Clay & Innovative Forms I, *The Art of Assemblage*

Targeted Goals from Stage 1: Connecting & Creating

Investigate, Plan, Make: Generate and conceptualize artistic ideas and work to make art.

Long Term Transfer Goal: Create works of art to personally engage in the artistic process and/or communicate meaning

Content Knowledge:

Vocabulary: Assemblage, High relief, Free-Standing / in the Round, Abstract, Non-objective, Re-Purpose, Stable

Artists: Louise Nevelson, Alexander Calder, Pablo Picasso

Skills: Students will relate their knowledge of artists who assemble/construct sculptural works from a variety of different materials. Students will plan/conceptualize ideas to create their own assemblage, using a variety of techniques to join disparate elements together. (e.g. folding, scoring, glueing, etc.)

Monday: What is an Assemblage ? Students will be introduced to selected works by Louise Nevelson, Alexander Calder and Pablo Picasso After viewing examples of the <i>Art of Assemblage</i> , students should begin to consider what materials they have on hand	YouTube video: <i>Assemblage</i> This is a short video produced by the L.A. Museum of Contemporary in which artists George Herms and Betye Saar discuss the art of Assemblage.	June 1: Live Session with students to introduce selected artworks and give an overview of the upcoming <i>Assemblage</i> challenge. <p>Tuesday: The assemblage could be a low or high relief sculpture. In other words, disparate objects or textures created from materials at hand would be arranged and affixed to a flat substrate or background. <p>Wednesday:</p> <p>Your assemblage may be composed of repurposed elements such as in Picasso's <i>Bull Head</i> made from a bicycle seat and handlebars In the second example by Picasso, he has created a still life from scraps of wood and upholstery trim..</p> <p>If you have a lot of recyclable cardboard at home, you could make an assemblage from cut and folded cardboard.</p> <p>View this link from the museum of modern Art on <i>Picasso's Guitars</i> YouTube link posted on Google classroom</p>	<p>See posting in Google classroom for depictions of: Picasso, <i>Bull's Head</i> & figure Picasso, <i>Still Life</i> and cardboard portrait</p>	<p>Week of June 8: Students will be constructing their assemblage. You will be required to turn in a brief artist proposal that includes your inspiration for the project, the materials you plan to use as well as the type of sculpture you will create. Week criteria for success :

June 5: Students will turn in an artist proposal that evidences their engagement with the online resources for **Assemblages** by artists Louise Nevelson, Alexander Calder and Pablo Picasso. The proposal will include the materials you plan to use as well as the type of sculpture you will create.

June 12: Students will upload two photographs of their **Assemblage**.
