### Soccerbills split pair of QT matches

The varsity Soccerbills defeated Quincy Notre Dame in overtime Saturday, but suffered a 2-1 overtime loss to Vianney on Wednesday.

The varsity soccer team looked to its juniors to provide the winning edge against the Raiders of Quincy Notre Dame. After playing to a 1-1 draw in regulation time, the Jr. Bills tallied three times in the overtime period to notch their seventh victory.

Most of the game was played at midfield. However, with 13:22 remaining in the first half the Jr. Bills beat the Raiders' keeper. Rick Calcaterra dribbled around two Raiders, then sent a long ball from behind the halfline to Matt Walter, who was sprinting unmarked along the right touchline. Walter crossed the ball to the goal mouth where Jamie Hartley made no mistake about putting the ball into the net.

Two and a half minutes into the second half, a Raider striker was brought down in the penalty area. He converted the ensuing kick and tied the game 1-1. Up to the end of regulation, neither team had changed the scoreboard.

The Jr. Bills produced a burst of scoring in the overtime period. At 8:16 Jim Wolfe lofted a 40-yard pass for Steve LaVigne, who headed the ball into the net. During a skillful run with the ball, Jerry Deters was fouled in the area; he easily rolled the penalty kick into the back of the net. Deters

#### DeSmet "D" sits on Bills, 21-6 <u>Football</u> defense held, however, as DeSmet netted no gain on three succes-

Although the Jr. Bills' fans symbolically defied DeSmet by sitting on the white, stone "D" behind DeSmet's field before the start of the game, the Spartan "D" (as in defense) rose up to stifle the SLUH football squad, 21-6.

About ten minutes prior to the kickoff, a huge mass of SLUH's rowdy supporters rushed upon the inlaid, white stones which formed a ten-foot long "D" on a hill facing the back of the far end-zone. Before the Spartan spectators could react, the Bills' fans had completely blotted out the shape of the "D". To their dismay, DeSmet's fans could do nothing but return to their bleachers and hope the game itself would even the rivalry. It did.

The two teams locked defenses in the first quarter. SLUH held DeSmet to one first down, while the SLUH offense was unable to produce a "first-and-ten." It appeared that turnovers may again plague the Gridbills. On the Bills' second play from scrimmage following a DeSmet punt, Morris fumbled at the SLUH 36, giving DeSmet an opportunity to take an early lead. The SLUH defense held, however, as DeSmet netted no gain on three successive running plays. Senior linebacker John Franke dumped a DeSmet back for an 8-yard loss on second-and-five to stall the drive. DeSmet and SLUH each punted twice more in the quarter without mounting a scoring threat.

Senior Joe DeGreeff recovered a Spartan fumble on the first play of the second guarter to give the Bills the ball at their 45 yard-line. Halfback Henry Jones rushed for a powerful 20yard run on the first play of the series. A 12-yard sideline pass from John Denk to Franke on third-and-eleven moved the ball inside the DeSmet 30, inst enough to keep the drive alive. Jones rushed for another eleven on his second carry to move the ball to the DeSmet 15. Two plays later, Denk hit Franke with a 10-yard ID pass down the middle. Joe Conte's PAT sailed wide to the right in a fierce gust of wind.

DeSmet also fumbled on its next possession; Fred Kostecki came up with the loose ball at SLUR's 45. The Bills moved the ball to the Spartans' 35 on a well-executed reverse from Jones to Morris, which yielded 17
