## Message from the Superintendent

Dear Parents,

Our students continue to make the headlines. Those that do will testify that outstanding achievements do not happen by accident; they are the result of much hard work. This is not a new revelation. Many have spoken of this. The most apt in the case of the students shown below would be: "Working hard becomes a habit, a serious kind of fun. You get self-satisfaction from pushing yourself to the limit, knowing that all the effort is going to pay off." (Anonymous).

Back in the spring I was approached by our Computer Science teacher, Leo Tran, who told me that some of his students wanted to break a world record. In short, it meant they would create a computer from dominoes. It sounded fun...but how? Well, they had an idea, determination and support. An extract from Muscat Daily (31.10.18) tells the story.

"A computer is a fascinating piece of technology that can solve arithmetic problems faster than any human can. Instead of making a computer's processor out of electronic circuits, a team of grade 12 students decided to make it out of dominoes.

The team from the American British Academy (ABA) was led by Saaatvik Suryajit Korisepati, supported by Alex Freyer,

Zoltan Sojitory and other computer students.

The team had planned to execute a 5-bit adder which will be able to add any number up to the sum of 63.

The previous world record was a 4-bit adder that could only add numbers up to 31.

With more than six months of hard work and dedication, the team successfully created a new world record by making the first 5-bit adder using dominoes. They used 15,000 dominoes to build the circuit at Bank Muscat headquarters. Commenting on this world record, Saatvik said, "This is a classic example of perseverance and determination. The previous world record was held by an Australian mathematician and his team for a 4-bit adder. We tried for a new world record with a 5-bit adder. We could not succeed in the first three attempts.

"We were not let down by failures. In fact, we learnt something from every attempt. We improved the design and the construction of the circuit which required critical thinking. On October 20, after eight hours of tireless effort, we set the new world record for a 5-bit domino computer."

Saatvik said this would never have been possible without the support and encouragement from teachers and the Parent Teachers Association at ABA who supported the project. "We are extremely thankful to Bank Muscat management who allowed us to use their premises to attempt this world record."

Commenting on what the team plans to do with the tens of thousands of dominoes lying in cartons, Saatvik said, "Our team has decided to donate some of the dominoes to our elementary school to help students learn some simple adders. "A majority of these will be donated to charities that support school children who are less fortunate than us.""

Congratulations to the students and thanks to their teacher and the PTA for supporting this ambitious project. For those of you new to the school, this is the second world record that ABA has held. Do you know the first one?

# Message from the Extra Curricular Program

#### Elementary After School Activities Season One Summaries

Season One Elementary After School Activities have finished and we began our season two activities this week. Below are summaries from the season one activities written by our Activity Leaders.

#### Lego (G2-3)

The students developed their creativity and team spirit by building with Lego. Some weeks they focused on different themes such as space, future homes and monsters, while other sessions were free and children created according to their own interests and imagination.

#### Lego (G4-5)

Lego club encourages budding engineers to design, discuss and build. Each week has a theme such 'Amazing Maze' or 'Musical Monsters'. Children work together to demonstrate their flare and passion for Lego!

#### Scrabble

Scrabble saw some eager students ready to learn about the game. Each week students engaged in challenges that not only allowed them to better understand the intricacies of the game but improve on their own strategic approaches. New words were learned and friends made over the board. The excitement each week was very high as the students shared their word knowledge in this game. Overall, the activity was a lot of fun and a lot of learning.

#### **Movement and Mindfulness**

We made calm jars in the first session which we were able to use weekly to focus on our thoughts and settle our minds. We coloured mandalas to help us calm and focus. We practiced mindful movements including yoga poses and movement games. All these strategies can be used to help us be mindful in our everyday lives.

#### **FUNdamental Fitness**

In this activity, we used the Sworkit Kids app to practice customized workouts that are age-appropriate and fun. All workouts could easily be done anywhere without gym equipment. Our goal was to strengthen our bodies, increase endurance and build stamina for exercise. Way to go for the young athletes!

