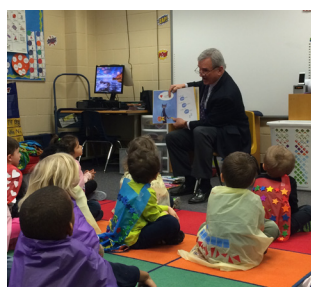

Superintendent Laney Retires



After 39 years in education, Superintendent Laney retired on June 30, 2018. Mr. Laney began his tenure as Superintendent of St. Anthony-New Brighton School District on July 1, 2012. At Mr. Laney's final televised School Board meeting on June 5, 2018, Barry Kinsey, School Board Chair, shared, "As a Board, I want to reflect back to what we have done for learners and think back 6 years ago when we chose you for our superintendent. I think it was one of the best decisions we made. I want to thank you for all that you've done for the school and the community." Laura Oksnevad, Vice Chair, recalled, "As a new school board member, you've been a consistent presence with years of wisdom, a calming presence, and I knew I could ask you questions." Leah Slye, Clerk, shared, "I appreciated your presence in the buildings and with students. You spent time with teachers and kids know you. I could rely on your wisdom and advice, even when you didn't know something right away, you dig and find out. I appreciate your honesty and hard work to help us be who we are." Andrea Scamehorn, Director, observed, "You've built a lot of trust in our community and that has such a huge impact...What you've brought here has really created such a solid foundation. In moving forward, that's a great legacy you leave us."

In an email to district staff, Mr. Laney shared, "During my time here, I have had the pleasure and honor of working with wonderful people who are also excellent professionals. I want to take this opportunity to thank each of you for the great work you do with our young people every day." Mr. Laney shared a story during the last moments of his final televised meeting. "I had a visit today from a teacher I worked with in St. Louis Park who asked, 'So, what is this district like?' I told her it is absolutely unique. Starting with the size, we have 1900 students in the district. The support in the district from the families, the parents, the students, to the senior citizens in this community are absolutely amazing. When you think about 75% of the households don't have students and yet those folks are very supportive of the schools. It really is a phenomenal district. As I've said a number of times, the state's goal is to eliminate the achievement gap and, if there's a place where its going to happen first, its going to be this district. I truly believe that."

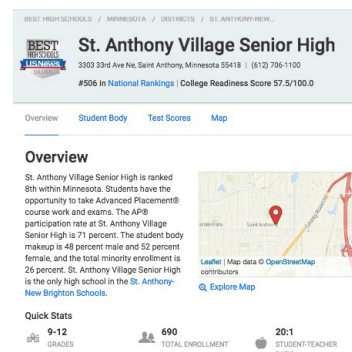

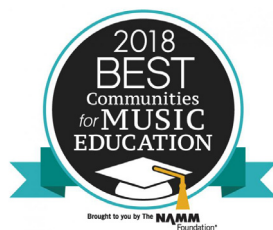


Meet Our Director of Special Education

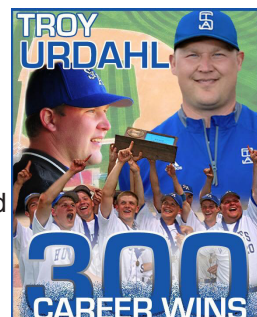
AAA Award Winners

The playground at Wilshire Park is closed this summer. The play structure (slide area) is being renovated and will be ready when school begins in September.

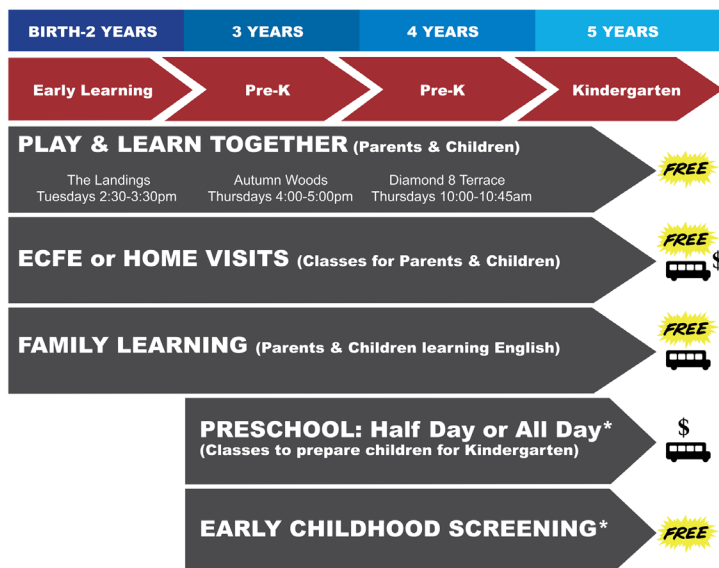
Welcoming Young Families

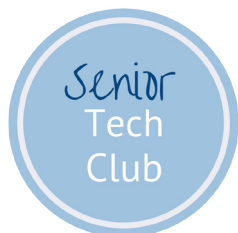

Asbestos

St. Anthony-New Brighton ISD #282 is continuing its efforts to monitor asbestos in district buildings and respond in a cautious and proactive manner. The district will continue with the on-going Operations and Maintenance program, including the semi-annual periodic surveillance of all asbestos-containing materials to ensure that the materials remain in good condition and appropriate actions are taken if the material is disturbed.

The district's on-going efforts related to the management and control of asbestos-containing material is geared toward providing a safe and healthy environment for students, employees, and occupants.

The asbestos management plan and inspection reports are available for review at the individual school buildings and also at the District Office. Lead in Water

Minnesota Statute 121A.335 requires public school buildings serving prekindergarten through grade 12 be tested for lead in water every five years. This statute also requires school districts to make the results available to the public for review and to notify parents of the availability of the information.

St. Anthony-New Brighton ISD #282 is committed to providing a safe working and learning environment for employees and students. The district has developed a lead in water management plan and testing program that complies with Minnesota Statute 121A.335, as well as recommendations from the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) Lead Contamination Control Act (LCCA) of 1988, the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH), and the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE).

Pesticide Use

State law requires school districts to inform parents and guardians if they apply certain pesticides on school property. The law requires school districts that apply pesticides to maintain an estimated schedule of pesticide applications and to make the schedule available to parents and guardians for review or copying at each school office.

The law also requires that families be told that the long-term health effects on children from application of pesticides or the class of chemicals to which they belong may not be fully understood.

Indoor Air Quality

St. Anthony-New Brighton ISD #282 has a management plan in place for indoor air quality which follows the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) Indoor Air Quality "Tools for Schools". Annual walkthrough surveys are performed at all sites in order to look for and plan corrective measures for any potential indoor air quality concerns. The district has appointed an indoor air quality coordinator, trained and certified by the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH). Summer Construction Projects



St. Anthony-New Brighton School District held a special election on September 7, 2017 and voters approved a ballot question to expand Wilshire Park Elementary School. The additions on the east and west sides of the school are funded by the referendum. Once the referendum was approved, bonds were sold, and the proceeds were deposited into a construction budget that can only be spent on additions and improvements at Wilshire Park Elementary School.

This summer, windows are being replaced at St. Anthony Middle School and St. Anthony Village High School. This project removes the windows, which are original to the building when it was constructed in 1961, and replaces them with more efficient windows. The long-term facilities maintenance budget is funding this project. State aid and local levy help provide funding for the long-term facilities



maintenance budget which can only be used to maintain buildings and projects necessary to prevent further erosion of facilities, increase accessibility of school facilities, and specific health and safety expenditures.
