

Creator Shelley Roden/Theater

Shelley Roden (VCS Class of 1992) is an Academy Award-winning Foley Artist working at Skywalker Sound in Northern, California. As a Foley Artist, Roden performs footsteps and props in sync with picture, and creates natural and hyperreal sounds to enhance feature film, television, and interactive game soundtracks. Roden utilizes found objects collected throughout her twenty-year career to create authentic original aural textures to convey the filmmaker's sonic landscape. With a focus on improvisation, she works with her two Foley Partners to mold, record, and layer these original sounds. Together, the team discovers a fresh and imaginative approach, advancing the craft of Foley Art.

Roden's Visual and Performing Arts Hall of Fame nominator, husband Jeff Roden, said his wife was greatly impacted by her experiences at VCS. In an earlier E-Alumni article, Roden said the teachers at VCS who most inspired her were Kathleen Houser, Nancy Sanders, and Jim Strauss. "These teachers all encouraged me to explore my ideas and dreams through creative art and writing projects," she said.

Exploring ideas and dreams through art is an understatement when you look at her resume today. Roden's favorite projects include Pixar's *Toy Story 4*, Chris Nolan's *Dunkirk*, the Netflix series, *The Dark Crystal: Age of Resistance*, Ryan Coogler's *Black Panther*, and *Rian Johnson's Brick*. After graduating from Victor High School in 1992, Roden earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Cinema and Photography from Ithaca College in 1996. Outside of her work at Skywalker Sound, Roden has lectured as a visiting artist at Ithaca College and Virginia Commonwealth University. She is currently working on a personal sound art project utilizing instruments gifted to her by her nephew, Steve Roden, a sound artist, and inspired by the minimalist compositions of her husband, Jeffrey Roden.



Creator Fred Fouquet/Theater

Fred Fouquet (VCS Class of 1988) is an award winning Commercial Editor, widely known in the entertainment industry as "Freditor the Editor." For more than twenty years he has been at the helm of many culturally impactful film, video, commercial, and on-line projects. In addition to editing numerous Super Bowl spots, Fouquet has been an integral part of legendary music videos like Miley Cyrus' Party in the USA, Green Day's Jesus of Suburbia, Foo Fighter's Long Road to Ruin and Dr. Dre's I Need a Doctor, among many others. A few of his many film title sequences (Island of Dr. Moreau, Mimic, The Avengers) have gone on to be in the Museum of Modern Art, and also appear in the curriculum of design students. Through the years, many major film directors have also used Fouquet's talents, from model compositing

on the set of *Independence Day* to concepting and creating a critical scene in *Pacific Rim* and co-editing *London Fields*, a feature film starring Billy Bob Thornton and Johnny Depp. Fouquet has won numerous awards throughout his career – Cannes Lions, Clios, Andys, Monitors, Tellys, Broadcast Design International, MTV video awards, Ad Age "best editing" and others. One of his Super Bowl spots reached number two on *USA Today's* poll for best Super Bowl spot of the year.

Before becoming an illustrious editor, Fouquet attended Ithaca College where he graduated with a BFA in film, photography and visual arts. His passion for the arts began at Victor High School where he was involved in numerous choral groups and theatre productions. His high school senior yearbook quote was an ironic foreshadow into his successful future. "Technical knowledge is not enough. One must transcend technique, so that art grows from the unconscious."

Fouquet's Visual and Performing Arts Hall of Fame nominators, Joe and Marsha (Loopman) Carey said Fred was a major part of the Arts program while at VCS and his subsequent success as a "Freditor the Editor" make him the ideal candidate for the Arts Hall of Fame. This honorary category may include, but is not limited to, VCS staff and local community supporters.

A Message from Our Superintendent, Dr. Timothy Terranova



Dear VCSD Alumni,

It's my pleasure to reach out to you and share my appreciation for your continued support of our fantastic district. I have been Superintendent for about three months, but during this time I have already grown to appreciate the strong community

involvement in our schools. I have said often, in Victor, you do not know where the school district ends and the community starts because they are woven together.

I have spent the majority of my professional career in one suburban school district- West Irondequoit. In my first 17 years in West Irondequoit I worked as an elementary teacher, curriculum supervisor, assistant high school principal, and junior high school principal. Then, for 8 years, I worked in the district office overseeing at various times human resources, finance and curriculum and instruction. My wife and I have two wonderful teenagers and currently live in Webster.

I applied to the Victor Central School District because of its incredible reputation for not only academic excellence, but also for instilling a comprehensive education for our children. Although I do not know the community and school district nearly as well as you, the one thing that stands out in my brief time here is the commitment and dedication of the people working for the betterment of our children's lives. The staff and parents are second to none!

