reflected in so many other student-led campaigns: the students who raised money for flood victims in Houston; the students who generated ideas for an outside organization to provide books to impoverished schools in Haiti; the students who wrote and sold a book to aid citizens of Puerto Rico. From pre-K to grade 12, students in schools throughout our county were using their own imagination, creativity, teamwork and problem-solving skills to improve the lives of others, most of whom they never met.

This is the year when we begin formal programming at the high school level to strengthen the way in which we prepare students for lifelong success, regardless of their career path. All incoming freshmen, for instance, will be enrolled in a seminar where they will explore their strengths, needs and interests under the guidance of a teacher mentor. The idea is that this personal discovery process will guide students throughout their high school career and beyond as they pursue their goals.

You will see more emphasis this year on the community side of education. Our objectives include bringing you into our schools as contributions to real-world learning for students in all grades; increasing internship opportunities for students with business and community organizations to deepen their contemporary learning; and continuing to align our curriculum with the knowledge and skills that will benefit our students for a lifetime.

It is my hope that this calendar will accelerate our achievement of these objectives by enabling you to use the content to connect and engage with your local school, its mission, and its improvement plan. You are, after all, our most valuable resource for the growth and development of all students.

As we prepare for a school year rich with opportunities, every member of our team—from our highly dedicated teachers, staff and administrators to our child nutrition, building services, finance, human resources, and transportation professionals—considers it a privilege to serve our 14,000 students and their families with a joyful dedication to excellence. Through their contributions and your engagement, we can look forward to an exciting and rewarding school year.

We are determined to build upon our performance in the years ahead by ensuring that:

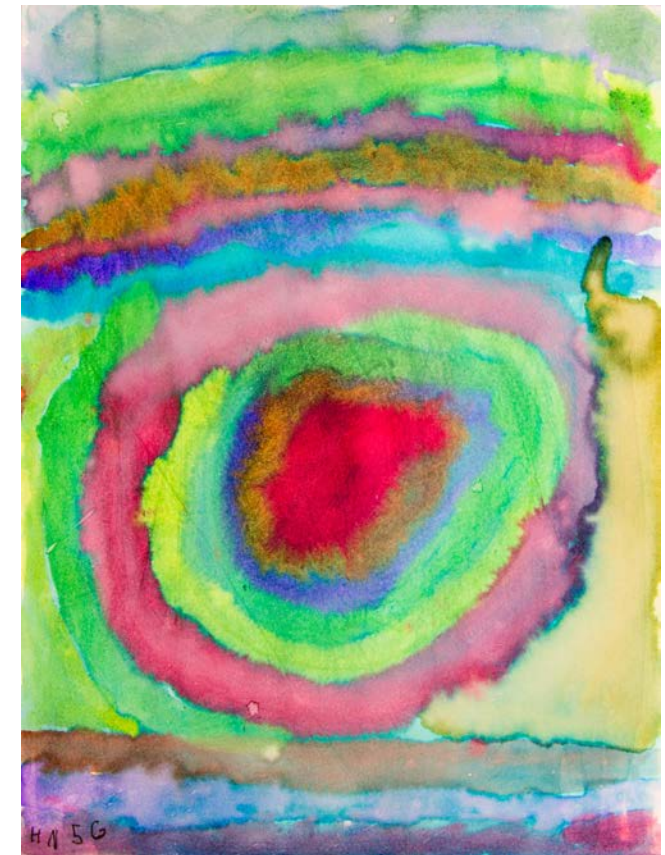
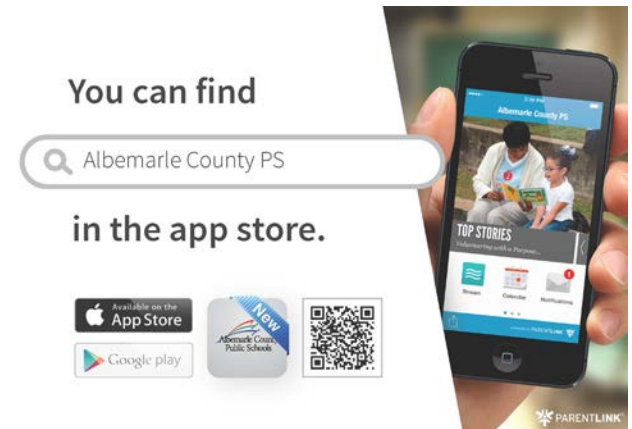
- Our school facilities continue to meet the contemporary learning needs of all students;

