



A note from Ms. Pat Long Upper School Vice Principal



My mother used to say 'Never pray for patience, because God may teach it to you the hard way'. She meant simply that a person is not naturally patient, but has to learn it by dealing with things that do not go as quickly as hoped, or as smoothly as planned.
