Robotics Writing and Design Competition

We wish to let you know about two competitions which are running right now, inviting UK primary schoolchildren to share their creative works inspired by all things robotic, hosted by the EPSRC UK Robotics and Autonomous Systems Network.

The "Once Upon A Robot" writing competition is open to all Key Stage 2 children (aged 7 - 11 years old), and challenges children to write an 800-word story featuring any kind of robot their imagination can conjure. The story could take place on Earth, in space or even on another planet!

For the "<u>Draw A Robot</u>" competition, children in Key Stage 1 (aged 5 – 7 years old) have the chance to draw a robot that they'd like to see in the future. The robot could be designed to accomplish any task or job – the sky's the limit! The children will be able to submit a robot drawing, up to 200-word description, and five key features (labelled on the drawing).

The two new competitions will be judged by robotics experts from the ESPRC UK-RAS Network, plus two very special invited literary and art & design judges. The drawing competition will be judged by **Zoë Smith**, **Producer at Tate Kids**, and the writing competition will be judged by **award-winning writer AF Harrold**, author of *The Imaginary* and the popular Greta Zargo series.

There are fabulous prizes on offer, including a Makeblock Programmable Robot kit, a Thames Komos Robotics Experiment kit, plus some unique and exclusive prizes courtesy of our guest judges.


SEND Friendly Family Activities

East Sussex Reading Challenge

The East Sussex Children's Book Award is still ongoing and the final event will be happening virtually with a live screening late July 2020. All books for this year are free to read and available digitally which is great news for all parents at a time where the library is closed and new books are difficult to get hold of.

For the challenge, children can read and vote for their favourite book, write and upload a book review or do a drawing of their favourite character, setting or create and draw a book cover. All great and purposeful activities to do at home.



Once they are done, all they need to do is take a photo of their drawing/ review, fill in the form, upload the picture and then press the submit button to send to the relevant email address.

They will also be uploading short videos by some of the authors onto the website, talking about their books and answering questions about them too. Keep a look out for these too.

Next we have Lewie and Gabriella showing inventive cooperation as they help each other with their work. Great idea!


