Thank you in advance for your support of educational excellence here at Lakeview Leadership Academy.



### **Parent On-line Access**

Parent On-Line Access to student information is available and strongly encouraged. Parents/guardians may access their child's student information such as grades, attendance and emergency contacts on the internet. If you are interested in obtaining Parent On-Line Access, please visit the counseling office to verify your identity, assign a user name and password, as well as provide directions on how to log-on to the website. ### **Nurses Office:**

Lakeview does not have a nurse on site. If a student is feeling ill, they will need to check in first with their teacher and proceed to the nurse's office. Students will not be allowed in without a teacher note. Students will then call home for parent pickup. If parent cannot pick up, student will return to class. If student had vomited, parent pickup is REQUIRED. Over the counter medication/prescriptions will not be available to students' without a medication form on file, and must be provided by parents to remain in the office.

# "WHAT TO EXPECT AT ORIENTATION"

### **Student Orientation**

During the orientation time block you and your student will meet the Administration of the school, tour the campus, and can purchase PE clothes (\$25 cash) (Credit Cards may be used at www.lmsasbstore.com), and receive other important information necessary to start the school year off right. Please note parents/students should attend during their time block which is shown on the first page of this newsletter.

## First Day of School

School begins on Monday, August 6<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 a.m. and dismissal time is 3:41 p.m. All students will need to verify their first period class by checking the windows of the Counseling Office or by asking a staff member that will be out to assist students with first day procedures. Lists will be posted by grade level with the student name (last name, first name) and the room number and teacher name of their first period class. Updated class schedules will be distributed during their first period class. Most students will not experience any class changes from the schedule they received on Orientation Day. Students, who do not find their name on a list or with a staff member, will be directed to the Counseling Office for assistance.

### Student Planner



During the first or second week of school a student planner will be issued to all students.

# **Books and Supplies**

It is suggested that each student carry a three ring binder divided into sections for each class. This allows each student to carry all the assignments he/she needs for each class in an easy to find section.

THREE RING BINDERS ARE IMPORTANT BECAUSE: Indexed dividers keep papers organized, papers are easily found in their correct section, misplaced and forgotten papers will no longer be a problem, papers are kept neat and clean, and they do not fall out of the binder.

Book lockers are not available. Students are encouraged to carry their school materials and personal belongings in a school bag or backpack.

### **Note from Librarian**

Welcome back! I want to inform students that after checking out your textbooks for the school year, please be sure to check and see if there are any marks, torn pages, or graffiti. If you find any damages, immediately bring your book to the library and I will note this so that at the end of the year when you turn in your books, you will not be fined for these damages. You will be billed for any other damages. Also remember that when you check out library books, you will be given a return due date. The book is due on that date.

### WHAT PARENTS NEED TO KNOW....

# **Physical Education**

Physical Education is required of all students. If there is a health or physical problem, our P.E. department will modify the P.E. program for your child according to restrictions established by your family physician. PE

uniform consists of Lakeview Spartans PE blue shorts and Lakeview Spartans PE grey T-shirt, white socks, and laced gym shoes of any color. Sweatshirts and sweatpants are not required, but are recommended on cold days and must be light grey in color. Gym clothes will be offered during the first two weeks of school and throughout the school year as needed. T-shirts are \$10, and shorts are \$15. Sweat clothes may be purchased at many of our local stores; however, only grey sweats are allowed. Sweats are only worn during cold weather. Locks will be issued to each student but replacement locks will cost \$10. Please do not bring locks from home or share your combination with anyone! Students will have P.E. lockers for their P.E. clothes. These lockers will be assigned after school starts and should not be shared.

## **Medication and Inhalers**

California Law states that we must have parent and physician permission for medication to be dispensed at school. It is district policy that no medication will be dispensed until we have permission slips in the office. If your child is to take any medication at school, please obtain the proper form in the school office.

In 2004-2005 we instituted new forms and a new protocol for students with asthma (Board Policy 5141.21). In order for a student to self-carry an asthma inhaler, a consent form <u>must be on file</u> in the office. In addition, students with asthma who need to have any accommodations for physical education will also be required to have a diagnosis specific doctor form on file in the P.E. department and in the school office.

If you have a child with one or two of these concerns, please stop by the school office and pick up the form(s). You need to schedule an appointment with the child's doctor as soon as possible. Please return the completed and signed form(s) to the school office by August 13th.