With this said, we face many challenges. The most pressing is the district's financial situation. Specifically, our district has experienced tremendous growth in the past 15 years and our funding has not kept up with this growth. Currently, the Victor Central School District has the lowest per pupil expenditure of any school district in New York State! The lack of revenue has resulted in many areas that are understaffed compared to neighboring districts as well as critically low savings that are needed for emergency situations that develop. Despite these issues, Victor is still considered one of the highest achieving and comprehensive districts in our area. Unfortunately, we will struggle immensely to continue with this tradition if we do not increase our funding.

The Board of Education is strongly considering a tax increase that would exceed the NY State Tax Cap, requiring a 60% voter approval in June. This tax increase would allow us to maintain existing staff and potentially hire for critical areas like special education, mental health support, and safety and security. In addition, exceeding the cap would protect our already critically low savings from use toward next year's budget. If we cannot exceed the cap, VCSD will be looking at over 3 million dollars worth of reductions, which will impact class sizes, high school courses, art and music at the elementary level as well as musicals at the secondary level, athletics, co-curricular activities such as Robotics and DECA as well as enrichment programs at the elementary level. These reductions would have a devastating effect on our ability to offer the exceptional education the Victor community is used to.

I encourage you to review our budget documents on our website, Victorschools.org, and ask us questions if you have them. If you live in the VCSD community, please don't forget to register to vote and then vote via the absentee ballot process outlined on our website.

Again, The Victor Central School District is a special place. Thanks for being a part of the excellence that we are known for. Thanks also for staying involved in our school community. Please reach out to me if you have any questions or would like to talk further about moving our district forward.



Good Morning.

I always enjoy your newsletters and will look forward to the next one. I was sorry that the Alumni Association has decided already to cancel the June banquet. I haven't been since 1960 – and was looking forward to going.

When I think about Victor schools I get a whole melange of pictures/aromas/people. My entire school time was spent in the building that is, I think mostly administration. The original school on the hill. I remember the shady lawn slanting toward the sidewalk leading to downtown – where we sat between Regents exams. If one walks into the school building, whether while classes are in session or not, there is always a distinctive smell – sort of a combination of tomato soup, floor cleanser, crayons and maybe chalk. And the tiles gleam cleanly and none of the lockers were battered as I've seen in some other schools more recently.

My recollections of elementary school are pretty foggy. But there were some stellar teachers in both elementary and high school. Mrs.Powers introduced us to poetry, asking for a line a day when the roll was called, Mrs. Tallman in sixth grade, created all sorts of projects to keep students interested, Maurice Comings made algebra almost intelligible, Helen Schantz was probably a far better teacher than we all realized; she probably could have been a college professor. She brought life to Shakespeare and cared very much about her students. Mrs. Dunn made Latin fun; we all had Roman names and wrote notes to each other in Latin – bringing a dead language back to life – at least for a year or two. Roger Strait taught physics so well that when I had to take a physics course as a college freshman, I aced it because it was nearly a repeat off what he taught. Mrs. Popenhusen was an unlikely gym instructor, but she loved her students and – in a time when there were no women's sports – made intramural basket ball exciting.

From the vantage of looking back, I realize how very forward-looking VCS was compared with other schools. In my 60 years out of Victor schools, I've lived in and had children in three different school districts and my husband has been on the local Board of Ed. as well as the BOCES board, so I became aware of the inner workings of several schools. Victor was doing a super job back when I was a student, and probably – I would hope – is continuing to do so. It is bigger than I think is optimum but I suppose that allows for more programming. I hope students don't get lost in the multitudes.



Tom Rothwell ('82) Follows His Passion for Forestry



How does one become a forester? What exactly does the job entail? Tom Rothwell, the sole proprietor of Empire Forestry Consultants shares his story and why being in forestry requires much more than a desire to work outdoors.

What did you do after you graduated from VCS in 1982?

After attending the VCS system since first grade (even kindergarten if that counts), I went to Syracuse University for two and a half years where I picked undergraduate credits with an interest in both forestry and geology. In 1985, I transitioned to the forestry program at the SUNY School of Environmental Science and Forestry at Syracuse, and graduated with honors in 1987.

What did you do after Forestry School?

After graduation, I worked briefly as a teaching assistant at the forestry school summer program at Warrensburg, and then spent one year working for Weyerhauser Company in Hot Springs, Arkansas in a research position.

My first big career break came in 1988 when I went to work as a forester for the Missouri Department of Conservation, in Eminence, Missouri. This job and location provided me with a valuable opportunity to learn forest management on government and private lands, as well as wildfire prevention and suppression.

