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

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#### **Schools Stand as Lighthouses of Their Communities**

I believe schools should be seen as lighthouses of their communities. They stand as beacons of learning, familiarity, safety, friendship and enlightenment. And so it was no small decision to close campuses to students and pivot to distance learning models as the COVID-19 pandemic threatened to overwhelm local health care systems.

Educators throughout Orange County have done a remarkable job of using every resource at their disposal to connect with students, provide academic stability, maintain equity, and offer emotional support during the worst public health crisis of our

lifetimes. They took up the challenge to ensure that spring 2020 wasn't a lost semester, but rather an opportunity to pursue meaningful distance learning. Yet we know nothing can rival a modern classroom, where students can learn face-to-face from a highly qualified teacher and collaborate with peers. We also recognize the vital role schools play in promoting socialization, nutrition, mental health and physical activity, and it has always been our intent to reactivate our community lighthouses.

With that in mind, the Orange County Department of Education and school districts across our county worked diligently to develop recommendations and assumptions to help reopen more than 600 schools in a safe and responsible manner, pulling in guidance from local, state and national health experts. "Orange County Together: A guide to safely reopening schools in the COVID-19 era" was released in June as the product of multidisciplinary collaboration from staff members who oversee educational services, health, business services, human resources, and maintenance and operations divisions throughout Orange County. Its development was also supported by representatives from the OC Health Care Agency, CHOC Children's and UCI.

This resource cannot address every difficult decision that administrators will face in the weeks and months ahead, and it will not supersede local


decision-making. Ultimately, the 28 school districts of Orange County will be responsible for determining their own plans under the leadership of their locally elected school boards and superintendents. However, our recommendations are based on a common set of principles, which are as follows:

- Orange County public school districts are working toward a resumption
  of in-person instruction beginning in the fall semester. In-person
  instruction will likely be integrated with and complemented by online
  learning options.
- Orange County public school districts are collaborating with the Orange County Health Care Agency and following guidance from the California Department of Public Health to plan reopening in a safe and coordinated manner.
- Orange County public school districts are developing innovative approaches to scheduling that may differ from traditional scheduling in the early stages of reopening, to address the need for physical distancing.
- Orange County public school districts are communicating regularly with families and community partners to develop collaborative and coordinated approaches to education.
- Orange County public school districts are monitoring developments daily and will make adjustments to plans as circumstances warrant.

With recommendations for classroom space, cleaning, food service, promoting healthy hygiene and other areas, this site should be considered a guide for districts, in concert with stakeholders, to make decisions that best meet their local needs.

It should also be seen as a living resource, because we know new circumstances are likely to arise that will require us to rethink assumptions and modify plans. But make no mistake, this roadmap to recovery leverages an array of collective knowledge with the goal of returning students to safe, welcoming and equitable learning environments.

Just as significant, it represents our commitment to moving forward, together.



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

#### **Humanity has No Barriers**





The 2019-20 school year was one of the most challenging educators have ever experienced: a global pandemic, the historic shuttering of school buildings, and an overnight transition to distance learning. I could not be more proud of our phenomenal educators and support staff who worked diligently to ensure that our GGUSD students and families were supported during distance learning.

District leaders are working around the clock to develop reopening plans that meet the needs of our community and adhere to county and state guidelines. Through a survey mailed to every home and Stakeholder Task Force with nearly 200 employees, parents and students, our reopening plans will be guided by the feedback of those we serve.

Currently, school principals are analyzing their survey data, potential enrollment numbers, and available space following county and state distancing guidelines. Each school team will develop its own site specific plan based on building capacity and the needs/preferences expressed by their school's families. During the 2020-2021 school year, GGUSD will offer three learning options including: 1.) students attend in-person class all day; 2.) a hybrid model of some in-person class and distance learning; and 3.) a Virtual Academy which will be 100% online learning led by a teacher via video and virtual lessons with opportunities for tutoring on campus.

GGUSD is developing robust health and safety plans and has ordered personal protective equipment (PPE) for all sites. Our emergency response plans will include protocols that must be followed when an individual develops COVID-19 symptoms or tests positive.

We thank our community for their continued patience as we work to ensure a safe start to the 2020-2021 school year with educational models that equip students with the academic and personal skills for lifelong success. That's the Garden Grove Way!

Six years ago, Sue Williams an adaptive physical education teacher at Westminster High School, introduced Unified Sports to promote acceptance and inclusion through sports. A Special Olympics program, Unified Sports provides students with and without intellectual disabilities opportunities to practice and compete on teams together. As the program took shape, Williams noticed a camaraderie building between students of all talents and athletic abilities.

"Not only do all Special Olympics athletes deserve the same access to competitive sports as their peers, but the social interaction and the campus-wide spirit of inclusion that Unified

Sports fosters can change an entire school culture," said Williams.

It also adds perspective to students who participate as coaches or teammates that sports are more than a scorecard or stat sheet. Sports can be universal language of teamwork and togetherness.

For some parents "who discover early in their child's life that their learning experience is going to be very different, there is a bit of grieving that takes place as the dreams they had for their child to be a part of a sports team dies," Williams added. "Unified Sports gives life to that dream that was thought to be dead "

The Unified Sports program has a lifetime impact on the students as they develop a greater understanding and appreciation for all people, regardless of how they look or learn. Students realize that they are more similar than different and that they are just teenagers who want to fit in, feel valued, and hang out with friends.

In the fall, I challenged our teachers and staff to build relationships with each other and the students we serve; relationships with personal connections that matter when all is said and done. In the spring, as we transitioned to distance learning, I saw the fruits of that labor. Those relationships were at the epicenter of our response to the complex challenges presented by COVID-19. It was those interpersonal connections that sustained our students and families as we navigated uncharted waters.

