Message from the Superintendent

Dear Parents,

Many of you will have seen the principals or me around the campus at the start or end of the day either out the front or at one of two entrances at the back of the school.

It is always a joy to see so many students arriving excited about what lies ahead. And yes, it is common to see that. Only rarely do we not see cheery faces, and then conclude that the student has either not slept well, had a disagreement with someone at the breakfast table or was not feeling well. In general terms, I think it is fair to say that ABA is a school that students enjoy. We hope that the happy faces at the end of the day reflect a good experience.

I regularly see happy parents too though there are occasions when this is not the case. This is usually a result of a traffic issue, whether at the lights or nearer to our campus. Over the years, we have tried to find the best solution for traffic around the school; I believe that it has got better. The safety of everyone and the efficiency of the system are my priorities.

I am pleased to announce that the movement about the parking area between the school and the field should be safer next week. We have completed the path parallel to the school wall and are putting in a new pedestrian crossing. Please would you use these facilities when walking to your car as an example to the students. I trust you will also be happy to know that we are soon to complete work that will provide extra parking. The partial back filling of land near the wadi has allowed us to create about 20 more spaces. This should ease the situation. Nonetheless, please would all parents follow some simple rules that will help ensure low stress levels and a safe environment.

- 1. Please follow the instructions of my staff.
- 2. Please do not use your horn unless in an emergency
- 3. Please use parking spaces when they are available
- 4. Do not leave your car unless it is in a parking space.
- 5. Do not park on the pedestrian crossing.
- 6. On campus, only drop off and pick up in designated areas NOT in front of the Administration Building please.

Message from the University Counselor

Applying to the United States

The US offers 4-year Undergraduate Courses

The US offers a vast range of post-secondary education courses – there are over 4,000 Universities and Colleges in the US Colleges only offer undergraduate degrees and all Universities offer post-graduate qualifications (Masters and PhDs). Students applying to the US will mostly need to complete standardised tests and a language proficiency test to meet entry requirements. While there are some US Universities that do not require the ACT or SAT I for entry, the vast majority still do, and therefore a decision to apply to the US should be accompanied by a determined a approach to studying for the SAT or ACT.

Students applying to the US will normally apply through the Common Application process (www.commonapp.org), which is the most widely used application system in the US. The alternative is the Coalition Application process, which 150 US Universities are signed up with. (www.coalitionforcollegeaccess.org) The Coalition allows for slightly more flexibility in what students can supply as evidence in support of their applications, but they are both equally efficient and user friendly. The good thing is that students get started on the administrative side of their applications in Grade 11, therefore reducing the stress in Grade 12.

Application Requirements

- 1. A completed Common App or Coalition Application, which will include:
- 2. A thoughtful, carefully written essay of 650 words (Titles available on Common App website).
- 3. A school transcript showing semester grades from each subject area from Grades 9 12.
- 4. ACT or SAT I (usually required) + SAT II subject tests (good to have even if not required).
- 5. Proof of Language Proficiency IELTs or TOEFL.
- 6. Predicted Grades of the IB DP or IB Courses.
- 7. At least 2 Teacher recommendations and 1 Counselor recommendation.
- 8. A set of strong extra-curricular activities, summer experiences or ongoing learning where possible.

What does it take to get into a Highly Selective University in the US?

Highly selective universities, which include such colleges as Stanford, MIT as well as the Ivy Leagues (Brown, Columbia, Cornell, Dartmouth, University of Pennsylvania, Princeton, Harvard and Yale) are extraordinarily difficult to get into because the admission rates are so very small (and particularly so for international students). While anybody can apply, it is worth bearing in mind certain essential factors to ensure that the application is not a waste of the admission fee. It is important to know that it is not enough to be best in the class, or best in your school – to be admitted to highly selective universities you need to be 'Best in the World' in a particular area.

