"As several cities erupted in street protests after the killing of George Floyd, some of them resulting in clashes with the police, Mr. Trump made no appeal for calm. Instead in a series of tweets and comments to reporters on Saturday, he blamed the unrest on Democrats, called on "Liberal Governors and Mayors" to get "MUCH tougher" on the crowds, threatened to intervene with "the unlimited power of our Military" and even suggested his own supporters mount a counterdemonstration." And let's not forget how he ordered aggressive force against PEACEFUL demonstrators in Lafayette Square, in front of the White House, so that he could have a photo-op in front of St John's Episcopal Church, which he rarely, if ever, attends.