#### Yoga

The children have enjoyed exercising, stretching and balancing their bodies. They had fun learning about different yoga poses and tried creating their own. They enjoyed holding their breath and making themselves calm by listening to relaxing music for young children. They became more flexible by repeating the exercises a few times each.

#### Arabic Reading Grade (4-5)

Students have read a variety of Arabic books in order to improve their reading skills. They were encouraged to read with confidence and expression. In addition to that they have had different activities and educational games using whiteboards, picture cards and iPads to help them learn new vocabulary and develop their reading and speaking skills.

#### Arabic Art

Students have explored some traditional Arabic arts and crafts. They painted pictures from Arabic culture, decorated small ceramic jars and used geometric designs and Arabic calligraphy to produce beautiful artwork in addition to creating different Arabic traditional decorations.

#### **Girls Football**

This group of girls was highly enthusiastic, keen to learn and just loved football. Weekly practices consisted of ball familiarisation drills, as well as basic dribbling, passing and shooting techniques. Small sided games of 3 v 3 were played during the first few weeks but as their game sense progressed, larger games were also played. The girls made pleasing progress and developed not only their ball skills but their spatial awareness and overall game play. Thanks to two high school students, Jessica and Noor, for their commitment and invaluable help over the course of this activity.

#### **Ball Sports**

This high energy and fun-loving group enjoyed the non-stop action of this activity. Tag games were played for warm-up and this was followed by a variety of different ball games, including football, benchball, basketball and numerous versions of dodge ball. During these games, a high emphasis was placed on sportsmanship, fair play and honesty. This was challenging for some, but most students worked hard to improve these aspects of their play.

#### Benchball

This was an amazing group of players who learned teamwork. They learned that short passes and moving without the ball leads to success. The students showed their excitement by playing competitive games with each other. Their passing and catching skills progressed throughout this activity.

#### **Dance for Fitness**

The dance for fitness crew were energetic and enthusiastic. During this activity, they learned a variety of dance moves and danced along to their favourite songs. Each song had them up and moving, and gave them a good workout. The girls chose their top three songs and spent a few weeks learning the routines, and rounded off the first dance for fitness season by showing off some of their best moves to their parents!







#### **Booster Club**

#### **Student-led Project**

Each week, Grade 1 students would come in from recess with complaints about (Drama Court) playground shenanigans. Often times, complaints went something like this, "And then the 2nd graders wouldn't..." or "This 2nd grade boy wasn't..." Collectively, the Grade 1 teachers couldn't take it anymore. So after a lunch recess tirade, their frazzled educators used our weekly Community Time session to ask one simple question: What do you want to do about it? With a little help from me, a group of 10 boys contacted the PTA to request funds for outside toys because, "There are not enough toys and then we sometimes get lonely [read: bored]" Tashin said. While Hamza added, "...if there are not enough toys for kids to play with they will fight and argue." So after a lot of thinking and working, their appeal was presented in the 27th September newsletter.

But things took a different turn when an envelope appeared on my desk one morning:

"I read your request for funds in the newsletter and wanted to tell you that I think you are amazing! You needed something and went out and found a way to get it. Children who don't give up and find solutions to a problem, grow up to be amazing adults. Don't change! Also, don't forget to thank your teacher for supporting you!"

With that generous contribution, the Grade 1 teachers purchased 80 balls, 24 hopper balls, 12 badminton sets, flying disks, hula hoops, pom poms, and more! (And we still have money left over.) But the learning didn't stop there.

A group of Grade 1 students gave up their recess sessions for a week to come up with rules, label toys, pump up equipment, and organize a storage container.

At last Thursday's Community Time session, the

first grade students celebrated all they had accomplished as a community. They signed a thank you note for their generous benefactor and enjoyed a HUGE play time. This week, the students began sharing the toys with the Grade 2 students who play on the Drama Court and every toy has made it's way back to the classrooms for safekeeping.

It's taken us over 5 weeks to get to this point in time, but the student's sense of empathy and collaborative agency has inspired them to take action.
