#### **Priest:**

Today we celebrate the feast of St Peter and St Paul. We pray for those who guide our church and those who spread its message of love.

Let us pray for the successor to St Peter, Francis our Pope: May the Lord grant him wisdom to guide the whole church and be a voice in the world.

Lord in your mercy.

Let us pray for the successors to St Paul, all those engaged in missionary activity: May the Lord grant them courage and sensitivity as they bring Christ to others.

Lord in your mercy.

Let us pray for our world, recovering from the effects of the Coronavirus: May the Lord grant consolation to those bereaved and strength to those suffering.

Lord in your mercy.

Let us pray for our parish: May St Peter be an example to us as we seek to follow the Lord and discover how best we can serve the master.

Lord in your mercy.

We commend to the loving mercy of the Father in heaven those who have died recently and those whose anniversaries occur at about this time: May they rest in the arms of their saviour.

Lord in your mercy.

Both St Peter and St Paul were changed by the power of the risen Lord Jesus. Let us share with the Lord all of our hopes and all of our fears.

Lord in your mercy.

Mary knew and supported Peter. We can ask her to intercede on our behalf. **Hail Mary....** 

**Priest:** Father, we thank you for raising up in your church leaders and apostles. We make these prayers today in name of Jesus because he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever.

## Reflection for the feast of St Peter and St Paul Sunday, 28<sup>th</sup> June 2020

Today we celebrate the feast of St Peter and St Paul. This feast has special significance for us as our parish church is dedicated to St Peter. Today is our patronal feast.

One thing that the two saints have in common is that they both had a change of name. Saul of Tarsus was given a strict Jewish upbringing, so we can safely assume that he was called Saul after the first King of Israel. In Hebrew the name Saul literally means "ask" or "question". On the road to Damascus Jesus uses this name: "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?". It is only 13 years later that Luke, in the Acts of the Apostles, without explanation switches from Saul to Paul. It coincides with the first missionary journey, where Paul is accompanied by Barnabas.

Paul was unknown as a name in Jewish circles and is of Latin origin. Literally it means "small" or "humble". Paul probably chose the name because it sounded similar to Saul, but also because it would be more acceptable to non-Jewish hearers of the word to have a non-Jewish name. The questioning king becomes the humble servant of the Lord.

Peter also underwent a similar rebranding. The name Simon (or Simeon) means "listen" in Hebrew. The name is not found in the Old Testament, but there are several people of this name in the New Testament, including the prophet who welcomed Jesus when he was presented in the Temple. Jesus calls Peter by his full name in John 21 when he asks him: "Simon, son of John, do you love me?"

It was after the profession of faith at Caesarea Philippi, where Peter recognises Jesus as the Christ, that Jesus gives him his new name. Often thereafter he is referred to as Simon-Peter. Peter is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word "eban" meaning "rock". As Jesus gives this name to Peter, he insists that "upon this rock I will build my church". Thus the one who listened to Jesus, and recognised who he was, becomes the foundation of the group who would follow Jesus and make his name known.

After the resurrection of Jesus, Peter and Paul follow quite different paths. Peter is acknowledged as the first amongst the apostles but ministers to the Jewish community, in Jerusalem and then in Antioch. He goes to Rome to become the first bishop there and it is in Rome that he met his death around the year 66AD.

Paul, on the other hand, travels widely to proclaim the message of the resurrection. He always addressed the Jews he found in each city first, but when they would not listen he turned his attention to gentiles. When he is arrested he claims his right as a Roman citizen for his case to be heard by the Emperor. He was in Rome, under house arrest from 64 to 66AD.

We don't know how much contact Peter and Paul had with each other in Rome. They were martyred at about the same time, but probably not together. Because Peter was not a citizen, his sentence was crucifixion. However, tradition tells us that he felt unworthy to share the same death as his master, Jesus, so he asked to be crucified upside down. The statue of Peter in our church represents him with an upside down cross and also holding a key. Most statues have Peter holding 2 keys – why ours has only one I don't know, but Jesus did promise Peter "the *keys* to the kingdom of heaven".

In art Paul is often depicted with a sword and a book. As a Roman citizen he would not have been crucified but beheaded. The book would represent the corpus of letters he wrote to keep in touch with the communities he had visited.

The execution of these two giants of the early church sent a shock wave through the scattered Christian communities. Many thought that the second coming would happen first. It prompted a disciple of both Peter and Paul to write an account of the life of Jesus. This we call the gospel of Mark. Another friend of Paul, Luke, set about collecting copies of his letters. Thus, after their deaths the church was transformed from a church of personal witness to a church of the written word. We owe both a debt of gratitude.

From 11<sup>th</sup> July Mass will be held in **St Peter's** at 5.30pm Saturday and 9.30am and 11am Sunday. (For the time being it is not safe to have Mass in St Joseph's).