## **Weekly Progress Reports**

Students may pick up weekly progress reports from the counseling office every Thursday or Friday morning. Teachers will complete the report during class on Friday and you will have up-to-date information on your child's progress. Parents are encouraged to email teachers (pg 3) regarding your child's progress throughout the year.

### **Parent Conferences**

Parent conferences may be set up with our counselors and teachers. Please contact the counseling office or the individual teacher via email (see page 3 for teacher emails) to set up an appointment. The phone number for the counseling office is 955-3400 and ext. 46107.

# **Required Classes**

All students in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade will be given a 7 class schedule that includes 4 Core classes, PE, and 2 electives. Core includes: ELA, History, Math & Science. Counselors will assign electives based on student choices, student needs for Intervention and class availability. 9<sup>th</sup> grade will be given a 7 class schedule that includes 3 Core classes, PE, Spanish (which is recommended), and 2-3 electives. Core includes: ELA, Math, and Science. Requests to change a class require parent approval and must occur in the first 2 weeks of school.

### **Cell Phones**

Students may carry a cell phone in their backpack or pocket, <u>however they must be turned off and put away during school hours</u>. A student phone is provided the attendance office for emergencies. Students not following LLA's cell phone policy will face the following disciplinary action(s): 1<sup>st</sup> offense = verbal warning, 2nd offense = confiscation; student pick up at end of day, 3rd offense = confiscation; parent pick up only, and 4<sup>th</sup> offense = parent pickup at end of semester or year; and loss of cell phone privilege on campus. Lakeview Leadership Academy employees and school will not be responsible for items lost, stolen, damaged or missing while confiscated. A student phone is available to call home, provided a teacher pass has been given to the student to use the phone.

### **Attendance Procedures**

If your child misses school you are required to clear the absence with our attendance office <u>within three</u> <u>days (72 hours)</u> of the absence. You can call or leave a message (at anytime) with attendance at 760-955-3400 Ext. 46105 when you need to verify an absence. Absences not cleared within 3 days (72 hours) will be unexcused and could result in being reported to SARB (School Attendance Review Board).

Multiple studies have shown that attendance and success in education go hand-in-hand. Our purpose is to assure your child the best chance of succeeding educationally. If a student is absent, we follow the Education Code which is:

A student is classified as Truant upon receiving the 3<sup>rd</sup> unexcused absence and a 1<sup>st</sup> letter is sent home. 5<sup>th</sup> Unexcused absence—2<sup>nd</sup> truancy notice, 2<sup>nd</sup> Letter and School Attendance Review Team (SART) meeting or meeting with administrator. 6<sup>th</sup> Unexcused absence—3<sup>rd</sup> truancy notice, 3<sup>rd</sup> Letter and student is classified as a habitual truant and subject to a summons to appear at a School Attendance Review Board (SARB). SARB will have the parent and student sign an attendance contract. Failure to comply with the contract will result in the order of a citation to appear in court (48293 Ed Code).10 Excused absences is considered to be excessive. Parents are responsible for a child's attendance from the age of 6 until the age of 18 (48200 Ed Code). Penalties range from \$100 to \$2,500 fine + 1 year in county jail (parent) + probation for up to 5 years. We all want our children to succeed. It often is not easy but it is worth the struggle. Thanks for your help in this vital area.

### **Food Services**

We will now be able to offer all meals, to all students, at no charge. Also, we will no longer have to collect and process meal applications. Outside food is not allowed on campus. We cannot accept any outside food to be dropped off for students. This includes homemade or store bought, or restaurant. If a student forgets their lunch, they can receive a free lunch in the cafeteria.

### **Bus Route Information**

Bus loading and unloading will occur off Pahute Avenue, behind the gymnasium. Parents who wish to drive their children to and/or from school MUST drop off and pick them up in front of the school on Tamarisk Road. Please do not use Pahute Avenue for this purpose. This arrangement is to alleviate safety concerns and traffic congestion. Please be considerate of school busses that may be parked to ensure safety for all students.

Students are not to be on campus before 8:15 a.m. Upon arrival, students are to enter campus and wait in the lunch area for school to begin. Students are not allowed to wait out front or to leave campus. Students should also be off campus at 4:00 p.m. unless involved in a legitimate school activity (ASES/Afterschool Program) which is directly supervised by a teacher or adult advisor. **Students may not wait for parent pickup in the front office**. If a student is abandoned, the proper authorities will be called.