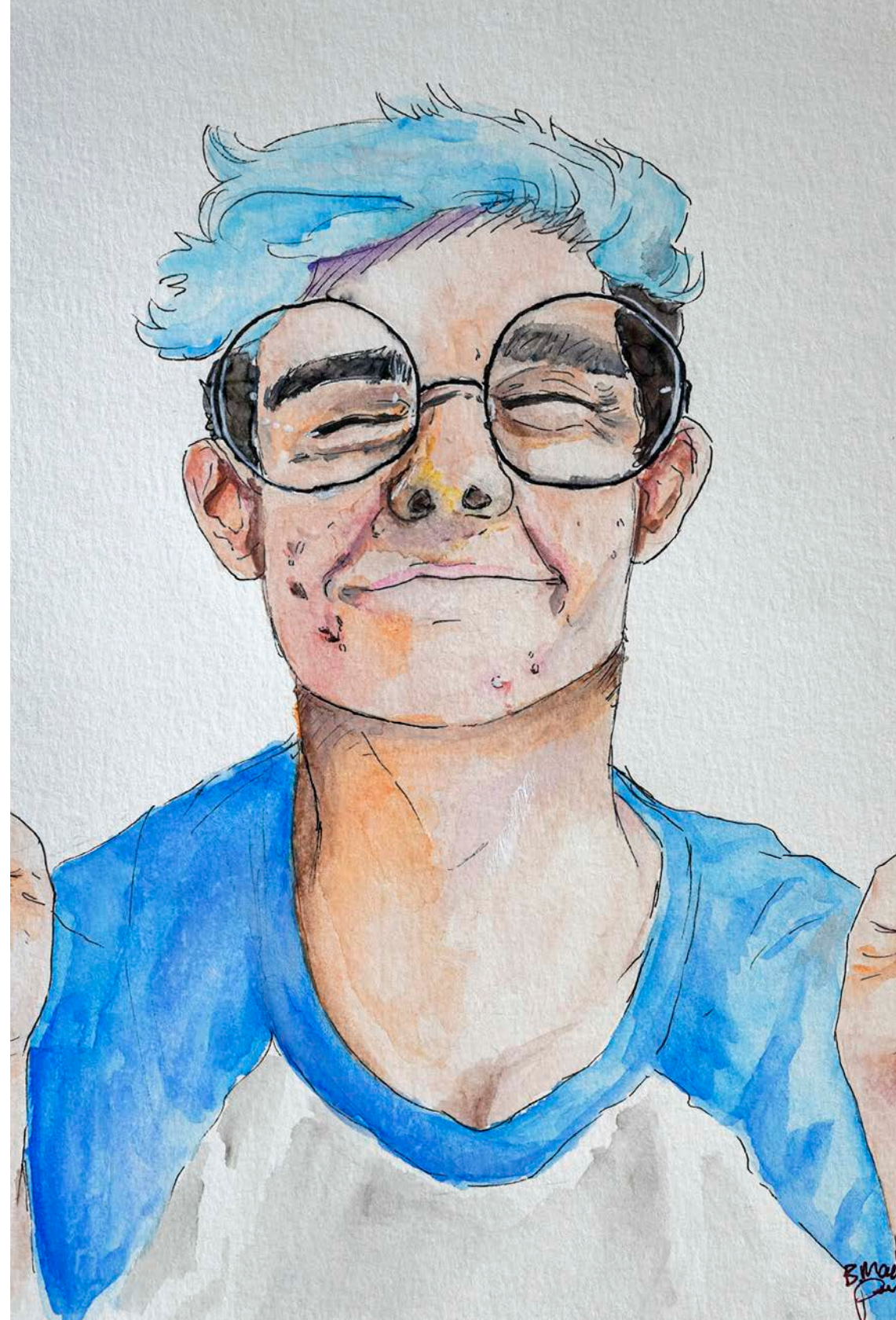
