Creating a Culture of Safety

Los Alamitos Unified School District hired a district safety consultant, Captain Don Farrell, who began on Monday, March 18, 2013.

Captain Farrell retired after 33 years of law enforcement experience with the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles Port Police, including leadership assignments in Threat Management, Terrorism Preparedness and Response, Tactical Planning, and Tactics Development. Captain Farrell has lived in our community since 1964 and graduated from Los Alamitos High School in 1973. He is passionate about this work and stated, "My goal is to help make our schools the safest in the country."

Captain Farrell has hit the ground running! The district's Safety Program will include an all-hazards threat assessment of each site with recommendations, from buildings to staffing, for improvement. He is updating our Safety Plans, which will be shared with all staff members. He will lead training and emergency drills at each site. He is also working with our Violence Prevention and Response Task Force to prioritize areas for improvement. While our schools are extremely safe and we are compliant with all rules and regulations, our commitment is to be exceptional.

Captain Farrell is producing a monthly newsletter, which will be shared with all stakeholders to educate us on effective strategies to improve campus safety. One such strategy is the recently created See Something, Say Something campaign and Safety Hotline—562-391-2193. Anyone

Starting Kindergarten

If your child will be entering the school experience for the first time, it can be a little overwhelming for both parents and child. Here are some tips to calm separation anxiety in young children (and their parents) and make the transition from home to school easier.

Since children love familiarity and routine, getting into a school going groove can be especially helpful for kids starting kindergarten in the fall. A month or so before the start of school, take steps to make sure your child knows what to expect in school. Practice walking to school or driving your child to the school a couple of times each week, starting at first anytime during the day,

and then closer to the start of school, around the start of school time. This will help your child get familiar with the route and routine. Point out the signs, the speed hump, classrooms and any visible play equipment. Around the same time, start a consistent bedtime and wake-up routine to prepare them for their school day experience. Describe what will happen on the first day/read books and share your own memories of school. Talk about the songs you sang, books you liked, friends you made, etc. Don't ignore your child's fears but stay focused on the positive things. Don't allow your child to dwell on fears or imagination of what might happen. For example, if your child likes art, show them books about going to school where children are

STEM—an acronym for the fields of study in the categories of science, technology, engineering and mathematics

She began rowing in the fall of 2009 and currently competes for Head Coach Alfredo Montenegro and the Long Beach Junior Crew Club. Emily's most memorable race to date was piling 26th out of 85 boats in the Junior 8+ at the 2012 Head of the Charles Regatta. She participated in most sports and activities like soccer, swimming, Junior Lifeguards, softball and dance.

Her best sport by far was softball, and she made All-Star every year she played. She had good speed for her size and hit with power and pitched, but she just didn't enjoy it. Her father, Mike Harris, suggested she try rowing because

of her size and love of the ocean, and it worked out. She has been to the very prestigious Head of the Charles in Boston twice and has rowed for four years with the very successful Long Beach Junior Crew Team. She has always done well in school and is always on the honor roll.

Emily has been recruited by Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles and will be rowing for them next year. However, it was not an easy road for her. Beyond on-water rowing performance with the Long Beach Junior Crew, a high school coach's recommendation, height and weight, and erg score can mean the difference between getting recruited and accepted to the college of your choice or missing the cut. Rowing-machine scores are the one piece of data that coaches can accurately use to make a comparison between a rower and every other potential recruit. Therefore, the lower a machine score, the better the

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How to Avoid Foreclosure Scams

Last year, the Federal Trade Commission halted a business that promised distraught owners they could find defects in their loan documents that would make foreclosure impossible. With \$2,000 to \$3,000 upfront, they pledged to study the loan papers and discover irregularities that would stop foreclosure proceedings.

Sadly, there are many variations of scammers like this. The authorities cannot keep up with them all and homeowners must be on guard and seek out reputable assistance.

Should you find yourself in a foreclosure situation, here are some guidelines that will help you.

- Beware of promises. If they claim a special relationship with lenders, offer a money-back guarantee, or say they can stop your foreclosure now, run – do not walk – away from them. No one can make a guarantee such as this.
- Do not let anyone persuade you to stop making your mortgage payments. This will likely not work and will certainly damage your credit which will only make things worse.
- Do not be fooled by letterheads and logos that are designed to look like they are associated with a government agency. Look closely at all offers to help.
- Watch out for attorneys that make promises or try to lure you into hiring them. Look into the background of anyone who is going to help you by researching them with the Bar Association and your Better Business Bureau. A lawyer representing a party in California, for example, must be licensed to practice in California. And they can be a help. Just beware of those charging large sums up front.
- Never sign your property over to another person in the hopes of dealing with a foreclosure.
- And never, ever make payments to someone other than your lender.