In 2000, I accepted a job with Lassiter Properties in Potsdam NY. Lassiter Properties was a successful realty and timber company based in Georgia, with large tracts of forest land in northern NY. I worked for Lassiter for 7 years, and during my last two years with the company, I developed a consulting forestry company, DBA: Empire Forestry Consultants (EFC). By the time EFC was up and running, I had developed a great deal of experience and knowledge regarding forest management, timber harvesting, supervising contractors, and employees, marketing forest products, and to a lesser degree, business. In 2007, Lassiter Properties decided to concentrate on the realty company in Georgia, and sold their timberlands. I took over Empire Forestry Consultants as Sole Proprietor, beginning in September of 2007 and have been doing that ever since.

What kind of work does Empire Forestry Consultants do?

Most of my efforts put forth, and income earned, revolve around representing private landowners interested in responsible, long term forest management. This involves forest inventory and timber cruising (analyzing the forest resource, and providing information to the landowner), development of forest management plans, and setting up, contracting, and timber harvests. Typically in a year, Empire Forestry represents 20 to 25 clients, and manages a few hundred to a few thousand acres.

I have also developed a small scale logging business, which is more of a hobby. I own small acreages of forest land which I and a business partner manage personally.

How did your VCS education help you become a forester?

All levels of education contribute to a good foundation. I certainly learned core information and values that shaped my entire life at VCS. Most everyone benefits from learning speaking and writing skills in English classes, and science and math are equally important. It has been a long time since my high school days, but I felt that Victor always had a very good reputation as a top notch school. With rare exception, the teachers were above average, and a few stood out, because they impressed upon myself and others, why their information would be important to us in our future lives. They could articulate very well, and they made the course material interesting, and even fun. Among these teachers, back in the late 1970's and early 1980's included:

Mrs. McCauley, 10th grade geometry; Mr. Potter, 12th grade math and introduction to statistics.

Mr. Thompson, 11th grade chemistry, and also served as the track coach. I was on Mr. Thompson's track team during my senior year, and also played on the high school football teams for three years.

How did VCS education prepare you for what you do today?"

It's difficult to answer because growing up in general, and education in particular prepare us for almost everything to some degree, and also, there's a lot of water under the bridge, so to speak, since that period of time. However, with that in mind, the VCS experience taught me how to learn and utilize information, and equally important, how to interact and communicate with people, whether those people are your friends, or even people you might not like so much.

What advice would you give to a student interested in forestry as a profession?

Choose this or any profession, because of your passion for it, not strictly for the income.

Don't underestimate the importance of written and oral communication skills, even in the forestry profession. Forestry is a very long apprenticeship, so look for any opportunities to gain relevant experience and skills. Show up on time, all the time. Work hard and work smart. Be willing to work in any weather and field conditions.

On a personal note, being a sole proprietor is a 7 days a week occupation. I don't have much spare time, like I once did, but I do still enjoy the occasional round of golf, and the opportunity to fish the Adirondacks and northern NY. I am also willing to provide additional information in any capacity to any VCS student pursuing forestry or associate environmental professions.

Kerry Szymanski ('87) Uses Comedy to Live, Learn and Most of All, Laugh



What did you do after graduating from VCS in 1987?

After graduating from VCS, I attended Syracuse University where I studied International Relations and French. After graduating, I went on to become a USPTA Tennis Professional and coached all over the country. I received a full scholarship to coach tennis while pursuing my MBA at the University of Oregon. During my graduate studies, I was a contributing author to the book, Advertising and the World Wide Web. After graduating from the University of Oregon, I worked in marketing for Harry and David in Medford, Oregon. My career took me to Chicago where I worked in marketing for Bally Total Fitness and Duty Free Americas. To escape the cold weather, I moved to Fort Lauderdale, Florida where I opened a design your own purse store, SassyBB. For over 15 years I was the Lead Fashion Merchandising Professor at the Art Institute of Fort Lauderdale where I worked with students to help them

pursue their careers in the fashion industry. In 2009, I was voted one of the "40 under 40" rising business stars in Broward County by Gold Coast magazine. I was featured in local and national magazines, newspapers, television programs and was a judge for 'America's Next Top Model' and 'Miss Hollywood USA'. Through all of these experiences, I started working with companies to help them with marketing and PR initiatives through my company, Kerry Communications. As an education aficionado, I went on to study my Doctorate of Business Administration from Argosy University and graduated Summa Cum Laude. Currently I am an Adjunct Professor of Marketing online for American Business & Technology University.

In 2014 I published a marketing book, Seduce Your Customers and went on a nationwide speaking tour. In order to improve my public speaking skills, I took a stand-up comedy class at the Improv in Fort Lauderdale. I took a break from stand-up comedy to pursue my doctoral studies. After I graduated, I decided to pursue stand-up comedy more seriously. For the past year, I have been performing stand-up comedy all over Florida. In June 2019, I performed at the Carlson Comedy Club in Rochester, NY. I will be performing there again on April 16th. Last summer I was asked to apply to be on America's Got Talent.

