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

The RISS Family

Teachers from RISS have travelled across cities, countries and schools and they all have something in common to say about this school; they call it 'The RISS Family'! Whilst international teachers come and go, some teachers have stayed at RISS for nearly two decades. **Ms. Libert**, an ESL (English as a second language) teacher, has been with this school for 18 years. She arrived in 2002 and watched the school grow from the ground up, from even before the RISS junior and senior campuses had been constructed. She has also watched The RISS Family grow and learn. Another member of The RISS Family who has been at the school for nearly a decade is **Mr. Stewart**. He works as head concierge, dealing with the ins and outs of the school. He has seen the interaction of students and their development at RISS. In this article, I will take you through their journeys and the role they both played in the development of The RISS Family.

When **Ms. Libert** first started as a supply teacher in 2002. She worked hard and nonstop to pursue her dream of becoming a teacher. As time moved on at RISS, she was offered a full-time teaching position. She has worked here ever since.

What do you love most about teaching?

The best part of being a teacher is the opportunity to work with students. Each student is different and special. The best part of the day is when I see my students, because they inspire me to be a better teacher. I have a lot of fun with them. I make teaching fun in my class as I believe this brings out the best in the students. I do this by coming into class with a positive attitude. This allows me to bond with the students. They feel comfortable and all topics are safe. I love having a good relationship with the students on a personal level. The fact that I get to know my students well, allows me to have more of a personal relationship with them. The most important part of being a good teacher, I feel, is helping create good people, who are kind, grow up to be responsible and have a good heart.

Do you have any fun stories/experiences working at RISS you would like to tell?

The best memories of RISS never get old. I've had 'tears of joy' experiencing these wonderful moments. Such as when I watch a student whom I have known since foundation year move up through the grades. Watching them pass the IB and seeing them grow and develop into young adults. The best story is when I pass some of my old students in the city and see them with children of their own. That truly brings 'tears of joy'. This feeling has made me continue to work harder and better.

The second teacher who has witnessed the RISS community grow from the inside and outside is **Mr. Stewart**. He is originally from Scotland and is the head concierge. He interacts with the students when they first visit the school and gives them a good sense of the school community. He is special to us because of his unique Scottish humour and I believe every student/teacher who works here knows exactly what I mean. If you are a parent/student who hasn't arrived at the school yet, you will easily recognise Mr. Stewart.



What do you love most about your job at RISS?

Seeing students graduate and blossom. I was offered to work here as the head concierge and to help maintain the school. What I do here at RISS is focus on the maintenance of the school. Fixing problems that arise. I work inside the school, fixing things such as chairs, tables and whiteboards. Outside, I check for problems with the roof or other issues. It's more hands-on work. I really do everything at the school that anyone needs help with. For instance, I also help out when there are not enough substitutes. I help fill in the work. What I love about this job compared to other options is that, at a school, I am able to joke around, have fun, celebrate and witness true growth. My favourite part of the year is the gala, celebrating the end of the year with the students. That is truly amazing.

What has made you stay at RISS for all these years?

The experience of interacting with students and seeing them grow. The atmosphere at this school is different from the other schools. It is also very different from the school I went to. I would love to have been taught in this school. I wish my kids could get the love and support kids get here at RISS. It is a good experience to work with the school family, to see students graduate; all that is very satisfying to witness. I like to get to know the students on a personal level. I would describe that as my job satisfaction. It's such a great job... working and talking with students and teachers who make me laugh at least once a day, enjoying the open and fun atmosphere. I love to joke around and make it fun.

Principal For A Day

Amazing ideas have always been an essential element within the RISS School Council. RISS wondrously entertained the idea of 'Charity Day' that included an obstacle course, bake sale, movie night, and a secret auction – for the purpose of raising money for KiKa (Kinderen Kankervrij, or Children Cancer-Free), our chosen school charity. One of the most valued prizes of this secret auction was the chance to win being principal of RISS for a day – and Hugo Ferguson, a grade 7 student, was the lucky one to win this opportunity. I was fortunate enough to secure an interview with him and his thoughts have left me awestruck.

6 questions for Hugo Ferguson

Q: Can you tell me a few things about yourself?

A: My name is Hugo. I am half-Slovak, half-Panamanian and I have been living in the Netherlands for 13 years.

Q: Could you describe the process of you achieving the position of the principal? What was it like?

A: Well, it all started in a school auction. The prizes were in a box so no one knew what they were bidding for. And I won the prize to be the principal for a whole day! It was really interesting, and it showed me our principal's daily routine.

Q: Could you walk me through your day?

A: I observed the lessons of my classmates in grade 7, walked around the senior campus with Mr. Stewart to check facilities, sent an email to the school community, had a meeting with Mr. Ruitenberg (to make financial requests), had lunch with staff and prepared a speech for them! It was quite a busy day, but very interesting and rewarding.

Q: Did you have any peculiar experiences? Or gain insight into any specific skills or experiences that felt like an eye-opener?

A: A definitely 'strange' experience was observing my class's lesson, because I saw the lesson from another point of view. An eye-opening experience was definitely meeting with the financial director because it's an aspect of running a school that we usually don't really think of in such detail.

Q: Did you receive prior help from your teachers?

A: I received lots of help from Ms. Charline, especially with the planning and the scheduling of being principal. Without Ms. Charline's help, I don't think the day would have gone as well and as smoothly as it did!

Q: How do you feel now and would you do it again?

A: I would definitely do it again, it was a really great experience and I learned so much about our principal's responsibilities.

Interview with a Former Student

Hi Edith, thanks for agreeing to talk to us. How are you doing?

I am doing fine! I am just navigating through university. It is tough, but I am doing okay.

What are you doing now?

