




FLUENCY:

Reading Passages adapted from Reading A-Z which is a research-based curriculum used to give students practice with sight words in context. Repeated guided reading allows students to develop important fluency & comprehension skills.








SIGHT WORDS:

Fry High Frequency word lists are used because words are compiled and ranked based on their frequency in literature and the lists include all parts of speech. Rapid recognition of sight words is a key foundational skill that supports the development of reading fluency.




TIPS FOR PARENTS

Help Your Student Succeed at Language

1. MAKE BOOKS SPECIAL

Turn reading into something special. Take your kids to the library, read with them, and buy them books as gifts. Have a favorite place for books in your home or, even better, put books everywhere.

2. GET THEM TO READ ANOTHER ONE

Find ways to encourage your child to pick up another book. Introduce him or her to a series like The Boxcar Children or Harry Potter or to a second book by a favorite author.

3. TALK ABOUT WHAT YOU SEE AND DO

Talk about everyday activities to build your child's background knowledge, which is crucial to listening and reading comprehension.

4. TEACH YOUR CHILD SOME "MIND TRICKS"

Show your child how to summarize a story in a few sentences or how to make predictions about what might happen next. Both strategies help a child comprehend and remember.

5. "ARE WE THERE YET?"

Use the time spent in the car or bus for wordplay. Talk about how jam means something you put on toast as well as cars stuck in traffic. How many other homonyms can your child think of? When kids are highly familiar with the meaning of a word, they have less difficulty reading it.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN AFTERSCHOOL

In a victory for kids and families, California approved an increase of \$50 million for afterschool programs. This is the first increase since state funding began in 2006.

Think Together worked closely with partners to convince state leaders of the need for more funding. We are grateful to the nearly 3,000 Think parents who texted their support!

This victory is the first step in a long road. When minimum wage reaches \$15/hour, programs will need \$200 million more to keep their doors open. Think Together will continue advocating making afterschool a priority in California. Your support ensures that all kids in your community receive a great education.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

Ways to support your teen succeed in school

1. HELP YOUR CHILD SHOW UP AT SCHOOL WITH A GOOD ATTITUDE AND READY TO LEARN.

Make sure your teen gets plenty of sleep. Recent studies show that teenagers need nine or more hours of sleep nightly and that students earning As and Bs generally are getting to bed earlier than students with lower grades.

2. HELP ORGANIZE TIME AND MATERIALS.

Help your teen keep an assignment calendar with dates for long-term projects as well as daily homework. Review the calendar at the beginning of the week to plan how time will be used and make allowances for other activities such as sports and clubs.

3. TAKE AN INTEREST.

You might not understand a subject such as physics or early American literature but you can still listen to your teen talk about what is happening in class. Also listen to what is happening outside of class. Listen to what your teen is trying to say without immediately judging or offering advice.

General Support Opportunities





