




End of 2019-20 School Year FULLY FUNDED

Since May 22 there have been over 11 changes to various guidelines and orders issued by state and local authorities





MAY 22, 2020 - UIL GUIDANCE

- Limited UIL summer strength and conditioning and marching band practice could start June 8, 2020
- Included health and safety requirements and guidelines

JUNE 23-JULY 8, 2020 - EANES ISD'S FIRST PLAN RELEASED

- June 23: Eanes ISD Fall 2020 Ready to Re-Engage (R2R) Plan released
- June 28 to July 8: Eanes ISD Fall 2020 Options
 Application window opened






JUNE 23, 2020 - FIRST TEA GUIDANCE

- Unless some type of closure is ordered, schools can offer in-person instruction and take attendance in the traditional format
- Synchronous remote instruction funded for students in 3rd grade and above
- Students in grades PK-2 are not eligible for synchronous remote instruction
- Asynchronous remote instruction funded if schools record student daily progress






JUNE 26, 2020 - GOVERNOR'S REOPENING ORDER (GA-28)

"For the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year, public schools may resume operations for the summer as provided by, and under the minimum standard health protocols found in, guidance issued by the Texas Education Agency (TEA). Private schools and institutions of higher education are encouraged to establish similar standards. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, schools may conduct graduation ceremonies consistent with the minimum standard health protocols found in guidance issued by TEA."





JULY 1, 2020 - UIL ANNOUNCEMENT

- In anticipation of the July 4 holiday, recommended that schools consider closing summer workouts, rehearsals, practices and instruction between July 3-July 12, resuming Monday, July 13
- "Temporary suspension will reduce risk of exposure and provide an opportunity to review current plans and reevaluate local context in order to make informed decisions moving forward"



JULY 7, 2020 - REVISED TEA GUIDANCE

- ISD may use first three weeks of school as transition to on-campus instruction and offer only virtual learning
- After first three weeks (except when a campus is ordered closed or has a confirmed case
 of COVID-19), on-campus instruction must be provided for all grades served every day
 for all students whose parents want them to attend on campus, for a district to receive
 funding for remote instruction any day
- Daily screening requirements for students and staff
- ISD must comply with Governor's Executive Order (GA-29) regarding wearing masks
- Social distance if feasible
- Hybrid instructional model funded

READY TO RE-ENGAGE

JULY 14, 2020 - CITY OF AUSTIN / TRAVIS CO. HEALTH ORDER

- School systems shall not re-open schools for on-campus, face-to-face instruction until after Sept. 7, 2020
- Virtual instruction shall be as per a school system's own plan
- Extracurricular sports and activities shall not take place until school systems re-open for on-campus instruction
- At least two weeks prior to re-opening for on-campus instruction and oncampus activities, the school or district shall develop a plan to be submitted to the Austin/Travis County Health Authority for re-opening on-campus activities and instruction and make the plan available for parents and general public





JULY 17, 2020 - REVISED TEA GUIDANCE

- Provided more flexibility than July 7 guidance
- ISD can begin the school year with 100% remote instruction during a four-week transitional period, which can be extended another four weeks with Board action
- Hybrid as only option for high school will be funded
- Daily screening requirements for students and staff
- ISD must comply with Governor's Executive Order (GA-29) regarding wearing masks
- Social distance if feasible





JULY 21, 2020 - REVISED UIL GUIDANCE

- Modified the 2020-2021 UIL calendar by activity and conference
- 6A Volleyball, Football, Marching Band First practice Sept. 7
- 6A Team Tennis, Cross Country First day for match or meet Sept. 7
- NOTE: Travis County sets the first day as Sept. 8



JULY 28, 2020 - THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S "GUIDANCE"

- Response to question from Mayor of Stephenville
- Local health authorities may not issue sweeping orders closing schools for the sole purpose of preventing future COVID-19 infections. Rather, their role is limited by statute to addressing specific, actual outbreaks of disease
- "Therefore, local orders that restrict these permitted school operations conflict with GA-28 [the Governor's reopening orders] and are superseded. Local officials lack authority to impose restrictions, including control measures under chapter 81 of the Health and Safety Code, insofar as they are inconsistent with GA-28. Accordingly, GA-28 both supersedes local orders that restrict the permitted operations of schools and suspends relevant laws that could allow local officials to impose restrictions on schools that are inconsistent with the Governor's order."