I am currently studying for a bachelor's degree in Applied Medical Science at the University of Swansea in Wales, in The United Kingdom. I am studying this in order to become a doctor.

Why did you decide on this study?

Medicine is a career that merges my love for science and my love for taking care of people. It is a constantly-changing field and I like being at the forefront of science. Furthermore, it is very hands-on; you get to talk to patients, work with them and treat them. I really like that aspect of medicine.

How are you experiencing it so far?

So far, it has actually been easier than I thought it would be. The IB really prepared me well for university, so my first year has been laid-back.

If you could use three words to describe your time at RISS, what would they be?

That is a very tough question haha. I think I would say insightful, challenging and joyful. Actually, my time at RISS was pretty good. I enjoyed my time in high school. It taught me a lot of things. It really felt like a community, weirdly enough; I became very close to the teachers and the staff. I felt very welcome. Looking back, I had a great time.

What is your best memory of RISS?

The Ameland Trip during grade 11, for sure!

How would you describe your journey through university?

Like for most university students, the change from high school to university was not easy for me. It is difficult to find your way around, since you really do not know what to do with all the freedom that you get. However, after a couple weeks I found a balance between the freedom I had been granted and the time I had to manage. I know I am only a first-year student, but you learn pretty quickly.

What is the main difference between university and high school?

The freedom, definitely! There is a lot more freedom in university. Which you do not expect, coming out of a high school like RISS. You do not have a tight schedule like at the IB, where they set the deadline, tell you when you have to hand in the draft, and have revision week. Also, when you need help, the teachers help you. You can always send an email and they answer mostly immediately. At university, your professors do not answer after 5 p.m. And you can call yourself lucky if they reply the next day. According to university policy, professors have three weeks to respond, so you really are on your own. Your classes are very big, so you cannot go up to your professor to ask a question all the time. Some might call this freedom in a good way, however others might see it as a hard way to learn to manage your time.

What is the most important thing RISS taught you?

The most important thing RISS taught me is probably how to manage my time well. I have also learned not to underestimate myself. RISS taught me there is value in what I do. I would say RISS taught me to be confident.

If you could give students from RISS one tip, what would it be?

Throughout the IB career and university, manage your time really well and make sure you do what you love. Make sure you like all the subjects you take. You have the opportunity to choose them and you have the opportunity to choose your degree at university. The second you do something you love, you will not feel like you are working and it feels like time is flying by.





The Great Reset

We are living in odd times. For the youngsters among us and those who have never consciously experienced global times of crisis, the Covid-19 pandemic is something that both frightens and mesmerizes us. Is this a wake-up call due to our ludicrous lifestyles? Is this karma for the way our abundant lifestyle has led to climate change? Is this a sign that capitalism is outdated? That the earth is overpopulated? Now, I am no expert, nor can I speak out of experience. I am also not a fortune teller – but simply a rookie of this world, like many others, trying to find meaning in this crisis and wondering: now what?

In these days of isolation some of us (hopefully) are starting to grasp the absurdity of our lifestyle in the Western world as we reflect on what is truly meaningful in life. Indeed, the Covid-19 pandemic could finally wake us up from the illusionary, idealized and perfect life we are told to live. What do I mean by this? We spend our days dictated by the clock, sticking to a tight schedule so as to not waste a single minute of our time, in order to brag about how productive we are. We prioritize our 'must-dos' before more meaningful activities like exercising or practicing our hobbies, for fear of being judged as too dreamy, lazy and flippant in the eyes of society.

We live in a society of individualism where we are told to strive for self-reliance and independence because it supposedly represents that we've 'made it'. We do things, dress and look a certain way, to fit in with what's 'normal' or 'trendy'. Then, almost everything we buy is imported – such as clothes, food, furniture and even basic household items – and we hereby forget about the impact of this on our local producers and the environment. Finally, every day, we enjoy the benefits of our well-functioning public sector, but we never really take a moment to value the social service employees. Hence, while we are living a pretty comfortable life, we are overlooking what is truly important: our well-being and that of the world around us.

Now, most of us are at home; some are bored, some frustrated by the situation, some are happy to get to wake up a little later than usual, some have picked up new skills and others have adopted a pet. The point is that this time at home could be a time of self-reflection and to tackle some issues. A time in which we can reprogram our brains to think differently in the future. Like I said: a big reset.

For the first time in a long time, we have regained control over our schedules. The time at which our alarm goes off in the morning is no longer dependent on the timetable of public transportation. As a result, parents with busy jobs are having breakfast with their children on weekdays for the first time. We no longer need to constantly check our watch to make sure we are on time for our next appointment. We can plan days (to some extent) the way they suit us and our biological clock. We can finally tackle that renovation we never found the time and energy for. We are picking up a new and healthier diet as we suddenly have to eat all three meals at home. Moreover, with 90% fewer flights, our skies have become clear and quiet. As we sit at home, we also reach out more to our loved ones and those whom we had

It also shows that capitalism as we know it today is an unsustainable model - seeing as in the US, for example, it was incapable of providing decent healthcare for everyone, as some people could not even afford to be tested. Moreover, this pandemic has yet again exposed the cost behind maximizing efficiency and profits, such as the environmental damages from traveling and international trade. And, finally I'm thinking; what will happen to those atrocious Chinese wet markets? Are we going to tackle the issue at its root and ensure these markets close or will we turn a blind eye because we fear that we cannot fight the superpower that China has become?

We do not have answers to these questions, but from now on, let's be more conscious of our actions. Let's enjoy precious moments of pure happiness. Let's not let our jobs dominate us. Let's buy more local products and think twice before we purchase anything 'made in China'. Let's work hard, but also take some more time off to exercise, spend time with family and friends and cook nice meals.
