Greetings Community Members,

We are proud of the accomplishments of both our staff and students. Throughout this newsletter, you will learn about students coming together to help make their community a better place and staff who go above and beyond to engage students in learning.

We continue to be grateful for a supportive community committed to ensuring a high quality education for all students. In June 2013, Decision Resources randomly surveyed 400 residents in our St. Anthony-New Brighton School District community to

determine community members' perceptions of our school district.

Here's what we learned from our residents:

*94% rated the quality of education in our district as good or excellent.
*90% agreed or strongly agreed to the statement "I trust St. Anthony-New Brighton Public School Board and Administration to do what is right for children in this district."

*88% agreed or strongly agreed to the statement "Our community receives a good value from its investment in local public schools." *92% rated the job performance of our teachers and instructional staff as good or excellent.

*78% indicated the School District newsletter was a major or minor source of information about the schools.

Of the residents who were surveyed,

*66% have lived in the District for 11 or more years.

*49% were ages 55 and older.

*75% do not have school-age children living at home.

We believe a strong school district contributes to a healthy, vibrant community and realize we cannot do this work alone. The combined efforts of thousands of staff, parents, and community members make St. Anthony-New Brighton School District a special place. We recently recognized an extraordinary individual who has helped shape our School District and were honored to serve with him. Dave Evans attended his final Board meeting on December 17, 2013, after fifty years of service to the St. Anthony-New Brighton School District community as a teacher and School Board member. Dave Evans: 50 Years of Service After fifty years of service to St. Anthony-New Brighton School District, longtime

resident, teacher, and School Board member Dave Evans will complete his final term on January 6, 2014. Evans was hired at St. Anthony Village High School in 1961 where he taught for 32 years and served as head wrestling and assistant football coach. In 1996, Evans joined the School Board of St. Anthony-New Brighton School District. During his tenure on the School Board, Evans utilized his experience as a teacher to help focus discussions and decisions on what is truly best for students.

Evans was formally recognized at the December 3, 2013, School Board meeting. "It was always about the students. That was your highest goal at all times: What's best for our students," said Vice Chair

After retiring from St. Anthony Village High School in 1993, Evans continued his commitment to youth by volunteering at Wilshire Park Elementary School and joining the Golden K Kiwanis Club where he has served as President, Vice-President, and Youth Service Chair. As a former coach. Evans attends most activity and athletic events. Each month, his report at the School Board meeting focuses on particular students that he observed excelling at an activity or athletic event. Troy Urdahl, Director of Activities, Athletics, and Facilities, shared, "Dave has been a powerful voice and representative for all our activities, athletics and educational programs. As a governing board representative for the Minnesota State High School League Board, he has been one of the most visible school board members."

Evans received Northwest Youth and Family Services' 2013 Service to Youth Award, which recognizes individuals who have demonstrated outstanding service and commitment to area youth. Evans' additional recognitions include: St. Anthony Villager of the Year in 2003, North Suburban Gavel Association Award in 2000, named in Who's Who Among America's Teachers in 1992, and District wrestling coach of the year in 1979 and 1980.

Three St. Anthony Village High School Seniors Recognized by National Merit Scholarship Program

Congratulations to St. Anthony Village High School seniors **Patrick Schenkenberg**, **Mitch Andreasen**, and **Danylo Loutchko** who were recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Program, an academic competition that recognizes high school seniors based on their performance on the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) exam taken during their junior year. Each year, 1.5 million students take the PSAT exam and the National Merit Scholarship Program recognizes the top 3% in the nation. **Patrick Schenkenberg** was recognized as a Semi-Finalist, scoring in the top 1% of students in the nation. Semi-Finalists can continue in the competition to become a Finalist and qualify for one of 8,300 National Merit Scholarships which total more than \$32 million. **Mitch Andreasen** and **Danylo Loutchko** were recognized as Commended Students, scoring in the top 2% of students in the nation.

8th graders Blog About Books

Annie Severson, the 8th grade Language Arts teacher at St. Anthony Middle School, expects students to read at least two books every nine weeks. Students select books, read independently, and write about their reactions to the books. With a goal to engage students to write about those book selections in an authentic way, Severson applied for a SANBE grant and requested Chromebooks for use in the classroom. In the past, Severson has given this assignment and students responded by submitting a traditional paper. Now, students are reading books and writing about their reactions on the St. Anthony Book Blog, an online journal where students can submit electronic posts and comment on their classmates' writing. Severson has observed positive outcomes in student engagement as students take ownership of their blog posts. "It's not just feedback from me, but

also from their peers," said Severson, "Students get real feedback on their writing," said Dr. Corneille, Principal of St. Anthony Middle School.

Severson is implementing the Common Core Standards for Language Arts which articulate what is expected of students at each grade level. By asking students to blog about their independent reading, Severson is focusing on three areas--reading independently, purposeful writing, and digital literacy. Students are selecting, reading, understanding, and responding to the concepts in books they select, have an authentic audience for their writing, and apply their learning in a digital manner. The project allows Severson the ability to differentiate instruction and scaffold learning at different levels while students work at their own pace.

One of only 25 markets in the world, BizTown provides students with an opportunity to apply classroom learning and interact in a simulated community and participate in a global economy.

The Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) recently designated Wilshire Park Elementary School a Reward School for 2013-14! Reward Schools represent the highest-performing Title I schools based on results of the Multiple Measurement Rating (MMR). As a Reward School, Wilshire Park is in the top 15 percent of Title I schools in the state. This designation reflects the gains Wilshire Park has made in proficiency, growth and reducing the achievement gap. Wilshire Park identified areas of growth and worked to address the needs of students through interventions and adjustments to curriculum.

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For the fifth consecutive year, Wilshire Park Elementary hosted the largest school-based food drive for Second Harvest Heartland. Organized by the Wilshire Park Parents Association, this year's record-setting event raised \$1,600 and 3,428 pounds of food, a significant increase in both cash donations and non-perishable foods. The 2012 event raised just over \$1,100 and 2,400 pounds of food.

St. Anthony-New Brighton School District's Preschool **Rated Four Stars by Parent Aware**

The preschool programs at St. Anthony Community Services were awarded a Four Star Rating by Parent Aware, a voluntary program of the Minnesota Department of Human Services and Minnesota Department of Education. To receive a rating of four-stars--the highest possible--St. Anthony Community Services demonstrated its guality early education programs and use of best practices to support school readiness. St. Anthony-New Brighton School District has a long history of providing quality early childhood programs including Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE), half day preschool, and all day preschool classes at St. Anthony Community Center. The preschool teachers at St. Anthony Community Services collaborate with kindergarten teachers to ensure children are prepared academically and socially when they begin kindergarten at Wilshire Park Elementary School. St. Anthony Community Services Preschool is the only Four Star rated program in St. Anthony. "To earn a Four Star Rating, programs are excelling in the use of best practices in preparing kids for kindergarten," as stated on the Parent Aware website.

St. Anthony Village has begun a Safe Routes to School planning process for Wilshire Park Elementary School. Safe Routes to School programs improve safety, reduce traffic, and improve air quality near schools.