- Best to make the university your clear favourite, and apply Early Decision (ED). Ensure you know the college inside out. Visit if at all possible!
- Make sure you already have excellent SAT1s and SAT2s to send in late September or Early October.
 (See www.collegeboard.org for testing dates). 1500 /1600 would be a low cut off.
- Make sure you have taken an IELTS or TOEFL language test (www.idpielts.me)
- Your GPA should be in the region of 6.5 or above your transcript should be predominantly filled with 7s (the odd 6 won't count against you too much)

- Spend your summers learning new courses, skills, or consolidating old ones.
- Decide what your 'Unique Selling Point' or distinguishing skill /virtue is going to be and work to show how that sets you apart from others.
- Read widely and avariciously this is the best way to expose yourself to superior writing that will inform your own style on the Common App Essay.

Meet university counselor to begin to think about what kind of university campus you are interested in; indicate any particular highly selective universities you are interested in. Request a letter of recommendation from 2 - 4 teachers (check university requirements). Make sure you provide a CV or detailed list of achievements. Teachers should be able to speak to both your academic achievement, potential as well as your character.	June - September 2019	Fill out ABA letter of recommendation form. You should note the universities - if highly selective or applying ED or AD you should say what makes you an excellent match for that university.
Start your application through the Common App or Coalition. Begin the first draft of your essay. This will probably need three or four iterations. It is really important so give it plenty of time!	May - June 2019	Share with family or friends for input but tell your own story and tell it from your heart. Do not be tempted to let others have too much influence.
Finish your application and get it in nice and early. The deadline is usually December / January (between Dec 15th - January 15th) but aim to have it completed by October. You will shine simply by being early!	September - December 2019	There is the option to share the Common App with the university counselor and / or another person so they can check it. Pay special attention to grammar and spelling and makes sure every section is filled in with as much detail as possible.

Secret of Ivy League Success?

Jessica Coutinho applied to Columbia College in the US and was accepted this December after a successful Early Decision Application. Jessica knew quite early on that she wanted to study in the US, and she already has a brother studying there, which made the decision even easier. So, still in Grade 9, Jessica really got down to completing some thorough research on the right university for her. She wanted a challenge, and really liked the location of Columbia College, being right on the doorstep of New York. Jessica felt that NY would offer the certain prospect of interesting internships and, perhaps later, some exciting job prospects. She also liked Columbia's core curriculum, which, with its breadth, focus on critical thinking and the requirement of historical reading is very 'IB' in style.



So, knowing where she wanted to go, Jessica focused on providing sufficient academic evidence that she could cope with the tough demands of a highly challenging undergraduate education. Jessica took two SATs, one in December of Grade 11 and the second in March of Grade 11. The March score was 1550 out of 1600, which meant that her application would make it over the first hurdle. There are 8 practice SAT tests on the website; Jessica did all of them, as well as completing Khan Academy questions each day.

Then, Jessica set aside time in her holidays to join courses that would teach her new skills or strengthen old ones. She joined a summer school devoted to debating, at Yale at the end of Grade 9, and then in Grade 10 went to Costa Rica to further improve her Spanish. The summer of Grade 11 was devoted to the reading and writing of two essays (in addition to the Extended Essay that she wrote for the IB Diploma). The first was a piece of research around language development in a specific area between Portugal and Spain; this Jessica was able to get published independently – she was also able to describe her findings in her Common App application. Additionally, Jessica entered another essay for an international Economics competition run by Oxford University in the UK. The essay was so well received that she was invited to attend a celebratory weekend in Oxford, and her essay came 2nd overall. Naturally, an international prize-winning essay would have been of great interest to Columbia admissions also.

So overall, what are Jessica's main points of advice to younger students?

- a) Do very thorough research so you are sure that your top choice universities are exactly right for you, and that you are right for them.
- b) Revise thoroughly and extensively for ACT or SAT.
- c) Keep learning and improving your skills over the holidays.
- d) Find a niche that you love and fully demonstrate your expertise in the area.




