2015 Hall of Fame Inductees

The St. Anthony Village High School Hall of Fame Selection Committee added two alumni to the St. Anthony Village High School Hall of Fame during an induction ceremony on October 9. The 2015 Inductees--**Eric Brever**, Class of 1997, and **Don Siggelkow**, Class of 1976--joined thirty existing alumni in the St. Anthony Village High School Hall of Fame.



Eric Brever is a 1997 graduate of St. Anthony Village High School who has given countless hours to the St. Anthony-New Brighton School District since graduating as co-valedictorian of his class. Following graduation with honors from both St.

John's University and the University of Minnesota Law School, he has worked to be a respected attorney, has been a partner at two successful law firms, and also served the school district as a volunteer football and baseball coach for over 10 seasons. Notably, Brever assisted in securing over \$750,000 in monetary grants for improving our school's co-curricular facilities, and has also mentored students on the Mock Trial Team and Supermileage programs. Brever is a founding member of the St. Anthony Village High School Alumni Association and was a co-chair of the 50th All-Class Reunion for St. Anthony Village High School. Brever also serves the greater community in Minnesota. He coaches high school football and hockey in New Prague, where he lives with his wife and daughter. He has also served on the St. John's University Alumni Association Board of Directors and on the Emma B. Howe YMCA Community Board, and worked with the MSHSL District Football program.

Don Siggelkow is a 1976 graduate of St. Anthony Village High School. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Minnesota and a Master's of Public Administration from Arizona State

University. During his time as General Manager for Administration and Development for the Minneapolis Park Board, he participated in many initiatives for the improvement of Minneapolis Parks, creating concession partnerships, including Sea Salt and Tin Fish restaurants, development of new youth athletic facilities including Neiman Fields at Fort Snelling, Frank Quilici Field and Harmon Killebrew Field. Siggelkow was instrumental in bringing The First Tee, a ground-breaking youth development program, to the Park Board. He currently owns Minnesota Partnerships, LLC, a consulting firm.

Siggelkow served as a School Board member of St. Anthony-New Brighton School District from 2008 to 2015. He has been a baseball coach and commissioner, and a board member for St. Anthony Sports Boosters. He served on the St. Anthony Parks Commission and SANBE Foundation, and is president of the St. Anthony Baseball Association. Siggelkow is also involved in the St. Anthony Alumni Association. He lives in St. Anthony with his wife Helen and two children, Zach and Sammi (pictured above).



Dr. Palmer Elected to School Board

Dr. Cassandra Palmer was elected to the School Board and will begin her four-year term in January 2016. Dr. Palmer and her husband Chris have lived in St. Anthony for over a decade and their sons attend St. Anthony Middle School and Wilshire Park Elementary School. Dr. Palmer, a surgeon who practices at Regions Hospital in St. Paul, recognizes one of the top challenges facing our school district is decreasing the academic achievement gap between white students and students of color. "We need to have kindergarteners ready for school on their first day with equal opportunity and equal access," said Palmer. Through her personal and professional experience, Palmer also encourages the study of S.T.E.M—Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics—for all students, with a particular emphasis on young women.

Physics Teacher Selected as 2015 Finalist



Paul Lulai

Paul Lulai, physics teacher at St. Anthony Village High School, has been selected as a 2015 Minnesota finalist for teachers of science. Recognized for his outstanding teaching and leadership in science, Lulai was selected by Minnesota's committee for Presidential Awards for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST) program.

To be considered for this award, Lulai submitted documentation and a video of a lesson to demonstrate his abilities in the following areas: mastery of science content, use of instructional methods and strategies appropriate for student learning, effective use of assessment strategies, reflective practice and lifelong learning, and leadership in education outside the classroom.

As a state finalist, Lulai's application will be forwarded to a national selection committee to select the PAEMST awardees at the national level. One mathematics and one science teacher from each state will be selected for the Award. Lulai will also be formally recognized as a finalist at the Minnesota Science Teachers Association conference on February 26, 2016.

Nathan Meyer, a 7th grade language arts teacher at St. Anthony Middle School, serves as a leader in instructional integration of technology in his role as technology integrationist. Meyer believes, not only in his students, but also in the role technology plays in accelerating student learning. He uses his classroom set of Chromebooks to engage students in the writing process by

providing timely, directive, and informative feedback. Students are also taught to work on the writing process collaboratively by being part of a Google learning community. "Meyer represents what is great about teaching to students' hearts and heads," explained Dr. Corneille, Principal of St. Anthony Middle School.

Erin Samuels, a second grade teacher at Wilshire Park Elementary School, has been an active member of both the Wilshire Park Technology Team and our District's Technology Committee for a number of years. "She leads staff development programs and collaborates with other teachers in the school to ensure they are providing students the technology skills necessary to be successful,"

shared Kari Page, Principal at Wilshire Park. Samuels has implemented the use of iPads and Apple TV into her classroom and, two years ago, was featured in an article in "The Journal" which highlighted her use of technology and the associated growth of her students.

