We are being asked increasingly elaborate questions about quarantine and Leaves, among other things, as you all respond to your own individual situations. On a similar note, there is an inevitable increase in the spread of misinformation, through WhatsApp groups and other channels. They bring their worries to school and their teachers are prepared to explain, at the appropriate grade levels, about health and hygiene, science and eventually in the high school about the spread of diseases. What we won't tolerate is any form of bullying or cultural inappropriateness. We have put sanitizers around the buildings. We support the Ministry of Health mandates.

Non-essential travel will be curtailed until after Spring Break (March 28th) when we will re-evaluate the situation. The Finance team will work through the significant number of cancellations as quickly as they are able. We appreciate that this will feel frustrating but bear with us as the volume is exceptional.

MYP 1 (Grade 6) - <u>Silent (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_an9alryJb8</u>) This video was shown to students with no sound. They were asked two questions: "Can you find the truth in this story?" and "Can you find the beauty in this story?" (<u>Beauty and Truth - Visible Thinking Routine (http://bit.ly/VTRBT</u>) MYP 2 (Grade 7) - <u>Pay it forward (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=PT-HBI2TVtI</u>) Students watched this video in

clips and were asked these questions along the way: "What do you See?" "What do you Think? And What do you Wonder? (See, Think, Wonder Visible Thinking Routine) (http://bit.ly/STWVTR)

MYP 3 (Grade 8) - Lollipop Moment (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_wxjBSaP8Mw) Students were asked, "Are you a leader?" and "What makes you say that?" (What makes you say that? <u>Visible Thinking Routine</u>) (http://bit.ly/ WMUSTVTR)

All grade levels in the Middle School were shown this Kid President video - <u>20 Things we should say more often</u> (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=m5yCOSHeYn4</u>) They were asked, "What do you think we should say more often?"

Message from the High School

On 26th February, the ABA Mathematics Department provided the opportunity for nearly 20 students to participate in the **Pascal** (grade 9), **Cayley** (grade 10), and **Fermat** (grade 11) mathematics contests. These highly-regarded international contests are organized by the Centre for Education in Mathematics and Computing (CEMC) at the University of Waterloo in Canada and involve over 1,400 schools and 60,000 participants worldwide.





Future contests (also organized by the CEMC) are:

- Euclid for grade 12 on 8th April;
- Fryer, Galois, and Hypatia for grades 9, 10 and 11, respectively, on 16th April;
- Gauss, for grades 7 and 8 on 14th May.

Will I be able to decorate an area to represent my culture?

Absolutely. Every culture will be given a space 2-4 meters wide by 1 meter deep along the fence in the pitch.

What time will set up being?

PTA will begin set up as soon as classes on the pitch end. Set up for cultural representatives begins at 2.30 pm.

What happens to the dish(es) I bring to ICF?

They will be placed on a table according to the type of food (appetizer, soup, salad, rice, noodles/pasta, stews/curries, breads, desserts and drinks).

Do I need to bring a serving spoon for my dish?

Yes. Please bring an inexpensive serving utensil.

Do I need to individually pack the food in small portions?

No. In an effort to decrease the amount of waste, plates and eating utensils will be provided to everyone coming so you do not need to individually pack the food.

Do I need to bring cups for the drinks I will serve?

No. PTA will provide tasting cups for all the drinks except water.

Will water be sold at the ICF event?

No. You must bring your own water bottle. Water coolers for refilling will be provided at the event.

Who will serve the dishes?

Either you or one of the volunteers that is serving at that particular table.
