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Savvy about Sun Safety

Summer is all about spending time outdoors in the sun. During childhood and adolescence, protection from ultraviolet (UV) exposure reduces the risk for skin cancer in adulthood. Here are some tips to help your family enjoy outdoor activities safely this summer:

- For kids six months and older (as well as adults), sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or greater reduces the intensity of UV exposure that cause sunburns.
 - —Apply sunscreen liberally 15 to 30 minutes before sun exposure to ensure the skin absorbs the sunscreen and will reduce the likelihood that it will be washed off.
 - —Reapply every two hours and after kids swim, sweat or dry off with a towel.

- Dress kids in high ultraviolet protection factor (high-UPF) swim shirts or rash guards and choose bathing suits that cover more skin, like one-piece suites and long trunks.
- Have your kids wear a hat with a brim all the way around that shades their face, ears, and the back of the neck.
- Sun exposure damages the eyes as well as the skin. The best way to protect eyes is to wear sunglasses that provide 100% UV protection.
- Infants under six-months-old should be kept out of direct sunlight.
- Remind teens that tanning can increase skin cancer risk, and leads to wrinkles, blemishes and age spots later in life.

Make sun safety a part of your family's everyday lifestyle to reduce the risk of skin cancer, sun damage and skin aging.

They provide start-up funds for new groups, such as the Robotics Team, and they provide funds for site activities, such as STEAM Fairs. 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




Thomas and his friends escape the maze only to

Calming Your Child's Fear of Starting School

If your child will be entering the school experience for the first time, it can be a little overwhelming for both parents and child. Here are some tips to calm separation anxiety in young children (and their parents) and make the transition from home to school easier.

Since children love familiarity and routine, getting into a school going groove can be especially helpful for kids starting preschool, TK or Kindergarten in the fall. A month or so before the start of school, take

steps to make sure your child knows what to expect in school. Practice walking to school or driving your child to the school a couple of times each week, starting at first anytime during the day, and then closer to the start of school, around the start of school time. This will help your child get familiar with the route and routine. Point out the signs, the speed hump, classrooms and any visible play equipment. Around the same time, start a consistent bedtime and wake-up routine to prepare them for their school day experience. Describe what will happen on the first day/read books and share your own memories of school. Talk about the songs you sang, books you liked,

friends you made, etc. when you were a child. Don't ignore your child's fears but stay focused on the positive things. Don't allow your child to dwell on fears or imagination of what might happen. For example, if your child likes art, show them books about going to school where children are painting or doing crafts. You can also use a fictional character (Elmo, Dora or Superman) and talk about how they might handle the concern or fear that your child is thinking about. While you are out in the neighborhood or parks, help your child meet other children going to the same class or school. Arrange some play dates and give your child lots of time to interact with other children their age.

Go to the library and check out books about preparing for Kindergarten with books such as: The Kissing Hand by Audrey Penn, Owl Babies: Candlewick Storybook Animations by Martin Waddell, The Invisible String by Patrice Karst, Llama Llama Misses Mama by Anna Dewdney, I Love You All Day Long by Francesca Rusackas, I Am Too Absolutely Small for School (Charlie and Lola) by Lauren Child, First Day Jitters by Julie Danneberg, D.W.'s Guide to Preschool (Arthur Adventures) by Marc Brown, Franklin Goes to School by Paulette Bourgeois, Maisu Goes to Preschool: A Maisu First Experiences Book by Lucy Cousins.
