

A BRONX TALE: A VISIT WITH FORDHAM'S MOUNTIES

MSDA ALUMNAE DIRECTOR KATE SULLIVAN '88 VISITS UNDERGRAD ALMA MATER TO BRING A LITTLE MOUNT THE MOUNTIES

With a history that dates back to 1841, Fordham University is the oldest Catholic and Jesuit university in the northeastern United States, and is currently home to 12 Mount alumnae. Just about an hour away from the Mount's home in Caldwell, Fordham's Rose Hill campus is set on more than 80 tree-lined acres and is where most of the Fordham Mounties attend their classes (with the Lincoln Center campus providing an immersive Big Apple experience as well).

A popular school among Mount graduates, Fordham has been listed as one of the country's "hidden ivies*" – a distinction bestowed on 63 colleges and "universities of excellence" that "rival the Ivy League."

As a Fordham alumna (class of '92, Lincoln Center), I was excited to meet up with my fellow Rams at Rose Hill this past November. 

ALUMNA Spotlight: Jennifer Chiappone '12, Publishing Assistant at United States Holocaust Memorial Museum

There are moments in life that inspire, that when reflected upon can bring a sense of clarity and insight. And then there are others, that when remembered, can seem positively surreal. So is the case with Jennifer Chiappone, MSDA class of 2012.

THE JOURNEY

As she reflects on a Mount class trip to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC, Jen is sitting in her office at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC.

Of her days as a student, Jen notes, "I remember Mrs. Diane Safko's Holocaust and Genocide class the most. We took a field trip with Holocaust survivors to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. My eyes were opened to the importance of learning about history, and the importance of a well-thought-out museum setting. And now I am working here! It's kind of surreal!"

As the publishing assistant for The Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel Center for Advanced Holocaust Studies at the Museum, Jen works on the Museum's scholarly journal, "Holocaust and Genocide Studies," published with Oxford University Press. In her role, Jen actively corresponds with authors and prospective authors, maintains the Center's article and book review databases, and serves as first-line editor of accepted articles and book reviews. She is also the main editor for the journal's bibliography of recently published works in the field, conducts research to source appropriate images for each article, and manages the Center's weekly editorial meetings.

Recalling her journey as well as her early inspirations, Jen said, "I have always loved art, history, and English. I have to thank my wonderful teachers at the Mount for encouraging me, including Mrs. Helen Jackson, Mr. Michael Guarducci and Mrs. Patricia Giampolo." As an undergrad at Monmouth University, Jen studied English with minors in Art, Art History, and Anthropology, and spent a semester abroad in London, where she studied at the National Gallery through Regent's University, London. These experiences cemented her passion for art history, and led her to pursue a master's degree in the field, with a concentration in Museum Training from George Washington University which she completed in 2018.

THE MUSEUM

Known as a living memorial to the Holocaust, the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum "inspires citizens and leaders worldwide to confront hatred, prevent genocide, and promote human

dignity." While it maintains its presence on the National Mall, the Museum makes a worldwide impact, educating generations about the Holocaust, remembering survivors and victims, and confronting genocide and antisemitism. According to its website, the Museum "provides a powerful lesson in the fragility of freedom, the myth of progress, and the need for vigilance in preserving democratic values."

In pursuit of raising awareness, educating, and encouraging the world's sense of moral responsibility, the Museum's core programs include leadership training for a diverse cross-section of professionals including law enforcement, the judiciary and the military; onsite and traveling exhibits; and educational outreach for teachers and students. The Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel Center for Advanced Holocaust Studies, where Jen serves as publishing assistant, is uniquely focused on fostering "the continued growth and vitality

of the field of Holocaust studies."

With a purpose and responsibility that makes this institution uniquely significant and necessary, working at the Holocaust Memorial Museum is a blend of profession, passion and mission.

"My Mount class trip to the Holocaust Memorial Museum was a wonderful and moving experience, opening my eyes to how a museum can do more than exhibit art or artifacts," Jen recalled. "Even then, I knew that this was a place I would want to work."

Working alongside the Holocaust survivors who volunteer at the Museum and speak to student groups and tourists about their experiences, has provided Jen with a unique perspective that began to take shape as a student at the Mount.

"This museum has shown me firsthand the importance of collecting - artifacts, survivor testimonies, photographs, etc. - for future generations to learn and never forget about the Holocaust and other genocides."

KAIROS

15:06 -

A RETREAT, A JOURNEY, A TRANSFORMATION

WHAT IS KAIROS?