JULY 28, 2020 - REVISED TEA GUIDANCE

- Districts will not receive funding for remote-only instruction per a county health order
- "The Texas Attorney General issued a guidance letter on July 28, 2020, that stated "... local health authorities may not issue blanket orders closing all schools in their jurisdiction on a purely prophylactic basis." The guidance letter further provides that health authority orders may not conflict with executive orders of the governor and must apply control measures required by statute. Consequently, a blanket order closing schools does not constitute a legally issued closure order for purposes of funding solely remote instruction..."
- TEA continued to fund up to eight-week (four as transition, four with Board action)
 remote-only instructional period at the start of the school year



JULY 30, 2020 - REVISED TEA GUIDANCE: ATTEMPTED CLARIFICATION

- Without risk of jeopardizing funding, schools have authority to:
 - Make changes to the instructional calendar
 - Offer 100% remote instruction for up to eight weeks during a transitional period at the beginning of the year (with certain restrictions, so long as all students can access the remote instruction that is offered)
 - Choose to offer in-person opportunities to some or certain students during the transitional period, while others are not yet offered the same opportunity
 - Move students and offerings within school campuses/facilities
 - "However, the daily on-campus attendance option...does not necessarily need to be offered at every campus, as long as parents have access to a campus that provides on-campus attendance nearby."

JULY 30, 2020 - REVISED TEA GUIDANCE: ATTEMPTED CLARIFICATION continued

- Without risk of jeopardizing funding, schools have authority to:
 - Determine if synchronous or asynchronous (or a combination of) remote instruction opportunities are available (or if only in-person instruction will be offered)
 - Close a campus for up to five days if a confirmed positive case of COVID-19 is found (to adequately clean, communicate with those who may have been affected)
 - Choose the timing when students may transition from remote to in-person instruction



JULY 30, 2020 - REVISED TEA GUIDANCE: ATTEMPTED CLARIFICATION continued

- Schools DO NOT have authority to:
 - Offer 100% remote instruction beyond the transitional period unless a <u>lawful</u> closure order is in effect or if a campus is closed (for up to five days) due to a confirmed positive case
 - Deny daily in-person instruction to any student with parents who choose that option (with the exception of high school students participating in a hybrid model, or a parent who previously chose the remote option and must wait until the end of the grading period to transition)



JULY 31, 2020 - STATEMENT FROM THE GOVERNOR

NOT an Executive Order that revokes local health order currently in place

- "The top priority is protecting the safety and health of students, teachers, staff, and families. To achieve that goal, the TEA provided local school boards the flexibility they need to open schools in ways that ensure public safety while also providing the best education options for students during this challenging school year."
- "The authority to make decisions about when and how schools safely open rests with local school boards."
- "The authority to decide how schools will safely open this year, again, lies with local school boards. It can be with students in schools, it can be through remote learning, or a combination of the two. In making that decision, school boards have the ability to base their decisions on advice and recommendations by local public health authorities but are not bound by those recommendations."

JULY 31, 2020 - STATEMENT FROM THE GOVERNOR

NOT an Executive Order that revokes local health order currently in place

- "If any school district believes they need an extension beyond 8 weeks due to COVID-19 related issues, the TEA will review that request on a case-by-case basis."
- "If at any time during the school year a COVID-19 case is confirmed on a school campus, the school board has the ability to close the campus for up to 5 days to sanitize the campus. Schools that close under this scenario will continue to be funded for providing remote-only instruction."
- "Additionally, during the course of the school year, a local public health authority may determine that a school building must be closed in response to an outbreak. If that occurs, that school will continue to receive funding for providing remote-only instruction during the period of that closure."



JULY 31, 2020 - STATEMENT FROM THE GOVERNOR

NOT an Executive Order that revokes local health order currently in place

- "The TEA and the Attorney General correctly note that local health authorities play an important role in school closure determinations during the course of a school year if it is determined that a contamination has occurred necessitating closure, but local health authorities do not have the power to issue preemptive, blanket closures of schools weeks or months in advance of when a school may open its doors to students. Preexisting Executive Orders have repeatedly made clear that local government operations, such as public schools, are permitted to be open."
- "School boards established by the Texas legislature play a unique and pivotal role in school decisions that must not be superseded by other local authorities unless expressly allowed. It is clear that school boards can and should work collaboratively with, but not be subject to the advance directives of, local public health authorities, to ensure a safe and effective learning environment for Texas students."