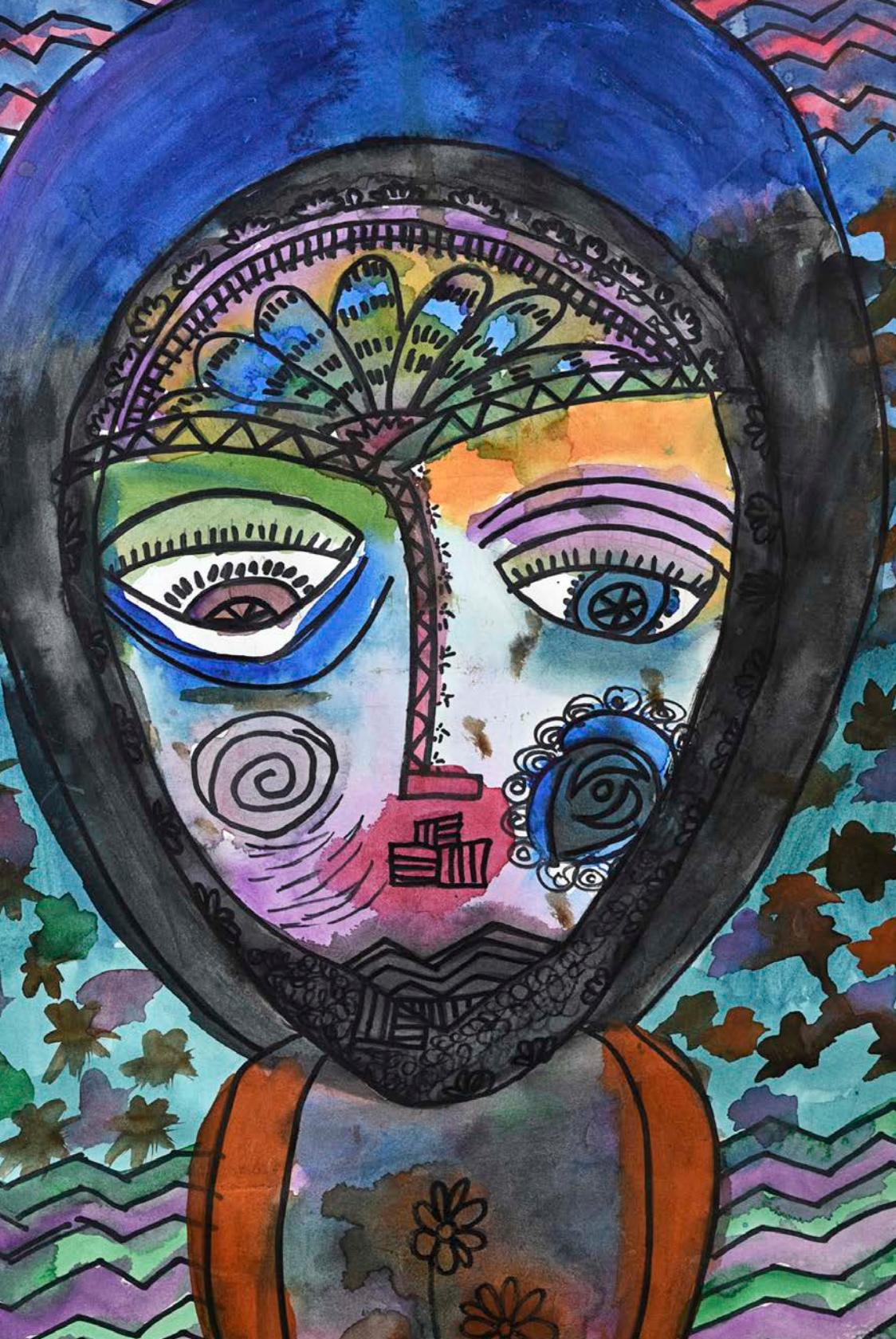