What inspired you to get into comedy?

I was inspired to get into comedy in order to improve my public speaking skills. After taking a class at the Improv, I fell in love with it. Comedy is a combination of writing and stage performance. As comedians, we write all of our own material. It's challenging to be able to write material that is relatable and funny to different audiences. Performing stand-up comedy is different every night. The ability to make people laugh is incredible. My goals with comedy are constantly evolving. I would like to become a national touring stand-up comedian and speaker.

One of the wonderful aspects of stand-up comedy is that I get to see a lot of my classmates from VCS! A lot of my classmates and neighbors came to watch and support my comedy show at the Carlson Comedy Club in Rochester last June. Every month there is a VCS alum in the audience at one of my shows in South Florida! It's been a great way to keep in touch with alumni. I feel incredibly lucky and grateful to have the support from my friends and classmates from VCS!

What classes/activities and/or teachers at VCS most inspired you?

I was very active in sports during high school at VCS and loved all of my time on the tennis courts. All of my teachers were amazing and now as a college professor, I understand how much teachers give to their students and the impact that they have on our lives. I loved all of my history classes with Mr. Olsen. His enthusiasm for teaching has been a large influence in my career as a college professor. The French classes and trip to Paris that I took with Mrs. Shepard were very valuable. I spent a semester studying in Strasbourg, France and all of those

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classes were incredibly helpful! Mrs. Gacioch was a wonderful English teacher and Mr. Gacioch made algebra fun. Who would believe that Algebra and fun would be used in the same sentence! The PE classes with Coach Thompson also helped to build a foundation of fitness that I have pursued throughout my life.

How did your VCS education prepare you for what you are doing today?

My education at VCS helped prepare me for my vocation in teaching. My love for learning and teaching stemmed from all of the wonderful teachers and classes that I studied at VCS.

What advice would you give to VCS student interested in pursuing comedy?

Learning how to perform standup comedy is a great skill that will help in many areas of life. First, the ability to speak on stage in front of an audience translates into many professions. The ability to write and edit jokes is also an excellent skill to have that is useful in many business opportunities. Comedy is not just about being funny. It's about showing up, watching, learning and networking. The challenge in stand-up comedy is that there is no money in the field unless you become a professional touring comedian. Most comedians work other jobs during the day to perform stand-up comedy at night. It is a wonderful creative outlet, but not one that will pay the bills.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

In my spare time, I enjoy walking and going to yoga. I have 2 cats and a dog that keep me very active. But to be honest, most of my spare time is spent doing comedy. I perform at open mics, take comedy classes, work in a writing group and watch professional comedians perform live or through Netflix, HBO, etc. I also host open mics and do the marketing for some local comedy shows. I perform in South Florida two-to-four times per week.

Will you be performing in the Rochester area in the near future?

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Sara Adams ('11) Argues Her Case for Becoming a Lawyer



Sara Adams knew that she always wanted to help people. She also knew she was extremely good at arguing, but it was one high school class, one "aha moment" that inspired Adams to pursue her dream of becoming a lawyer.

"I remember a mock senate session in Mr. Olson's AP Government class where I vehemently argued for a "bill" to legalize same-sex marriage. It wasn't until Mr. Olson, a very conservative guy, told me that I won the debate that I realized I could argue for a living by being a lawyer."

Tell us about your journey to becoming a lawyer. What did you do after you graduated from Victor Senior High School?

I went to Monroe Community College for two years, moved to Charleston for a year, then came back to graduate from SUNY Cortland in 2016. I started law school at Syracuse in the fall of that year. During law school I interned at Housing and Urban Development in Washington, DC. I also interned in the city of Rochester at the State Attorney General's regional office.

What are you doing today?

Currently, I am a staff attorney at Legal Services of CNY in the Utica office. I advocate for low-income clients who cannot otherwise afford a lawyer. I mostly represent clients in housing court against evictions. Someday I would love to work for the federal government or perhaps run for office.

What classes/activities and/or teachers at VCS most inspired you?

Mr. Strauss was my journalism teacher and became a mentor to me until he retired. I still lived for journalism and loved being Creative Editor for the Victor Voice my senior year. I also enjoyed sparring with Mr. Horst, who definitely should have been a social studies teacher instead of math! I also found Mrs. McManis to be one of the most supportive and kindhearted teachers who fostered my love for reading and writing.

How did your VCS education prepare you for what you're doing today?

I wasn't always the best student, but I had the best teachers who inspired me to try harder and not give up on myself. Having the chance to take Leadership with Mrs. Thomas taught me the importance of taking charge, which is something I do often in my career. The AP courses I took – Government, Literature, and US History – took me outside of what I was comfortable with. They also prepared me for the studies I would do in college and even law school.
