Dear Community Members,

As the 2013-2014 school year comes to an end, we are celebrating the 145 seniors in the Class of 2014. "I am proud of our staff and students and their successes throughout the school year--from our youngest learners at Community Services to Wilshire Park Elementary, St. Anthony Middle School, and St. Anthony Village High School," said Superintendent Bob Laney. The School Board recognizes students for their accomplishments throughout the year and has a longstanding tradition of asking students to introduce their family members following their recognition. Our District realizes the positive impact families have on a child's education and this tradition acknowledges this partnership and support.

Here are a few updates we wanted to share about the 2014-2015 school year.

Implementation of All Day Kindergarten at Wilshire Park

Wilshire Park Elementary School will offer free, all day kindergarten in the 2014-2015 school year. The 2013 Legislative session provided funding for school districts in Minnesota to implement all day kindergarten. In February, the School Board approved a plan to provide all day kindergarten to resident students in September 2014. The approved plan will use reserved capital funds to renovate the existing Media Center into three spaces to provide two additional kindergarten classrooms and accommodate the Media program. The Media program will move to the northern one-third of the current space and have direct access to an expanded computer lab. Renovations to the Media Center began in June and will be completed by August 12, 2014.

Board Faced with \$425,000 Budget Deficit for 2014-2015

A projected deficit of \$425,000 for the 2014-2015 school year led the School Board to approve a plan to reduce expenses in the 2014-2015 budget. The impact of minimal state funding has resulted in budget deficits two years in a row.

The preliminary 2013-2014 school year budget also had a projected deficit of \$449,000 in the general fund. The Board decided to utilize a portion of the unappropriated general fund balance to absorb the deficit instead of pursuing budget reductions for the 2013-2014 school year. Board Chair Leah Slye explained, "The Board made a conscious decision to use some fund balance in order to avoid making cuts for the 2013-2014 school year. That conscious decision decreased our fund balance. This was one-time money we chose to use during a period of significant uncertainty about revenues and expenditures, but it did not resolve the deficit."

There has been a history of minimal state funding for Minnesota's schools. State aid (tax dollars from the State) generates approximately 80% of the revenue for our School District. While state aid will increase 1.5% in the 2014-2015 budget, our expenses were projected to increase 3.2%. From 2009-2013, state aid funding increased 3.5%, or an average of .7% per year. The Board approved a plan to reduce expenses in the 2014-2015 budget to help address future challenges. One of the recommended priorities, however, that emerged from our strategic planning committee (see page 3) is to commit to the success of all learners by addressing our long-term financial needs.

MDE recognizes school organizations that exhibit sound fiscal health and financial management policies and procedures with the annual School Finance Award.



Oksnevad Elected to School Board

Laura Oksnevad, who was elected to the School Board on November 5, 2013, and replaced longtime Board member Dave Evans, began her four-year term in January 2014. "We moved to St. Anthony because of the great schools," Oksnevad said. A resident of St. Anthony for over three years, Laura and her husband Bjorn have two children—their oldest daughter attends Wilshire Park Elementary and their younger daughter will start kindergarten in the fall of 2015. "I have a passion for education and I want to continue the positive trajectory of St. Anthony-New Brighton School District," said Oksnevad, who is a Registered Nurse with a background in Prenatal Education. Her passion and interest led Oksnevad to be involved in the St. Anthony-New Brighton School District shortly after they moved into the community. Oksnevad served on St. Anthony's Early Childhood Advisory Council while she participated in Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE) classes with her daughters and currently serves on the Wilshire Park Parents Association and District Wellness Committee.



Charting our Future Direction

St. Anthony-New Brighton School District engaged in a strategic planning process in the Spring of 2014. Over 600 community members and district employees shared feedback in person and online to help determine the future direction of our School District. In February, St. Anthony-New Brighton School District hosted four World Café events—facilitated small group discussions—to collect community input. Over 120 students, staff, community members, and parents shared feedback to four questions with volunteers who collected and recorded all comments. In addition, over 440 people responded to the same questions in an online survey.