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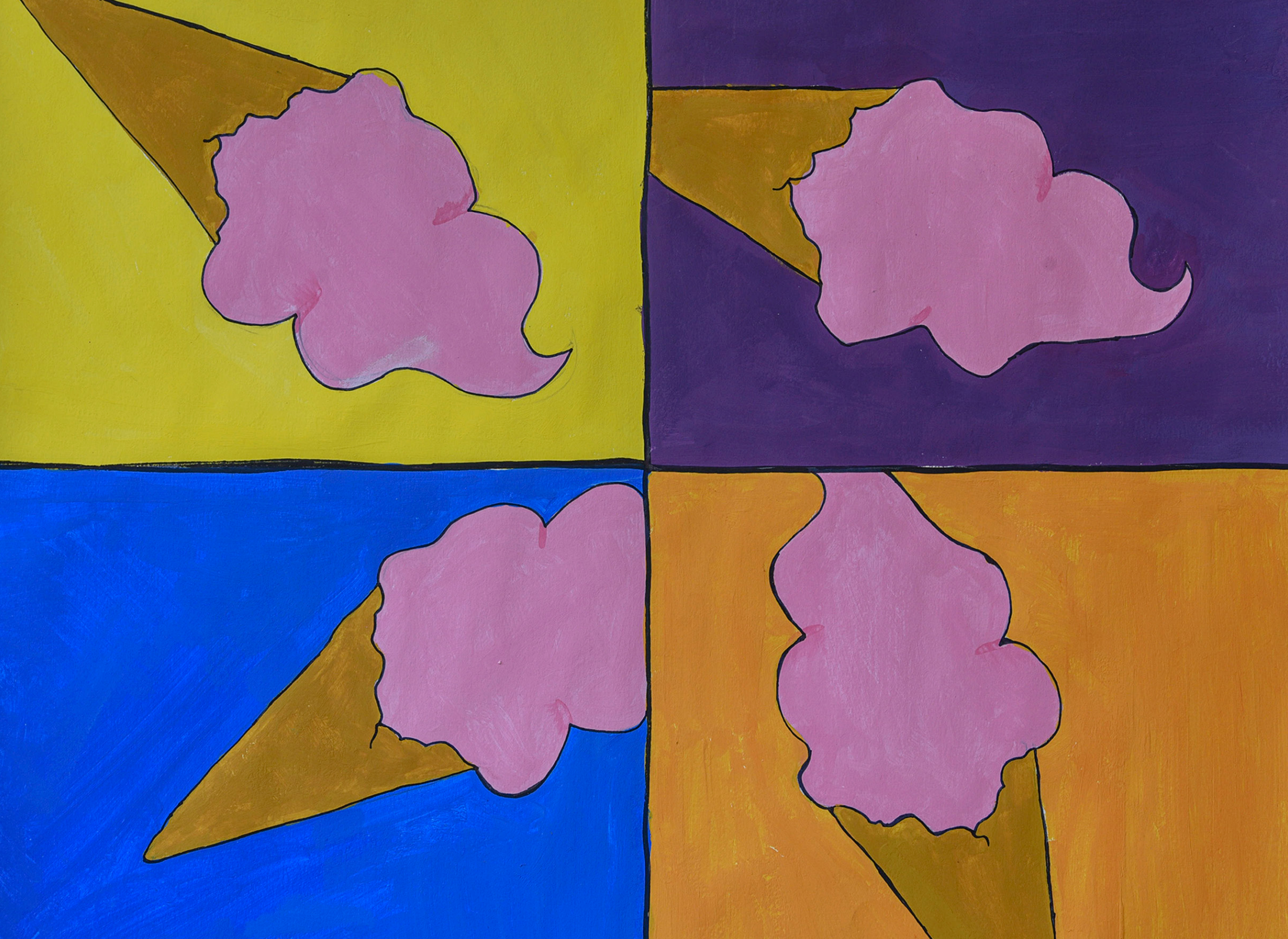

