New Cafeteria

Our food service facility at the middle/high school building, which is pictured on this page, was renovated and has increased the healthy meal options available to students. The new, versatile space has also hosted several concerts, play practices, and community events. The final step of this project is installation of the new floor, which is scheduled for summer

2011. Installation was delayed to allow moisture in the concrete to decrease to proper levels.

Auditorium

Pool Locker Rooms

Our community will notice significant changes in the pool locker rooms which are now equipped with new showers,



and families, and learn about the rich history of each country." Mr. Erickson and Mr. Shafer are excited about "sharing our music with our hosts."



Covillard Earns Perfect Score on ACT Exam




Aleman Selected to Start Tribune's All-Metro Team

"We are continuing our international focus and community service through H2O projects," Scholl explained. In addition, sixth graders explored the idea, "How does a community work?" and spent a full day at BizTown, a simulation program where students are responsible for the operation of an entire city.

PAW Pride

The PAW pride program is about setting high expectations for behavior among students. Students at St. Anthony Middle School are expected to be Positive, Accountable, World-minded, and Safe and "its great seeing them rise to the occasion every day," said Principal Corneille. When staff members observe students displaying positive behavior, they give students a PAW Pride slip.

The middle school chose to measure good behavior by tracking the number of PAW Pride slips and discipline referrals. The goal at St. Anthony Middle School was to have 5 positive slips for every 1 negative; however, the ratio is currently 7 to 1. Since the beginning of the school year, 1180 positive PAW pride slips have been given to students while only 155 discipline referral slips have been distributed. "I am proud of the kids for meeting the expectations of postive, accountable, world-minded, and safe. Even more, I am extremely proud of staff members for acknowledging students when they are meeting those expectations," explained Principal Corneille.