The strategic planning committee—a group of 36 community members, parents, students, and staff—reviewed community input, student achievement and demographic data, and district financial information. The committee utilized the data to create recommendations for values, mission and vision statements and priorities for our School District. The School Board approved the recommendations at the meeting on June 17, 2014.

St. Anthony Village High School was awarded a gold medal by U.S. News and World Report in the 2014 Best High Schools rankings. One of only seven gold medal schools in the state, St. Anthony Village High School is ranked 4th in Minnesota and 390th in the nation.

Sixty-two percent of St. Anthony Village High School students participate in Advanced Placement (AP) classes and exams. U.S. News calculated a College Readiness index for each high school based on student participation rates on AP exams and the percentage of those students who pass at least one exam. St. Anthony Village High School's high College Readiness index score resulted in a gold medal award.

Huskies Softball Team Win Consolation at **2014 State Tournament**



The Huskies have qualified for, and placed in, five state tournaments in the past seven years. The Huskies were Consolation Champions at the 2013 State Tournament, took 2nd place at the 2012 State Tournament, secured 4th place at the 2010 State Tournament, and 5th place at the 2008 State Tournament.

Wilshire Park Students Rewarded with a Surprise Concert





Engaging Families and Young Children in Early Education

Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE) teachers are partnering with local apartment communities to develop relationships with families who may not attend traditional ECFE classes. The goal of this outreach into the community is to connect with families and their young children in a location that is close to their home, eliminating barriers such as transportation. "We are helping families learn how they can help their child be ready for, and succeed in, kindergarten," said Anne-Marie Fischer, the ECFE teacher at St. Anthony Community Services who initiated a plan for outreach into the community.

By connecting with families early, ECFE teachers are helping families understand the benefits of early childhood education, the parenting support available in ECFE classes, and critical kindergarten readiness skills that children can learn at home and in preschool. ECFE teachers help engage parents in their child's learning. By introducing parent-child activities which focus on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), ECFE teachers model questioning strategies which help children build critical thinking skills. "We believe early childhood education along with engaging and supporting parents early in their child's life can impact a child's education," said Val Anderson, the ECFE parent educator at St. Anthony Community Services. After developing relationships with families, ECFE teachers personally invite families to attend free family nights, try a morning or evening ECFE class, and encourage families to register for preschool and early childhood screening.

Once a week, the parent-child STEM activities are transported to the leasing office at Diamond Eight Terrace Apartments. Kim Tan, former manager at Diamond Eight, offered her office as an ECFE classroom because of the benefits it provides residents. "Families who don't drive can't attend class at the Community Center. This is convenient for families. We brought the ECFE class to residents." In the second year of this partnership, Tan continued to emphasize the benefits. "We are thankful we can offer this free program to our

families. It provides a sense of community for our apartment community. The more families are connected, the longer families stay in our community." Tan observed parents and kids getting to know one another as residents participate in class. "This is the only opportunity for families to interact onsite, especially if families don't drive —it provides a way to get our community to interact with one another."

When apartments do not have meeting space, St. Anthony's ECFE teachers have worked with apartment managers to find creative solutions in which to connect with families. At Caravelle apartments, the manager has helped teachers deliver activity bags and notes to the apartments with young families.

The manager at Equinox apartments posted information inviting residents to participate in a free Tuesday afternoon class in the Community Room at Culver's Restaurant, next door to the apartment building. "I can help parents understand the importance of ECFE classes," shared Tan. By partnering with advocates in the community, St. Anthony-New Brighton School



St. Anthony Village High School was awarded a gold medal by U.S. News and World Report in the 2014 Best High Schools rankings. One of only seven gold medal schools in the state, St. Anthony Village High School is ranked 4th in Minnesota and 390th in the nation.
