

DEFENSE HOLDS AS BEES  
STOP LADUE, 7-6

Last Friday, the B team journeyed to Ladue where they beat the Rams, 7-6.

The Dees drew first blood as Steve Harrigan capped an 81 yard drive on a 9 yard pass to Bob Hummel. Paul Meara's PAT made it 7-0 and put the Bills on top to stay. A tough SLUH offense led by Chuck Hodapp with 11 tackles and Ted Lucas with 9 tackles and 1 interception then held Ladue off the scoreboard until only 11 seconds left. At that point, Ladue closed the gap to 7-6 on a 4 yard run. The Rams then tried to win by passing for a 2 point conversion, but Steve Stutz knocked down the pass to save the game for SLUH.

"After we had that 81 yard drive, our offense just couldn't get moving and turned the ball over four times," said Coach May. "On the other hand, our defense played strongly and would've had a shutout except for that final lapse."

The Bees, who are 6-1-1, face a stiff challenge today from the Statesmen at Webster Groves at 4:00. The Statesmen are 8-0. Coach May succinctly evaluates the game: "We'll have to play our best game of the year to win. Our defense must continue to play well, and the offense will have to be more consistent."

bottles of other colors often don't.

In these cases the design of the bottle must be studied. If a bottle has a screw-cap, it's easy to tell that it's not very old. Other distinguishing marks are the kind of lip, the way the neck (if there is one) is attached to the base, and any writing that might be on the bottom (like the date).

Father estimated that "some of the bottles might be as much as 150 years old," and he said a few might be valuable.

He noted that bottles with markings are generally more valuable. The names on some of the ones in the library include Milk of Magnesia, Pevely, Judge and Dolphi Drug Stores, Shepherd Faking Powder Co., Farr's Gray Hair Restorer, Omega Oil, Pond's Extract, and Cardui ("The Woman's Tonic").

Fr. Dougherty used to collect bottles when he was a young priest at Regis High School in Denver. He said that "bottle-collecting is a very popular hobby in the West--especially in the old ghost and mining towns." He and some friends "used to go to old mining camps and lumber camps outside of Denver and dig for old bottles."

If you are interested in reading more about collecting bottles, try the book Antique Bottle Collector, one of Fr. Dougherty's favorites.