There are more unknowns than certainties for the future, but the sun rises every morning, and as long as the sun rises, there is hope.

Our community united in a variety of ways to honor and celebrate the incredible accomplishments of our students and staff during this unique time. We also maintained and expanded our free meal distribution program, providing hundreds of meals a day to our families and community.

Extraordinary challenges remain, but I know that through the exceptional skills of our staff, the visionary leadership of our Board, and the unfailing support from our community, we will meet them and continue to be Better Together!

What an end to the 2019-2020 school year!





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#### The Kid's Guide to Service Projects

The title of this wonderfully helpful resource is directed at children, but Barbara A. Lewis's *Kid's Guide to Service*Projects, Free Spirit Publishing, 1995, is a volunteer guide for any age. The more than 500 suggested projects, ranging in difficulty from caring for a neighbor's pet to getting state laws and city ordinances passed, will appeal to anyone who want to make a difference and earn breathing space on the planet. The projects, all worthy, are described simply and clearly enough to encourage any aspiring humanitarian.

The projects focus on human and animal welfare, community development and safety, the environment, literacy and politics, further divided into 10 categories. In the introduction, Lewis gives short shrift to anyone's claims of not having enough time or that the goals are too involved for any one person to attempt. Instead, she maps out projects for every passion, and invites the reader to send her anything that she hasn't thought of. She then provides a template of 10 steps to make any effort a successful one; gives handy how-tos for pesky paperwork tasks such as creating fliers, writing petitions and press releases, and lobbying for a cause; and suggest seven ways to raise funds.

Anyone who wants to be proactive in solving problems for the community, either local or at large, will find frequent use for *The Kid's Guide to Service Projects*. It will be particularly helpful in the service requirement for graduation from high school; and families, youth and religious organizations, and classroom teachers will all find something to forward worthy efforts. Most of all, lone individuals who feel the need to take action on a problem but may be overwhelmed by the details will be happy to find that Lewis has done the initial organization for them. And that in itself is a great service.

#### **Being Proactive for Cyber Safety**

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, often our kids were on their devices upwards of eight hours per day. What can parents do to keep them safe online and on their cell phones? It seems like more than ever, kids are getting spam emails, calls and texts from unknown sources. This is not acceptable, quite scary and exhausting to try to constantly monitor.

COVID-19 has isolated the majority of us and leaves us with levels of uncertainty, unusual

scariness and frequent loneliness. Individuals are in a vulnerable place, especially our kids. This is the perfect time for sexual predators to approach them as it can come in many forms.

Give your kids a set of online safety rules that they will understand with explanations that they will believe and take to

It's important for you to know which online games that your kids are playing. Many are multiplayer games where several online players can be together playing at once or just watching. These games have text and voice chat capabilities from around the world. This is highly dangerous because people can pretend to be someone else and of a certain age and can expose kids to unsuitable and unacceptable predatory language and content. These individuals can develop friendships with kids and eventually encourage them to meet in real life. It's important to recognize that each game has specific settings which you should check out and change for better online safety.

Remember not only to talk with your kids frequently about staying safe online, but also explain that anyone at any age can be cyberbullied. If a person or group want them to chime in about someone, tell them to ignore the request and don't return to that area and group. Explain why it's so important to think about what they are going to post at any given time or in any area before doing so, to keep their passwords safe, to always log off and not to click on links from people that they don't know. The right thing to do is to report the cyberbullying to an authoritative figure as well. They may just save a life.

You could also take their electronic devices away for a few hours each day, but for those hours that they're on them, rules and guidelines still need to be in place. Even if your kids seem to have level heads on their shoulders and you feel like you can trust them, they can still be sneaky.

It's easy to hide all kinds of online activities from parents with various apps:

Snapchat is a program where people can send images, videos, etc. to friends which will disappear within 10 to 30 seconds. It's pretty popular among teens. The hidden danger is that those "private" moments are not really deleted. They're hidden in files on most phones. Even more devastating and scary is that if someone takes a screen shot, the message, image or whatever can be posted anywhere.

Finsta is a fake Instagram account where anyone can create photos, conversations, etc., staying anonymous and keeping everything private through sharing with a few close friends and can be hidden on devices. But again, just like anything else, if a screen shot is taken, boom, it can show up anywhere online.

Be sure to read about popular apps and arm yourself with knowledge for options that you as the parent can do to help your kids be safe. Below you'll find a few but there's many others that you can find by doing an online search: Instagram, YouTube, Kik, Telegram. TikTok

There's also several phone apps offered to parents to help them monitor their kids' phone and online activities.

For unwanted calls or texts, it's simple to register landlines and cell phone numbers with the office of your state Attorney General's No-Call list for unwanted calls or texts. It's available online, free and will cut down on both. While it does take a few weeks to actually go into effect, it's best to get that done straight away. Do a little research and you'll also find several other government agencies where complaints can be made. Unfortunately, it's not going to totally eliminate them and that is even truer for robot calls. Learning some basic rules to share with your kids can also help.

For example: Don't answer any calls that are not in your contact list. If it's truly someone trying to reach you, they'll leave a message. If they don't, the number can quickly be blocked. The same goes for unwanted texts. The exception in this situation is going to be from "Unknown" or "Private" numbers, which are really hard to trace because no number shows up. However, there are phone apps to help with this. As far as spam email goes, if it's opened, don't click on any links. Look up how to set up filters and teach your kids how to recognize, delete and block it.

As you are well aware, this whole cyber safety situation is extremely exhausting. But, there's no way of getting around it if you're going to be proactive in protecting your children.
