



Update for Cambridge schools on June 2020 series

3 June 2020

To Cambridge International schools worldwide,

The main focus of our update today is on supporting schools with submitting predicted grades. Many schools are now submitting predicted grades and rank orders to us via our Grade Submission System, and we are providing a range of support for centres as they use it.

We are also writing with further updates to our FAQs and university applications.

We will send our next update to schools on 10 June 2020.

Submitting grades and rank orders

The Grade Submission System is now live and many schools have already submitted their predicted grades and rank orders for their candidates.

Here are some useful reminders to help the process run smoothly in your school.

- The deadline for submission is **16 June 2020**. If you do not submit predicted grades and rank orders before the Grade Submission System closes at midnight (UTC) on 16 June, your candidates will not receive a grade in the June 2020 series. **We are not able to accept predicted grades and rank orders submitted after 16 June.**
- You can access the Grade Submission System from our [website](#).
- If you choose to complete your predicted grades and rank orders offline, you should download and upload the csv template from the system. **Do not use your own version because the Grade Submission System will not accept it.**
- To enter the **rank order** for candidates, you need first to click on the **grade button** that shows the total number of candidates allocated that grade. This allows you to enter rank orders for each candidate within that grade, starting with 1.
- You can still **withdraw candidate entries** by entering a grade 'X'. We will credit your account for those entries.
- You must make sure you have enough evidence of a candidate's performance to give them a predicted grade. If you are not confident that you have enough evidence, you should enter a grade 'X' for that candidate.
- We strongly recommend exams officers make sure heads of centre and teachers are familiar with our [Regulations supplement for the June 2020 series](#).

- If you haven't yet submitted your data to us, you can familiarise your heads of centre in the meantime with the [Declaration](#) they will need to sign for each syllabus.

Evidence

If we need to ask you to submit your evidence, we will contact you by 22 June. Do not send us evidence unless we contact you. You can find information about collating appropriate evidence in the '[Awarding grades for the June 2020 series](#)' section of our website.

If you are not confident that you have enough evidence to allocate a grade to a candidate, you should enter a grade X for that candidate on the Grade Submission System.

University applications

We have been working closely with universities across the UK to learn more about their policies on accepting Cambridge qualifications in 2020, as well as their approaches to teaching in the context of Covid-19.

There is a strong commitment among universities to welcoming international students to the UK and showing flexibility where appropriate.

To help applicants and schools navigate the changes, Roshan Walkerley, Senior Recognition Manager at Cambridge International, recorded a podcast with representatives from two popular UK universities. Roshan looks at issues such as English language requirements, additional measures that universities may put in place for those starting university this year (such as blended online and face-to-face learning), and advice for current A Level students from the University of Bristol and City University of London.