### Parent Involvement and Volunteers

Parents are encouraged to visit the school and to observe their students in their daily activities. We have several committees that we also encourage your participation in. They include ELAC for our English Language learners and our School Site Council, which helps guide the school with the implementation of our school plan and our site goals. Parents will be voting for School Site Council representatives during orientation on July 30 or Back to School Night. When parents visit the school during the regular day, they are to sign in at the reception desk. Here they will be given an identifying badge to wear on campus. <u>Official state ID (Driver's license) is required to sign in.</u>

### STUDENT DRESS CODE AND GROOMING REGULATIONS

Any apparel, jewelry, accessories, etc., which draws undue attention to the wearer, detracts from the educational process, or considered a safety risk to the wearer or others, shall be considered inappropriate. Lakeview Administration reserves the right to ultimately determine what constitutes appropriate student apparel (and the like) according to the guidelines set forth. In order to provide a safe and nurturing environment, Lakeview Leadership Academy has developed the following dress code and grooming policy. Any violation of the following rules and regulations are subject to disciplinary action.

**APPROPRIATE CLOTHING** All clothing shall be within the bounds of decency, in good taste and appropriate for school.

- 1. Clothing shall be sufficient to conceal undergarments at all times, including bra straps, underwear and athletic shorts worn underneath pants.
- 2. Shoes must be worn at all times. For safety purposes, no open toed shoes, no heel over two inches, no slippers/house shoes and closed toe sandals must be held in place with heel strap. Steel-toed shoes and cleats are not permitted; all footwear must have a rubber (or comparable) sole.
- 3. Dress/skirt/short length must be appropriate. When student's arms hang straight down, their fingertips should meet the hem of the garment.
- 4. Lettering or printing will be allowed on apparel and other items as long as it is acceptable for school attire. Vulgar or offensive text and/or pictures depicting tobacco, drugs, alcohol, gang- related names/symbols, or are sexually explicit and suggestive are not allowed. Profanity or scripted font that intentionally implies any of the above is not allowed.
- 5. Pant size must be appropriate-
  - The fullness must not interfere with normal school activities. If the belt is removed, pants must not fall
    more than two inches below the hipbone. The crotch should not drop lower than the fingertips of the
    extended hand.
  - No garment that is cut-off, ragged or torn shall be acceptable. For example: Jeans that have a
    hole/tear in the knee are acceptable as long as the hole/tear does not extend above the knee of the
    student. This rule even applies when jeans are worn with tights or leggings underneath them. Tights
    and/or leggings worn alone which emphasize the silhouette of the body are not allowed.
  - Sagging is not allowed. No undergarments, specifically underwear and shorts, should be visible above the waistline of the pant nor display the silhouette of the buttocks.
- 6. Clothing that is too tight, revealing or sexually provocative is not allowed. No exposure of cleavage or midriff area. Student should be able to raise his/her arms above their head without revealing bare skin.

- 7. No hats or beanies of any kind are allowed on campus, with the exception of school approved Spirit Wear, made available through ASB. Beanies are only allowed in inclement weather where the temperature has reached 62° or below; beanies/hats are never allowed in the classroom.
- 8. During warm weather months, tank tops are allowed providing they meet the following criteria:
  - No spaghetti straps, no bra straps showing.
  - Must not be see-through.
  - Cannot be low cut, must have shoulder straps wide enough to cover undergarments from front to back.
  - Arm opening must not fall below the top of the rib cage and completely cover the chest.
  - Must be in good taste, non-form fitting and anything that is considered sleepwear or loungewear is not permitted.

GANG RELATED APPAREL Students wearing, or in possession of, items associated with gang related activities become targets for violence -even though they may not be gang members themselves. In order to maintain a safe campus at all times, we have a zero tolerance for anything falling into this category. The following have been identified by VVUHSD, the Principal and Local Law Enforcement as unacceptable:

- 1. Team sportswear is acceptable in moderation, but no one team, color or club can be worn in entirety; ie: a team shirt w/matching pants or belt or socks, etc.
- 2. No bandanas, do-rags, hair nets or head gear that prevents clear view of the head or face.
- 3. Items that promote hate, intolerance or violence.
- 4. Wallet chains, bandanas/rags or lanyards hanging from a pocket.
- 5. No monikers, "gang slang" or references to any of the above.
  - COLORS-Students shall not wear clothing or apparel identified as "colors." The term "colors" is
    defined as a display by the wearing or placement of apparel by a group of students, or an individual,
    which would signify the membership or intent of membership in a group known to advocate or
    participate in disruptive, hateful or illegal behavior.

