MISSOURI BOYS CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

Junior Billikens claim their first title since 1961

Borgia wins 2A as heat punishes many runners

JEFFERSON CITY - The St. Louis University High cross country team beat the elements - and the Missouri Class 4A field - on Saturday en route to its first state crown since 1961.

"It was a group effort," SLUH coach Jim Linhares said. "There was one word that was key for us. That's team. It was a huge per-

Led by senior Ted Snodgrass, SLUH produced five runners among the top 50 finishers, and the Junior Billikens beat Liberty by one place 112-113. CBC was third with 118 points and West Plaines fourth with 137. The top four teams won trophies and the top 25 runners garnered All-State recognition.

Snodgrass finished 19th in 17 minutes flat. The winner, Matt Tegenkamp of Lee's Summit, ran away from the field and set a new state record, breaking the mark held for 15 years by former CBC standout Chris Borsa. Teenkamp's time was 15:26.67; a's mark was 15:41.7 in

SLUH had smelled roses - 38 years. "Even in the finish shoot we were packing our runners," Linhares said. "Ted made two key passes in the last 20 meters. Every single one of our guys won the race because each one of them passed people."

Snodgrass (19th), Nathan Tower (30th), Murphy O'Brien (36th), Dan Westlund (37th) and Tim Huegerich (50th) all packed into a tight finish for SLUH's first championship in Linhares' 15-year tenure as head coach.

Perhaps no one was more valueable Saturday than Huegerich, who survived leg-wobbling dehydration that seemed to spread across the 3.1-mile course like a plague. The heat, in the high 70s, pounded the runners, and as many as 40 runners were treated in the emergency tent. Four were transported to local hospitals.

"Tim Huegerich, our last man, had to force his arms through to get across the finish line, and he collapsed there," Linhares said.

Later, Huegerich was up and about with the SLUH celebrants, led by the Junior Billikens' "Blue Crew" awash in blue paint. "The 'Blue Crew' is a tradition at SLUH," Linhares said. "We kept them a little restrained today, but we gave them assignments.

"Some of the were on thet team," Linhares said, laughing.

Last season, SLUH finsieh 12th in the state. Although the Jr. Billikens finished 3rd in 1997, SLUH was a disappointing ninth in 1996 and 16th in '95.

"We got a monkey off our backs today," Linhares said.

In other races, Borgia won i first cross country cham ship, capturing the boys Class 2 title with 116 points. The Princ pia (128) and Priory (137) w second and fourth, respectively

Junior Travis Straatmann fi ished fifth for Borgia in 17:2 Jordan Millam of Clinton won 16:17. Grandview senior Ala Heincker was second in 16:49.

Webster Groves' John Stanto Geddes finished fifth in Class 4 capturing the St. Louis are highest finish in the boys di sion. His time was 16:40. La Thrusday, Stanton-Geddes w struck by a motorist while ridin his bicycle in Webster.

"The first thing I said to m self when the ambulance can was 'I'm going to run on Satur day," Stanton-Geddes said "This is great."

He quickly got over his surprise upon learning that Howell had not only won its second state cross country championship, but the Lady Knights also finished ahead of both West Plains and Kirkwood, both of which were considered favorites entering the state meet.

Howell scored 94 points, followed by runner-up Kirkwood (106), West Plains (107) and Liberty (112). Howell was paced by junior Jill Petersen and senior Katherine Bonugli, who finished fourth and 16th, respectively. Petersen's time was 19 minutes 46 seconds; Bonugli, third last year in Class 4A but running with a sore hip Saturday, finished in 20:12. Blue Springs sophomore Nicole Graham won in 19:13.

In the 3A girls race, De Soto senior Sarah Helenschmidt capped off her career with her first state championship in a time of 19:56.
