Dress Code

We would appreciate it if parents (where necessary) remind their children of our dress code (see below). This is published in the Secondary School, parent and student handbook.

Students are responsible for being neat, clean and dressed appropriately for serious study. ABA does not have a "uniform" but has adopted an established dress code which attempts to provide a sense of school identity, recognize climatic and cultural restrictions, and yet offers some flexibility. Students are expected to take responsibility for their attire based on these codes and come to school dressed in an appropriate manner with a well-groomed appearance.

In deference to our host culture, all clothing should be <i>loose-fitting and plain (*i.e. no embroidery, large logos, excessive rivets, large/numerous pockets, etc.*) **Uniform skirts, shorts or trousers can be either navy blue or khaki materials.**

GIRLS: NO leggings/ jeggings/ tight trousers/jeans/sweat pants

• A (not too tight or short) ABA polo shirt of colours white, navy blue, light blue, and yellow. These are available for sale at the ABA uniform shop.

- Plain navy blue, khaki or beige loose trousers are allowed.
- Skirts, and Capri pants (of above colours) are allowed but <u>must</u> be worn at or below the knee.
- Trainers, sandals, and sneakers may be worn. For safety reasons heels <u>cannot be higher</u> than 5 centimeters and flimsy, unsecured sandals are not allowed.
- ABA, Vipers or plain blue, white, black or grey sweatshirts are allowed during cooler weather or throughout the year.

BOYS: <u>NO</u> jeans or sweat pants

- ABA polo shirt of colours white, navy blue, light blue and yellow are available at the ABA uniform shop.
- During normal school days, plain navy blue or khaki shorts, but <u>must</u> be worn at or below the knee. (Middle School only) High School Boys may wear appropriate shorts on Mufti days only.
- Plain navy blue, khaki or beige loose trousers are allowed.
- Trainers and sneakers may be worn.

ABA, Vipers or plain blue, white, black or grey sweatshirts are allowed during cooler weather or throughout the year.

It is the responsibility of the student to adhere to the ABA dress code. Parents will be notified and requested to bring the appropriate apparel to school or to students will be given alternate appropriate clothing for the remainder of the day.