If you need some assistance navigating the waters of a foreclosure situation, here are some places you can obtain legitimate help.

You can report scammers to the Financial Fraud Enforcement Task Force at <http://www.stopfraud.gov>, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau at <http://www.cfpb.gov>, the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law at <http://www.preventloanscams.org> or to your state attorney general's office.

The Federal Trade Commission is another consumer watchdog and they are found at (<http://www.ftc.gov>).

Common Core State Standards (CCSS)

The mission of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) is to provide a consistent, clear understanding of the knowledge and skills that young people need to master by the end of high school. Many stakeholders in 46 states worked on the standards in English language arts and mathematics to be certain that time spent in the classroom results in students who are ready for college and career.

In addition to academic content, the Common Core State Standards provide a description of 21st Century cognitive, interpersonal, and intrapersonal skills that work in tandem with the rigorous content standards. These skills focus on the “Habits of Mind” – mental competencies that students develop to be successful in a rapidly changing world. Attributes such as independence, valuing evidence, understanding other perspectives, perseverance, precision, and constructing viable arguments are developed as students learn the academic content.

Schools Begin by Fostering “Habits of Mind”

Educators throughout Orange County are designing learning environments that focus on building knowledge through content-rich text, writing, and text-based discussions grounded in research. As they acquire content knowledge, students will use critical thinking and problem solving, communication, collaboration, creativity, and innovation. In your child's classroom, you will see students who can demonstrate independence, value evidence, and are able to understand as well as critique complex material. Students will come to understand different perspectives and cultures. They will use technology and digital media strategically and capably.

In mathematical practices, students will be able to make sense of problems and persevere in solving them. They will reason abstractly and quantitatively, construct viable arguments, and analyze the reasoning of others.

Parents’ Role in Implementing the Common Core “Habits of Mind”

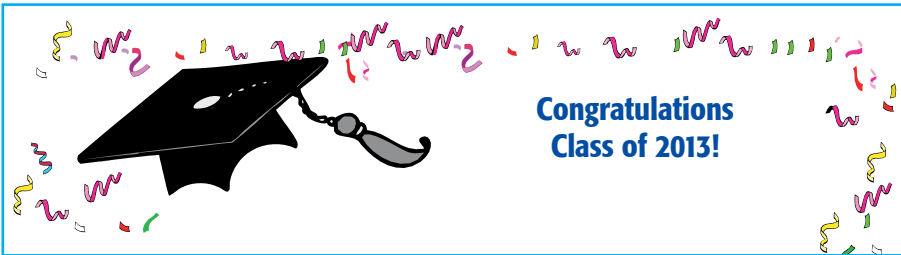
Parents play a key role in supporting their child's development of 21st Century competencies, or “Habits of Mind.” Parents can begin by setting high expectations and supporting their child in meeting them. If a child needs extra help, or wants to learn more about a subject, parents and teachers can work together to identify opportunities to extend learning and find additional resources.

Other things parents can do to help their child develop the Common Core “Habits of Mind” include the following:

- Provide a wide range of reading materials, both fiction and information text, and discuss what they read.
- Ask them to share daily work and discuss what they are learning.
- Explore what ignites their curiosity.
- Talk with the teacher and help assess progress.

As we move forward together on this exciting path to transforming education across America, I am confident that with Common Core State Standards implementation, Orange County students will graduate from high school prepared with the knowledge, skills, and personal attributes needed to become successful in college and careers.

can report anything they think we should know about to improve safety, from a tripping hazard to incidents of bullying. Captain Farrell will check the hotline for messages on a daily basis. Callers can remain anonymous or leave contact information if they want Don Farrell to get back to them. People should still call 911 for emergencies, but for issues that are important but not urgent, this hotline is a perfect addition to our culture of safety.

In addition to the safety hotline, the district has hired an elementary counselor and is working with the cities of Los Alamitos and Seal Beach on a joint project to hire a School Resource Officer (SRO) for Los Alamitos High School. An SRO is police officer specifically trained to work on school campuses. Other projects being discussed include better fencing, security cameras, panic buttons, additional campus supervisors, and the use of volunteers.

District safety will remain an ongoing focus for years to come. Each year, we will make improvements to ensure that our students can learn in an environment that is safe, nurturing, and conducive to outstanding achievement and involvement in academics, athletics, activities, and the arts. painting or doing crafts. You can also use a fictional character (Elmo, Dora or Superman) and talk about how they might handle the concern or fear that your child is thinking about. While you are out in the neighborhood or parks, help your child meet other children going to the same class or school. Arrange some play dates and give your child lots of time to interact with other children their age.
