

## LLEWELYN AND CLARK LEAD BILLS OVER McCLUER

The offensive line is the basis of the entire offense. The backfield functions well when the line is effective; there are holes through which to run, time with which to pass. With the offense running smoothly and the defense turning in a sterling performance, the Jr. Bills man-handled the McCluer Comets 28-6.

Quarterback Tom Llewelyn, with the luxury of a safe pocket to throw out of, fired 3 TD passes in only 7 attempts. The Bills' first drive was fueled by a 14 yd. counter play by Eric Clark. Llewelyn capped off the drive by connecting with Bob Frolichstein for a 24 yd. TD pass across the middle. The PAT failed and the score stood at 6-0. The Comets, boasting a fine passer of their own, struck back with a 49 yd. bomb followed by a 36 yd. scrambling TD pass knotting the score at 6-6. The PAT was no good. On their 4th possession, Llewelyn and Co. burned the McCluer defense when he launched a 40 yd. TD pass to a wide-open Mike McAuliffe on the sideline. A pass from Kevin Sullivan to Frolichstein gave SLUH the 2-point conversion and a 14-6 lead. McCluer immediately fumbled the ball back to the Jr. Bills, and Llewelyn wasted no time as he hit Frolichstein with a 22 yd. gain. He took the ball over from the 1 on a QB sneak as SLUH built up a 21-6 lead at the half as the extra point was successful.

The defense stumped McCluer in the win as a spirited effort at the beginning of the 2nd half. Llewelyn fumbled the ball away on the Bills' first possession, giving McCluer control at the Jr. Bill 22. The Comets moved the ball to the 8, where they had the ball first and goal. The SLUH defense allowed the Comets only 3 yds. on the next 3 plays, forcing a 4th and 5 situation. The Jr. Bills ended the threat by dumping the McCluer quarterback 5 yds. deep in the backfield. The offense did not sit on the lead, however. Eric Clark picked up 31 yds. before he was hauled down by a touchdown saving tackle. The offense continued to execute brilliantly and finally buried the Comets with a 12 yd. TD pass to Bob Frolichstein, who played an exceptional game despite wearing a semi-cast that covers his right hand and forearm. The extra point was successful and gave the Bills a commanding 22 pt. lead.

"Eric Clark is not an outside back," said Paul Martel Friday Afternoon. "We do not have a back who can get outside." A very deceptive strategy indeed! Clark ran inside, outside, and any other way around the McCluer defense as he piled up 108 yds. in 13 carries. Clark was the spark to a rejuvenated SLUH offense as the improved running attack opened things up for the air attack. On the defense, linebacker Jon Savoy dropped enemy ball-carriers 17 times, tops for the defensive unit. CB Mike Noble came up with an important interception in the first half that halted a McCluer scoring drive.

Tonight, the Jr. Bills play CBC at Busch Stadium. The offensive line is the basis of the entire offense.....