- Despite Attorney General's letter, the Travis County Health order prohibiting in-person instruction and all activities until Sept. 8 stands
- Orders from local health authorities are legally binding unless:
 - Revoked by the Governor
 - Overruled by a court, or
 - Rescinded by the health authorities themselves





- City of Austin/Travis County Health: No in-person instruction or co-curricular (UIL) activities until Sept. 8, 2020
- UIL: No practice until Sept. 7, 2020
- **TEA:** Funding up to eight weeks of transition (can be full remote or some in-person)
- TEA: After four weeks or eight weeks with Board action
 must offer full-day in-person instruction for any
 student who wants it
- Governor: No Executive Order that revokes local health order currently in place




Phasing In the Return of Students

CRITERIA FOR RETURNING <u>UP TO</u> 25% OF STUDENTS

- Students with significant academic gaps
- Students who have challenges to learning in a virtual environment but are otherwise not at risk
- Students experiencing homelessness
- English learners
- Eanes ISD staff who have greater need of childcare to allow them to work
- Students in foster care who are not otherwise at risk
- Others, and siblings of those above





Health and Safety Protocols

- Our commitment remains to provide the healthiest and safest environment possible with available resources
- Cleaning and disinfecting protocols have been enhanced, implementing a standardized process to effectively clean for health.
- Compliance with the CDC, county and state health officials, TEA and other jurisdictional policies



Phasing In the Return of Staff

- Stay healthy, physically and emotionally
- Decisions about the return to school are guided by the highest concern for staff and student care
- Will work to align staff return-to-work preferences with the needs of returning students as much as possible
- For a safe re-opening, staff will need to be flexible in the way jobs and duties are normally performed
- Staff roles and responsibilities may look different
- Childcare may be available for those families (both staff and community) who are already registered





Phasing In the Return of Staff

STAFF CRITERIA FOR REMOTE LEARNING

 Employees who are at-risk or have an underlying health condition, with medical documentation from a physician requesting an accommodation to work remotely, should contact Human Resources

STAFF CRITERIA FOR RETURNING TO WORK

- Employees who are willing and able to work in-person
- Employees without reliable internet access
- Employees whose jobs can't be performed remotely
- Employees who may need to return to accommodate attending students





Input from Staff

- There will not be a second staff survey
- Responses from the first survey have allowed HR to assess staff needs and desires, substantiated by individual conversations and documentation
- Employees who are at-risk or have an underlying health condition, with medical documentation from a physician requesting an accommodation to work remotely, should contact Human Resources





Social-Emotional Health is Essential

"The social-emotional wellbeing of students and staff is more important than academic achievement during this stressful time. Taking care of each other has never been a greater priority."





Technology Developments

- New iPads for students and teachers distributed soon from community-approved bond proceeds
- Professional development for educators
- Focus on effective remote learning strategies
- New classroom technologies will allow some teachers to instruct remotely while also teaching students in-person, depending on the grade level and subject
- Enhanced help desk services to support families and staff during remote learning and working

 - Friday English/Language Arts





Extracurriculars and Performing Arts

- Follow UIL guidelines
- Align with Travis County Health orders and requirements
- Everyone wears masks
- Social distancing when possible
- Regular cleaning and hygiene
- Control environmental conditions, such as HVAC
- Limit exposure time

Synchronous or Asynchronous*

REMOTE SYNCHRONOUS INSTRUCTION

Two-way, real-time/live, virtual instruction between teachers and students when students are not on campus. In this method, the required amount of instructional time is scheduled each day.

REMOTE ASYNCHRONOUS INSTRUCTION

Instruction that does not require having the instructor and student engaged at the same time. In this method, students learn from instruction that is not necessarily being delivered in-person or in real time. This type of instruction may include various forms of digital and online learning, such as pre-recorded video lessons or game-based learning tasks that students complete on their own, and pre-assigned work and formative assessments made available to students on paper.



Simple Two-Question PARENT Survey

Will you want your child to attend school when in-person learning is allowed, if all students are permitted to return to school, potentially per TEA guidelines with limited social distancing?

YES, I select in-person learning for my child when students are allowed in the building, understanding masks will be required and there will be limited social distancing.

NO, I select remote learning for my child, understanding this commitment is for nine weeks.

If YES, families may want to consider other transportation options if possible during the pandemic. To plan bus routes and determine staffing, Eanes ISD residents are asked to indicate a transportation preference for their child for the first semester under the following guidelines:

- Drivers and students will be required to wear masks.
- Students will be assigned seats with limited social distancing.
- Hand sanitizers will be available on each bus.
- School buses will be cleaned and disinfected twice per day.

With this in mind:

YES, I need transportation for my child when in-person learning is allowed, understanding masks will be required and there will be limited social distancing.

NO, I will provide transportation for my child.

Finally, These Important Considerations

- If developmentally appropriate, ALL staff and students (in all grade levels) are required to provide and wear their own face masks or designated face coverings on the interior of all buildings and district buses at all times. Limited allowances may be made for removing masks during outside activities
- Students and staff will NOT be physically screened upon arrival each day. Individuals (staff and parents/students) are expected to screen themselves and report any illnesses or symptoms
- Eanes ISD will rely on outside health agencies to maintain contact tracing in the community