Testing Schedules

VIRGINIA STANDARDS OF LEARNING

During the course of the school year, students in grades 3-8, and some in grades 9-12, will participate in required state academic testing. The Standards of Learning (SOL) for Virginia Public Schools establish minimum expectations for student learning and achievement.

Students in grades 3-8 take SOL tests in Reading and Math. Students in grades 5 and 8 take SOL tests in Science and History. High school students take end-of-course SOL exams in all four subject areas.

2018-19 SOL testing windows are as follows:

October 15 – November 2
- Fall 2018 SOL Non-Writing Test Window:
December 10 – January 18
- Spring 2019 SOL Writing Test Window:
March 4 – April 5

PSAT/NMSQT

The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) measures critical reading skills, writing skills, and math problem-solving skills, and provides first-hand practice for college entrance exams, such as the SAT. Taking the test can qualify students for scholarships and other honors. Typically, students take the test as sophomores and juniors, though some take it earlier.

High schools will offer the PSAT/NMSQT on **Wednesday, October 10, 2018.**

SAT® & SAT SUBJECT TESTS™

The SAT and SAT Subject Tests are designed to assess students' academic readiness for college. The SAT is a college entrance exam that measures skills in reading, writing and math. Most students take the SAT during their junior or senior year of high school.

SAT Subject Tests are content-based tests that allow students to showcase their achievement in specific subject areas. Administration dates for SAT Subject Tests are marked on the month-by-month calendar. Learn more or register at www.sat.org.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMS

The Advanced Placement (AP) Examinations are administered each year in May and represent the culmination of college-level work in a given discipline in a secondary school setting. Rigorously developed by committees of college and AP high school faculty, the AP Exams test students' ability to perform at a college level. Students who perform well can receive course credit and/or advanced standing at thousands of universities worldwide. For more information, visit www.collegeboard.org.

Childcare Programs

The Office of Community Engagement operates **Extended Day Enrichment Programs (EDEP)** in collaboration with each elementary school. EDEP serves students in kindergarten through fifth grade. Registration is accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

EDEP seeks to provide quality attention, thoughtful guidance, authentic experiences, and engaging activities to enhance and expand the learning of Albemarle County students. EDEP offers the following programs:

- **After-School Enrichment Program (ASEP)** operates each full day in all elementary schools from the time school dismisses until 6 p.m. Participants may attend either full-time (4-5 days per week) or part-time (1-3 days per week). A one-time registration fee of \$50 is due at time of enrollment.
- **Student Holiday/Spring Break Program** operates on selected student holidays from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. at Greer Elementary School. A one-time registration fee of \$30 is due at time of enrollment.

Children must be at least five years of age to be eligible for either program. EDEP programs are funded entirely by the tuition and fees collected for their use. Enrollment is limited. Financial assistance is available.

MENUS

Albemarle County Public Schools menus are planned by a nutritionist and follow the regulations set forth in the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010. In accordance with regulations, students must choose a serving of either fruit or vegetables to qualify their meal as a school breakfast or lunch. Each day, a variety of entrée choices, featured salads, fresh fruit and vegetables, and whole grains are offered. PAYMENT

Individual student accounts allow all students to prepay for meals, which helps speed up the lunch lines. When they reach the end of the lunch line, students simply enter a five-digit pin into a keypad, and the cost of their food is deducted from their balance. Students in need of a meal, but with no funds available, will be provided a qualified USDA meal, and the parent/guardian will be responsible for those charges. Parents/guardians are responsible for keeping up-to-date on their child's meal account balance.

Any amount of money can be deposited into an account using cash or check. With this option, please be sure to write the student's full name and pin number on the check or envelope containing the money. We encourage all parents to set up an account at www.mySchoolBucks.com. There is no cost to set up an account, which allows parents to view and manage their child's transactions and even set up low-balance notifications. The mySchoolBucks site also offers an online credit card payment option, with a convenience fee. Visit www.mySchoolBucks.com for details.

FREE & REDUCED PRICE MEALS

Families may apply for free and reduced meal benefits online. The process is safe, secure, private, and available anytime! Your data is transmitted to the Child Nutrition Office the same day you apply, allowing for faster processing so you can receive benefits more quickly. Additionally, an Application for Free and Reduced Price Meals is included in every student's annual school registration packet and available at each school office and online at www.k12albemarle.org/ChildNutrition. For those interested in applying, **a new application should be completed each school year.**

Families are encouraged to complete the application if they believe they may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Eligibility status is completely confidential and applications are accepted at any time.

