



V-Footbills Destroy Kirkwood Pioneers

The Jr. Bills journeyed to Kirkwood Friday night and came home with their second victory and a top 10 ranking. The team had encountered problems with Kirkwood in the previous two seasons, but SLUH turned it around by soundly defeating the Pioneers 23-7.

The keys to the game were the positive performance of the offense and the defense's success in shutting down Kirkwood's new run and shoot offense.

Junior Jason Dulick was undoubtedly the player of the game both offensively and defensively. Jason scored two touch-downs and intercepted three passes, boosting his total interceptions to four for the season. Dulick commented, "I thought it was a total team effort, and the team came together during the critical situations."

Coach Kornfeld commented about Dulick, "He had the game of his life. I know another guy will step in and do the same thing in the weeks to come." Dulick caught three passes for 62 yards. One 8-yard catch capped a 62-yard drive for the Bills to boost their lead to 17-0.

Coach Kornfeld felt that Quarterback Steve Schnur's passing had improved. He was 10 of 18 for 182 yards. One reason for his success was that the offensive line allowed him to throw the ball well all night.

Another offensive weapon, junior running back Jesse Motton, rushed for 76 yards. To round out the scoring, senior Doug Jokerst scored on a five yard run late in the fourth quarter.

The Footbills' next battle is their home opener against University City tonight at 7:30. The team is anticipating another

Harriers Win Southpaw, Eureka Invitationals

The Harrierbills' season finally got under way and in fine fashion. Last Saturday, the seven man varsity squad defeated a tough Webster Groves team by one point.

In the Southpaw Invitational at Jefferson Barracks Park, Sean Lock, in his first cross country race ever, took first place with a speedy 16:48. Strong second halves of the race helped Jim Spies (18:27), Kurt Moellering (18:42), and Mark Fagan (18:56) to place 5th, 9th, and 12th, respectively. The J.V. team followed suit by romping over the competition and taking the first four places. Sophomore Gene Marshall paced the team with a time of 18:33 for 1st, followed by Dan Dorsey (18:58, 2nd), Matt Heebner (19:01, 3rd), and Ryan Fagan (19:02, 4th). Both victories prompted Coach Linhares to comment, "We were as tough as nails."

Depth has defined this team from the start and the Harrierbills surely displayed

this Tuesday at the Eureka Invitational. After being snubbed last year by Lafayette, the varsity squad went into this race looking to beat them, man for man.

Once the race started, however, it was evident that Fox was the stronger of the two opponents, but Fox wasn't strong enough to match the Jr. Bills, as the varsity placed four runners in the top 15. Sean Lock won again, improving to a 16:33 time. Jim Spies, Gene Marshall, and Mark Fagan all joined the 17 minute club with times of 17:42, 17:47, and 17:51, pacing the team to a 6 point victory over Fox, recapturing the title SLUH won two years ago.

The J.V. team ran over their opponents again. The junior Harrierbills repeated Saturday's performance by taking the first four finishes; Jeff Bierling won with a time of 10:01 and Tim Probst followed close behind with 18:11, plac-
