WHAT IS FIRST?

- Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas
- Created by Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 76th Texas Legislature in 1999 to measure the performance of school districts' financial resources
- Rating indicators this year test in 15 areas
- Rating calculations this year are based on data from the 2014-2015 fiscal year

OBJECTIVES

- Assess the quality of financial management in Texas public schools
- Measure and report the extent to which financial resources are allocated for direct instructional purposes
- Fairly evaluate the quality of financial management decisions
- Openly report results to the general public

RATING DETERMINATION

• Ratings are determined by the number of points earned on the 15 indicators:

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70-100 points

Above Standard Achievement

50-69 points

Standard Achievement

31-49 points

Substandard Achievement

<31 points
