Greetings Community Members,

St. Anthony-New Brighton School District welcomed 1,762 students to the 2012-2013 school year at Wilshire Park Elementary, St. Anthony Middle School, and St. Anthony Village High School.

The first few months of the school year resulted in a number of state and national recognitions that are highlighted throughout the newsletter. Our district received its fifth consecutive school finance award acknowledging our sound financial management, four high school students were recognized by National Merit Scholarship Corporation, and St. Anthony Village High School's Athletics and Activities Department received the National Interscholastic Program of Excellence Award.

We are proud of the recognitions and are grateful for a community that continues to support our schools. To ensure our students receive an exceptional education in the St. Anthony-New Brighton School District, we are developing plans to ensure our district has the financial and curricular resources necessary. On September 22, the St. Anthony-New Brighton School Board held a work session to establish goals for the 2012-2013 school year. The goals are outlined below:

1. Create and implement a comprehensive plan to address the school district's long-term financial needs by March 31, 2013.

2. Establish and implement a comprehensive, multi-year plan to address the school district's technology needs related to student learning and achievement by June 30, 2013.

3. Establish and implement a plan to increase student achievement annually for all students in math, as demonstrated by improved growth scores on the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment by June 30, 2013.

Celebrating the Hennepin Youth Sports Grant Projects

On September 14, St. Anthony-New Brighton School District invited community members, representatives from Hennepin County, St. Anthony Sports Boosters, and the City of St. Anthony Village to celebrate the completion of the Hennepin Youth Sports grant projects. In December 2012, Hennepin County's Board of Commissioners approved the 2012 Hennepin Youth Sports grants and St. Anthony-New Brighton School District was awarded a \$249,000 facilities grant and an additional \$8700 grant for gymnastics equipment. Since December 2009, St. Anthony-New Brighton School District has received a total of \$690,000 in Hennepin County Youth Sports grants.

Each year, Hennepin County provides over \$2 million dollars in grant funds to support facilities that will encourage and expand youth participation in athletics. Grant funds are generated from a portion of Hennepin County sales tax revenue, which is part of the Minnesota Twins stadium legislation, and are awarded by the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners.

The grant awarded to St. Anthony-New Brighton School District resulted in improvements to Wilshire Park Elementary and the Dennison Field complex at the high school. At Wilshire Park Elementary, improvements included the construction of a new soccer field and perimeter fence. At the Dennison Field complex, improvements included the installation of an energy efficient lighting system and a perimeter fence. Support from the St. Anthony Football Parents group and the St. Anthony Sports Boosters made the grant possible by providing matching funds.

St. Anthony-New Brighton School District Receives 2012 School Finance Award

For the fifth consecutive year, St. Anthony-New Brighton School District received the 2012 School Finance Award from the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) Division of School Finance. School Districts must meet qualifying criteria in order to apply for and receive the award. St. Anthony-New Brighton School District was one of forty-nine traditional school districts to receive the award of the 352 schools eligible statewide.

In a congratulatory letter Brenda Cassellius, Commissioner of MDE, explained, "The award recognizes districts for timely submission of... Uniform Financial Accounting and Reporting Standards (UFARS) data and annual financial statement, as required by Minnesota Statutes, as well as having positive fund balances." St. Anthony-New Brighton School District also received this award in 2008, 2009, 2010, and 2011.

National Merit Scholarship Corporation Recognizes Four St. Anthony Village High School Students

Athletics and Activities Department Receives National Award

St. Anthony Village High School's Athletics and Activities Department received the National Interscholastic Program of Excellence Award from Coach and Athletic Director magazine. At the School Board meeting on October 30, the award was formally presented to Troy Urdahl, Director of Activities, Athletics, and Facilities. Superintendent Laney explained, "We are one of two public high schools in the nation who were given this award." St. Anthony Village High School won the award for public schools with less than 1000 students.

Coach and Athletic Director magazine conducted a national search for the best high school sports departments. "We

wanted to identify athletic departments that weren't just about wins, but also strived for perfection in academics, coach certification, participation, etc.," said Kevin Hoffman, Associate editor of Coach and Athletic Director magazine. A panel of judges reviewed nominations based on eight categories of achievements: participation rate, coaches certification, community service, Athletic Director national certification, scholar-athlete status, level of parent participation, sportsmanship, and other noteworthy accomplishments. Hoffman explained the panel received nominations from schools across the country and selected four honorees to receive the award-two awards for public schools and two awards for private schools, based on enrollment size. Hoffman presented the national award to Urdahl and Mr. Terry, Principal of St. Anthony Village High School, on Saturday, October 6, 2012, between the first and second guarters of St. Anthony Village High School's homecoming football game.

St. Anthony Middle School Meets one of the 'Lost Boys of Sudan'

Alephonsion Deng, one of the 'Lost Boys of Sudan,' visited St. Anthony on November 28 and 29. Deng, a 30-year-old Sudanese refugee and one of the authors of *They Poured Fire on Us From the Sky: The True Story of Three Lost Boys from Sudan*, was one of 20,000 boys who were displaced during the Sudanese Civil War from 1983-2005. St. Anthony Middle School invited Deng to speak to students and community members about his harrowing five-year journey to escape the civil war and eventually reach a refugee camp in Northern Kenya where, at the age of twelve, he began his education.

Ginny Kagol, sixth grade social studies teacher at St. Anthony Middle School, invited Deng to St. Anthony and coordinated the two-day event. "We are educating our kids and trying to make sure they are savvy about world issues. We have to be part of the world." On Thursday, November 29, Deng met with, and answered questions from, St. Anthony Middle School students in the morning and St. Anthony Village High School students

in the afternoon. He shared his story of losing his family in the civil war, walking for five years trying to survive searching for water, food, shelter, and safety—and living in a refugee camp for nine years before relocating to the United States. Deng was one of approximately 4000 'Lost Boys of Sudan' who were relocated to the United States in 2001 and lives near San Diego.

Deng also spoke at a free community event on November 28 and donations were accepted for H2O for Life to support the construction of wells in Sudan. This is the fourth year St. Anthony Middle School has been involved in H2O for Life. Kagol explained, "St. Anthony Middle School works with H2O for Life to make a difference. Students learn to give back." After the community event, Deng autographed copies of *They Poured Fire on Us From the Sky: The True Story of Three Lost Boys from Sudan*. A photo of Deng holding his book can be found in the middle school/ high school library.
