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Not only have I had the opportunity to get to know Mrs. Brennan as a colleague this year, I have also had the absolute privilege of being the parent of one of Mrs. Brennan's students this year. And I will forever be grateful for it. Mrs. Brennan created a classroom environment, "Mrs. Brennan's Rock Stars", that is everything kindergarten should be. The first week of school, her students (4 and 5 year olds!) learned about the "power of Yet!" and perseverance. And she will make sure he knows that. I know she will always, genuinely and with her warm, enthusiastic spirit, love hearing about her student's future accomplishments and experiences. She would drive to my house to help get John ready for school. She encouraged him, loved him like he was her own. She took all my calls when I was feeling down. She helped my son write a poem about my husband and took a picture off the internet to put on the poem. She actually went out of her way to buy a frame for the poem to wrap for me that first Christmas without my husband. The last day of school before Christmas break, my son was sick. The weather was like a hurricane that day. She drove to Taft to make sure I would get that gift from my son. I'm crying writing this and it's 8 years later. She has gone to most of his award nights, graduation, graduation party and many other things. She is not your average Counselor. She is family. I have nominated her before but she was not recognized. I wish I had my original letter because it was just beautiful. I am nominating her again this year since it is her last. This is not how she wanted to leave just like other retirees. In February we were able to give the Board of Education a glimpse of our team at a Board Meeting, and while we were disappointed that the competition was cancelled in March after months of hard work, all three Attorneys are committed to continuing to working with us in the future.