St. Anthony Village High School was identified by Newsweek Magazine as one of the Top 500 High Schools in the U.S. One of only ten high schools from Minnesota on the list, St. Anthony Village High School was ranked 8th in Minnesota and 403rd in the nation. Newsweek created a College Readiness Index based on six indicators: College Enrollment Rate, Graduation Rate, Weighted AP/IB/Dual Enrollment composite, Weighted SAT/ACT composite, Student Retention, and Counselor-to-Student Ratio.

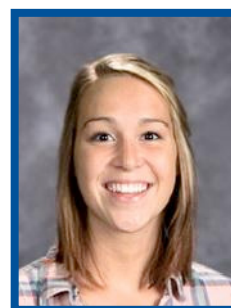

Authentic Learning, Caring Environment

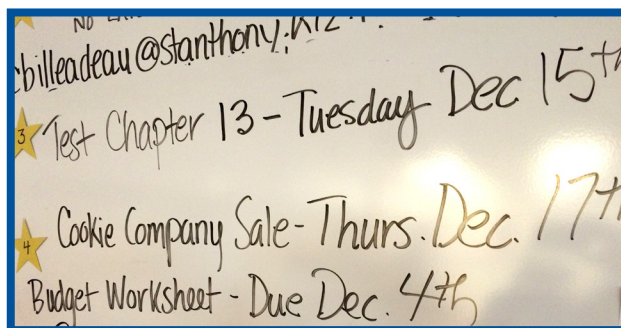
"At St. Anthony Middle School, we believe that all will learn and contribute in a school committed to authentic learning in a caring environment," said Dr. Renee Corneille, Principal of St. Anthony Middle School. This year, St. Anthony Middle School is teaching and assessing their authentic learning and caring environment standards. Here are examples of its implementation.

Caring Environment: Culver's Night



Since the first day of school on Tuesday, September 8, St. Anthony Middle School has enrolled eighteen new resident students and is intentional about welcoming families into their caring environment. The office staff invited all new students and their families to a dinner at Culver's on December 7, 2015, as a way to connect families with St. Anthony and their school community. Seventeen families enjoyed dinner and conversation at the informal gathering with staff from St. Anthony Middle School. A special thanks to Dianne and Steve Sparks, who supported this event and welcomed new families to our community.

Authentic Learning: Cookie Company



In Ms. Billeadeau's Family and Consumer Science class, eighth graders worked in teams to develop a cookie business. This unit is serious business. Students created a business plan, selected a cookie recipe, determined in the cost of the ingredients and labor to produce their edible item in order to establish a price point. On December 17, 2015, students at St. Anthony Middle School lined up in the hallway for the Cookie Company Sale and visited the different cookie businesses operated by eighth graders. Each student was given \$1.25 (in pretend money) to budget and spend on cookies from each company, which ranged in price from \$.75 to \$1.00, and milk for \$.75.



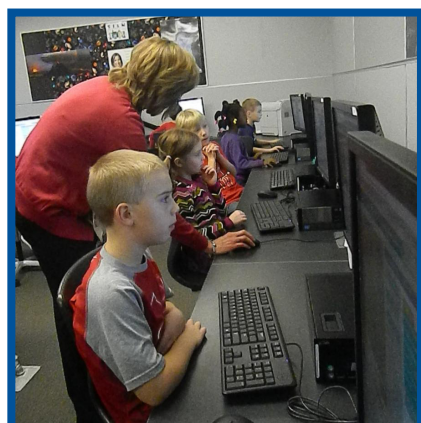

Wilshire Park's 7th Annual Food Drive



Students at Wilshire Park Elementary School donated 2,345 pounds of food and \$1,983 for Second Harvest Heartland during the 7th annual food drive which will provide 8,898 meals for food insecure families. Hour of Code at Wilshire Park Elementary School



To celebrate Computer Science Education week, Wilshire Park Elementary School participated in the Hour of Code to encourage students to get excited about computer programming and help them learn how it impacts our daily lives. Lisa Cartwright, the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Specialist at Wilshire Park, partnered with Code.org—a non-profit organization whose vision is that every student in every school should have the opportunity to learn computer science—to bring the Hour of Code to all 702 students in grades K-5.

What is coding? Coding is the language which creates computer software. By teaching coding in school, students are exposed to problem-solving skills, communication, math and logic skills. Wilshire Park's STEM curriculum includes coding, starting with Bee Bots programming in kindergarten and first grade and Lego programming and Scratch in grades 2-5.

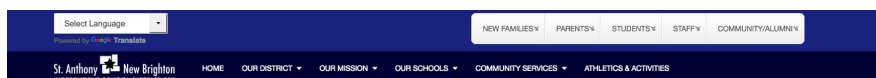

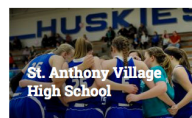