DRIVER EDUCATION

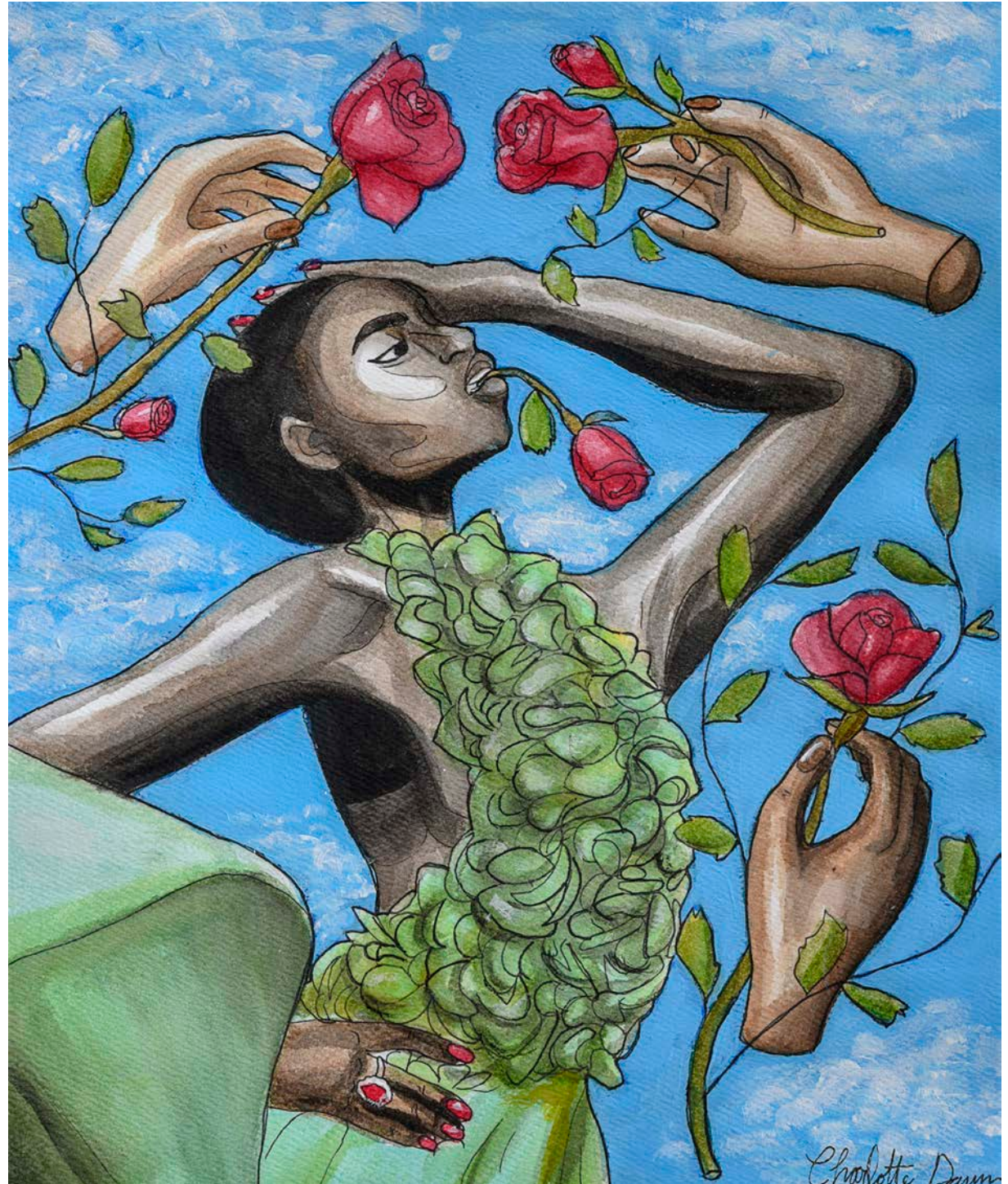
A certified and professional driver training program leading to Virginia licensure is offered at all Albemarle County high schools.