The word Kairos comes from the Greek, *καιρός*. In simple terms, Kairos is a three or four-day retreat program for high school and college students based on Roman Catholic teachings, during which participants contemplate the role God plays in their lives.

If you ask a participant, it is so much more.

On January 24, 2020, 55 Mount juniors and seniors including nine peer retreat leaders from the class of 2020, gathered in excitement along with seven Mount faculty and staff members, and traveled to the retreat center in Kearny to begin their Kairos experience. 2020 marks the sixth year the Mount has offered students the opportunity to participate in Kairos. MSDA class years 2015 and 2016 were the first to have taken this spiritual journey together in January of 2015 – hence the nomenclature “15:06” representing the sixth retreat since the first in 2015.

With its basis in theology, philosophy, and psychology, a Kairos retreat is an experience of Christian community, set in an environment that removes the participants from their everyday lives. No distractions (i.e. no phones) meant the focus was on prayer, reflection, each young woman’s own personal theology, the role of God in their lives, and their community. Through various exercises, small group breakouts, active discussions, prayer and plenty of fun (a fire-pit with S’mores, dancing and more), the young women explored the value of their faith, their self-worth, and their relationships with God, their friends, their families and themselves. Kairos comes at a very opportune time for Mount juniors and seniors and gave students an opportunity to explore the Mount’s Kairos mantra: “Love and be loved.”

Meant to be a lived experience well beyond the conclusion of the retreat, another common phrase you can hear in the halls of the Mount these days is “Live the Fourth.” It is an encouragement to live out the promises made on the final day of the retreat, and continue the work that began in the protected and focused Kairos environment.

The meaning of Kairos and its impact is best explained in the words of the participants themselves.



“Kairos starts with delving into oneself to look deeper into who God created you to be. From there, the community that is formed on the retreat becomes one of inclusivity that in turn, encompasses the entire MSDA community as a whole. We pray together, learn together and realize our responsibility and service to each other for the greater good.”

LEADERS AND ENTREPRENEURS IN THE MAKING

L.E.O. Launches at the Mount



ON NOVEMBER 21, 2019, THE MOUNT COMMUNITY WELCOMED THE INAUGURAL COHORT OF 17 STUDENTS INTO THE L.E.O. PROGRAM, WITH A PINNING CEREMONY IN THE DORIS M. BYRNE PERFORMING ARTS CENTER.

Selected by the Leonidas Foundation, MSDA is the second school to be offering the innovative program as part of the curriculum, joining Don Bosco Prep – the L.E.O. Program’s pioneer school. A two-year intensive to be taught by MSDA faculty, business experts and professional entrepreneurs, the course covers the full lifecycle of creating a business or product from ideation to launch, with the tenets of “leadership, entrepreneurship and opportunity” at the foundation of the program.

Alex Cucciniello, vice president of the Leonidas Foundation, Theodore Vagias, Foundation trustee, and later in the program L.E.O. cohort member **Katerina Holevas '21**, warmly remembered Leonidas Vagias (brother of **Alexandra Vagias '18**,) who passed away in 2016 and in whose memory the Leonidas Foundation was created. Each noted elements of Leo’s character like putting others before self, commitment, determination, and deep faith, which drive the Foundation’s core principles of mind, body and spirit.

Jessica Iacullo '13, CEO and founder of Hungry Grl Big City, LLC, delivered the keynote address in which she reflected on her journey from the Mount to starting her successful social media marketing consultancy. In contemplating the end of the decade, Jessica noted:

“Starting this decade at the Mount and now ending it back at the Mount at age 24, and being able to say that I am now an entrepreneur, it is such a transparent thing to say that you don’t always have to have an end goal or a five year plan, though those help get to the goals that you want to achieve. No one will work for you - it’s the work that you put in over time that will get you to where you want to be. It won’t happen overnight, but it will happen if you believe it will happen, and you work really hard to make it happen both inside the classroom and outside the classroom.”

The students were then presented with their Leonidas Foundation pin by Mrs. Frances Vagias and Sister Fran, officially inducting the members of the inaugural Mount St. Dominic Academy cohort of the L.E.O. Program.

Dr. Marissa Muoio '08, Dean of Academics, is the lead teacher of the L.E.O. Program and approaches the program with the goal of helping each student not only find their voice but also their seat

The first formal meeting for the cohort focused on the “Entrepreneurship Mindset.” Upcoming topics of discussion over the first several weeks of the semester will include the lean method (a product or company based on a want or need in the marketplace); the BMC or business model canvas (a strategic management tool used to define and communicate a business concept); and the ever important value proposition – the business or marketing statement a company uses to explain why a consumer should buy a product or use a service.