**GROOMING AND ACCESSORIES** For the safety of our students and integrity of our campus, the following rules apply:

- 1. Hair and physical appearance shall be clean and neatly groomed. Aerosol cans of any type are not allowed on campus, i.e.; hairspray, hair color, "AXE" and perfume. No excessive makeup is allowed.
- 2. Belts and belt buckles must be plain, unadorned and of an appropriate size for the student. No spikes or chains are allowed.
- 3. Facial piercings must be kept to a minimum and not present a distraction or safety hazard. Ear piercings must be kept to a minimum, in good taste and must not present a safety hazard to the student or anyone else. Pointed, sharp or large looped jewelry, in addition to jewelry that is distractive to the learning environment is not allowed. IE: large gauges, cone shaped or pointed piercings, brass knuckle style rings, chains or loops that could easily get caught on or in something.
- 4. Gloves may be worn during inclement weather only. No single glove is to be worn at anytime. No leather type gloves such as baseball or football gloves are to be worn to school.

The rules set in place by VVUHSD and Lakeview Administration are meant to insure the safety of our students and integrity of our campus. Students who choose not to follow these rules will be subject to disciplinary action. The right of decision regarding any instance of dispute or disagreement will ultimately belong to the Principal and his/her designee.

### ASB & Student Activities...

The Associated Student Body (ASB) is made up of all the students who attend Lakeview Leadership Academy. Our student body is governed by a constitution, and in order that the rules and standards of that constitution may be carried out, we have a group of students elected by the student body who form the ASB Student Council.

The ASB Student Council acts as the legislative branch of the junior high school government and takes care of student body business, special functions, and other student activities. It is made up of four officers: President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.

# Leadership Class... School Ambassadors

Our budding Leadership Academy is headed in an exciting direction. This will take the form of a Leadership class on campus which will incorporate the principles and practices of the parent organization, whose motto, *Service above Self*, will serve as the foundation for developing the character and core of our classroom. In addition, students will benefit from a curriculum derived from Sean Covey's <u>The Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens</u>. Lakeview Leadership Academy has adopted "The Leader In Me" strategies which began with full implementation school wide in 2014-2015. Middle school, as you well know, is a tough transition time for students as they search to define themselves. That is why this curriculum is a perfect fit. The first three habits surround moving our students from dependence through independence, including taking responsibility. The second three habits have more to do with interdependence and working with others. The last habit is to make this all a sustainable, effective lifestyle.

Planting the foundation of "Building Leaders...One Child at a Time", and sharing with our students all the skills of service and community they will need as they mature on their path to young adulthood is our inspiration. Working together, we believe that our Lakeview Leadership Ambassadors will take the principles of leadership, personal integrity, service, respect, and a work ethic beyond the classroom.

### School Site Council...

Lakeview Leadership Academy has an active school site council comprised of 12 members, elected by their peers as follows: 3 classroom teachers, 2 classified staff members, 1 principal, 4 parents or community members and 2 students. School site council shall obtain recommendations for, and review the proposed single site plan for student achievement from all school advisory committees. SSC will also develop and approve the Single Site Plan and related expenditures in accordance with all state and federal laws and regulations.

Selection of the SSC members will be held at the Back to School Night in August. Any parents/students interested in SSC may volunteer to be placed on the SSC ballot during orientation. An election will be held during the first week of school. This is a great opportunity for all parents to "Take a Stand...Lend A Hand" and become a part of school site council. ### **ASES- AFTER SCHOOL EDUCATION & SAFETY PROGRAM**

### LAKEVIEW AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

Lakeview Leadership Academy will be offering assistance in academics through the ASES program. It is the intent of ASES (After School Education & Safety Program) to encourage students to participate in a safe and educationally enriching alternative during non-school hours. The ASES program involves collaboration among parents, students, representatives from schools and government agencies, such as local law enforcement and local parks and recreation departments within the Lakeview community. Programs are created through partnerships between schools and local community resources to provide literacy, academic enrichment, and safe, constructive alternatives for students in grades 7-8.

Hours for the ASES program will be 4:00-6:00 PM. The front office is open during this time for parents of after school students for early dismissal. The ASES program will begin sign-ups during Student Orientation and will be limited to 120 students. All students will choose an Academic intervention class as well as an Enrichment class. Students will not be able to participate in the Enrichment class unless an Academic class is also attended.