Classroom Driver Education is offered as part of Health II, which is taken in 10th grade. Students are encouraged to attend all sessions of the 36-hour driver education instruction.

Parent Seminars are offered at Albemarle, Monticello, and Western Albemarle high schools. Attendance in this free 90-minute informational training session by a parent or guardian is required prior to enrolling a student younger than 18 in Behind-the-Wheel instruction. Topics covered include Virginia traffic law, licensing, coaching, and insuring teen drivers.

Behind-the-Wheel Driver Education is offered weekdays throughout the school year before and after school and during study hall at Albemarle, Monticello, and Western Albemarle high schools.

Key Advisory Groups

Parent and citizen advisory groups offer a broad range of opportunities for community engagement with public education. For more information about our division-level advisory groups, including opportunities for contributing to their important work, visit www.k12albemarle.org/advisory.

Albemarle Education Association (AEA)

Exchange Committee: Subset of representatives from the AEA, a local chapter of the Virginia Education Association. The committee works with the Superintendent and key leaders on issues of concern and importance to AEA members.

Athletic Advisory Council: Serves as a forum for parents, students, and school officials to share ideas and exchange information in order to further advance the quality of the athletic student experience within ACPS.

Budget Advisory Committee: Analyzes, evaluates and advises the Superintendent and division staff regarding budgeting practices and priorities from a business perspective. The committee is composed of business professionals with significant budgeting experience.

Charter Schools Review Committee: Reviews charter school applications, conducts applicant interviews, and makes recommendations to the School Board. The committee convenes upon receipt of Charter School applications and meets, as necessary, to carry out the responsibilities designated in School Board Policy LC.

Classified Employee Advisory Committee

(CEAC): Founded to provide a two-way forum for classified employees to have input regarding potential employee policy creation and/or changes and to bring forward employee issues that could not be successfully addressed through existing channels.

County Student Advisory Council (CSAC):

Represents the opinions of students in an advisory capacity to the Albemarle County School Board. Council members aim to better share and exchange ideas and solutions to common problems across schools and work to better the school system and the surrounding community.

Equity and Diversity Advisory Committee:

Advises the division on adopting and modifying policies and practices to address equity and opportunity gaps to improve student achievement. Committee members serve two-year terms.

Gifted Advisory Committee: Oversees the implementation of the Local Plan for the Education of the Gifted, participating in the biennial review and revision of the Local Plan, and reporting to the School Board through the Superintendent about the needs of gifted learners in our county.

Long-Range Planning Advisory Committee

(LRPAC): Informs and advises the Superintendent and School Board in the development of comprehensive, long-term plans for facility needs in the most effective way and in support of the school division's strategic plan.

Parent Council: Serves as a forum for parents, educators, and school officials to share ideas and exchange information in order to further advance the quality of the public education system within Albemarle County.

Redistricting Advisory Committee (RAC): When convened, works in cooperation with staff to analyze relevant data and redistricting options to present to the Superintendent.

School Health Advisory Board (SHAB): Assists with developing health policy in the division and evaluating the status of school health, health education, the school environment, and health services.

Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC):

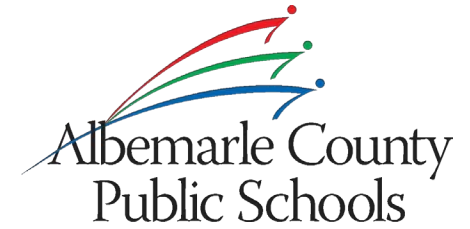

The committee provides advice concerning the needs of children with disabilities receiving special education services and assists in the formulation and development of long-range plans for these children.

Teacher Advisory Committee (TAC):

Group of teachers, including a representative from each school, who meet with the Assistant Superintendent and other central staff every month to discuss items of interest to teachers and give feedback on county initiatives and programs.

Title I Parent Advisory: Provides feedback and suggestions for ways Albemarle County can improve our Title I program.
