Summer Assignment IB Diploma Programme Music Years One and Two

To introduce a foundation for IB Diploma Programme Music, complete the following assignments. **Assignments are in Performance (3-4 songs) and Listening.**

A. Performance

Register for Smartmusic **before June 12**

- a. Go to https://admin.smartmusic.com/join
- b. Input the code: 43FQZ-UMR2U
- c. Smartmusic will display that you are registering for: IB Music ASF
- d. Create an account. You must do this even if you had a previous Smartmusic account with ASF.

Instrumental

- 1. Prior to June 30
 - a. Navigate to <u>Wynton Marsalis</u>
 Volume 1: The Magic Hour
 - Select, record and submit (with assessment) 1-2 songs from the work.
- 2. After June 30
 - a. Select and record 2 songs from the <u>Jazz Standards folder</u>

Each song should use a different key signature, to build your facility in all keys

Vocal

- 1. Prior to June 30
 - a. Navigate to <u>First Book of</u>
 <u>Mezzo-Soprano/Alto Solos</u> OR
 First Book of Soprano Solos
 - Select, record and submit (with assessment) 1-2 songs from the work.
- 2. After June 30
 - a. Select and record 2 songs from the Vocal Folder

Two of your songs should be in a language other than English.

*If you miss the June 30 deadline, you will be unable to use Smartmusic. Complete the first part of the assignment (#1) using songs from the linked folder.

B. Listening

- 1. Listen to music of your choice from multiple time periods and geographic locations. Document song name, artist, year and location on the linked doc. At a minimum, include the following genres: Jazz, Pop, Classical and World Music.*
- 2. Your listening should begin to build a "mental map" of music throughout time and space.
- 3. Become familiar with the following prescribed works:
 - a. Haydn's Symphony No. 94 in G major (Hob. 1:94) "The Surprise"
 - b. Rachmaninoff's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini, Op. 43

RESOURCES AND DETAILS

Listen with attention to:

- Different entrances of instruments
- Melody and variations on the melody
- Texture, rhythm, harmony, structure
- Instruments
- Metre (q.v. time signature)
- Introduction, improvisation, electronic effects
- Tempo changes
- Time period
- Genre/Cultural/Geographic identification of composer or primary audience
 - Specific identification is better: "Klezmer" vs. "Eastern European"

TOK Questions to Consider - no need for written answer

- Why are the arts important?
- What are the roles of emotion and reason in the arts?
- Why has some music been feared by the political/cultural establishment?
- What makes an artistic piece "great"? Are there objective criteria, or is it entirely subjective, varying across time and space?
- Is the composer's intention important to the listener/audience?
- What is the function of music? Is it the same throughout the world, time and space?
- What are the standards by which we evaluate art? Can we justify these standards and, if so, how?
- Can it be said that one musical scale is more natural than another?

*Jazz, Pop, Classical and World Music are purposefully broad categories. Consider the following sub-genres, but <u>do not worry</u> about trying to get to all of them -- that is our work for the first year!

- Jazz pre- and post- 1950: Ragtime, Big Band Jazz, Latin Jazz, Bossa Nova, Jazz Funk, Dixieland, Joplin, Gershwin, Davis, Monk, Marsalis, Acid Jazz and Jazz Crossovers
- Pop beginnings, R&B, British Invasion, Classic Rock, Hard Rock, Psychedelic, MTV, Hip-hop, Alternative, Internet, Modern Pop, K-pop, Vocaloid, Techno
- Western Classical Music
 - o Renaissance (Byrd, Tallis, Monteverdi, Palestrina, Gabrielli)
 - Baroque (Cantata, Fugue, Oratorio, Bach, Handel, Haydn, Vivaldi, Telemann, Scarlatti, Corelli)
 - Classical (Beethoven, Mozart, Sonata, Concerto, Symphony)
 - Romantic (Choral, Opera, "Absolute Music," Nationalism and Tchaikovsky ballets, Wagner, Verdi)

- o Lieder, Program Music, Schubert, Schumann
- Impressionism (Debussy, Ravel)
- 20th Century forms (Stravinsky, Anton Webern, Edgard Varese, atonality, serialism, minimalism, Neo Classicism, technology and electronic music)
- o Contemporary Western Art Music (Steve Reich, Philip Glass, John Adams, Arvo Part)
- o Film/Video games
- World Music Americas and other non-Western Art Music traditions
 - Middle-East
 - o Africa
 - o Asia, Gamelan Music of Indonesia
 - o Latin America
 - o Caribbean
 - o South America, indigenous, classical and contemporary forms
