The 1982 Cross Country team, under the leadership of rookie coach Mr. Goeke, has finished impressively in all three meets it has run thus far. In a tri-meet versus Ladue and Parkway West, the varsity squad finished second, only 3 points behind a very tough and highly rated Ladue Squad. Tri-captain Pete Palumbo set a course record (16.14) for the 3.1 mile Aviation Field course. All of Coach Goeke's "solid top seven" runners (Palumbo, Tom Whalen, John Buerkert, Joe Wagner, Gene Kaiser, Tim Martin and Joe Griffard) had times below 19 minutes.

The following week at Fox High School, the race began without our varsity runners due to a time mix-up. The varsity runners, however, did run in the JV race, grabbing 7 of the top 10 placed. John Buerkert, Tom Whalen, and Joe Wagner finished 1st, 2nd, and 3rd respectively. Tim Martin (5th), Bill Reinicke (7th), Joe Kardos (8th) and Jerry Gibbons (9th) rounded out SLUH's top ten scoring. Mr. Goeke concluded that this race also run against Festus, Vianney, and Affton on a very wet course would have been "a probable victory for both the JV and Varsity had it not been for the mix-up and the rain.

At the Pattonville Invitational 4 days later, SLUH finished second out of 15 teams, again only 3 points from the 1st place team, Pattonville. Pete Palumbo shattered the previous course record with a time of 17:56 min. John Buerkert and Joe Wagner each finished 1st in their respective varsity "heats". Joe Griffard came from behind in his heat to finish 3rd, thus ensuring 2nd place for the varsity squad.

The JV team finished 5th out of 15 teams at Pattonville, with Jerry Gibbons (6th place) and Joe Kardos (9th) placing high with very impressive times, 20:44 and 20:53, respectively. Both squads ran against Chaminade Tuesday and both won; however, the results were not yet available at this writing.

This Saturday the team will run in the very important Hancock Invitational. Coach Goeke believes the team can place well, and as for the season, he says that this team has the "best chance since the '72 team of going beyond the districts in playoff compet it on." ——Drew Nachowiak
