THE BEST OF E-LEARNING

Teachers made the best of remote learning days. They were in contact with students via email, ZOOM, Google Classroom and Plus Portal. They conducted classes through Google Classroom, as well as face-to-face using ZOOM and Google Hangouts. Our gym teacher engaged students by sending workouts for students to do alone or with their families!

"I enjoyed my eLearning days and loved that I could email my teachers because they were always available. It was fun to see each other via screens," shares Leslie, a rising Sophomore. Leslie was a student of Ms. Ochoa, one of our Math teachers. Ms. Ochoa teaches Freshwomen and Sophomores. Her class included many interactive sessions to keep her students motivated. She used different platforms to engage them, such as FaceTime (with parent permission), Whiteboard and Sketchpad. She started the days by inviting her students to share creative quotes to motivate each other. Ms. Ochoa shares, "This was a good experience where we all found new ways of collaborating with each other and having a sense of humor to make our days brighter."

Although Ms. Ochoa admits that she missed her students on the third floor, she is glad that they came together via a buddy system that she implemented where students encourage one another to stay focused, organized, and help each other solve problems together.

In addition, Advisors reached out to their advisees to check in and help students with updates and progress with homework assignments. They were available for support - either academically or emotionally. The seniors also met with Mrs. Dumas-Gray, our College Readiness Director, in terms of planning and making decisions as to their Fall college plans.

We were continuously in touch and looking for more virtual based learning opportunities to support our students. Though it was a difficult transition for some students (and teachers!), the students finished the school year strong! 93% successfully completed their courses for 2019-2020! We're working with the remaining girls over the summer to complete their missing coursework. Tepeyac leaves no one behind.

Tepeyac kicks off Summer with GREAT Summer Reading Novels!

At Tepeyac, we take our books seriously. We care about social issues, and believe in educating ourselves about issues through complex characters. From Starr Carter in The Hate U Give and Emoni Santiago in With the Fire on High to Hermione Winters in Exit, Pursued by a Bear and Julia in I am Not Your Perfect Mexican Daughter, Tepeyac's Summer Reading 2020 has books filled with passionate female protagonists that experience life in the 21st Century with pride in their roots and hope in their souls. We want our students to understand how the world works, both at home and in cities and countries miles away, and ask questions about how to solve the social issues discussed within the pages.

Summer Reading at Tepeyac ranges in topics from race relations and gender inequality to the immigrant experience in America to mental health struggles to the tragic genocide in Cambodia and memoirs of a child soldier in the Democratic Republic of Congo. These topics are difficult, but they are real, and we believe we must educate our students on the realities of the world and equip them with the skills to help solve these issues, to be a part of the global conversations.
