Course Description:

Welcome to Advanced Placement Human Geography! Not only does this year-long course meet the state and district requirements for graduation, but it also prepares students to take the APHG exam on <u>Tuesday May 14</u>, 2019.

As described by the AP website: The AP Human Geography course is equivalent to an introductory college-level course in human geography. The course introduces students to the systematic study of patterns and processes that have shaped human understanding, use, and alteration of Earth's surface. Students employ spatial concepts and landscape analysis to examine socioeconomic organization and its environmental consequences. They also learn about the methods and tools geographers use in their research and applications.

The course will be challenging and will require your attention outside of our class meeting times. There will be homework most nights and you will be expected to do it. If we work hard together, the payout could be huge... free college credits if you score well on the national exam at the end of the year!
