

The Rectory Office is closed to visitors, until further notice. If you need to contact us, please call the rectory at 313-277-3110. The phones are being monitored and


messages are retrieved and returned as promptly as possible.

The Big Picture With Fr. Bob



Dear Friends,

I look forward every August to the saints that appear on the Church calendar. Just to name a few: August 4th we remember St. John Mary Vianney. He was born in France in 1786. Did you know he is the patron saint of all priests? St. John brought many people back to the church who had strayed. Thousands of people each year would seek him out to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. St. John was a simple man who was not well educated, but he had a wisdom that

surpassed that of the learned people of his time.

On August 11th, we honor St. Clare. She was born in Assisi, Italy in 1193. While I was a seminarian, I had the privilege to visit Assisi to see where she lived. She assisted St. Francis in founding the Franciscan Orders. St. Clare gave up a life of financial wealth so as to embrace Jesus, the Pearl of Great Price. She had to stand her ground when members of her family first objected to her embracing a life of poverty, chastity and obedience. How courageous for someone who was only 19 years old! She lived the remaining years of her life as the abbess, the head of the newly founded order of nuns.

There are too many saints listed on the Church calendar during the month of August to acknowledge each of them in this article. However, one more must be mentioned! On August 28th, we remember a giant of a saint. St. Augustine of Hippo, Africa was born in 354. As a young man he lived a sinful life but much to the credit of his mother, St. Monica (whose feast day is appropriately the day before her son's) he surrendered to God's grace at the age of 30. When he finally stopped running from God, St. Augustine grew in great holiness. Few human beings have ever contributed more to the life of the Church or to society at large. St. Augustine has quite the impressive resume! He was a philosopher, theologian, mystic, writer, poet, orator, bishop, doctor of the Church and saint. His autobiography, *The Confessions of St. Augustine*, should be read by simply everyone.


I will conclude with one of the most famous prayers to Jesus ever recorded. It is from the *Confessions of St. Augustine*.

"Late, have I loved you, O beauty ever ancient, ever new, late have I loved you! You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. In my unloveliness I plunged into the lovely things which you created. You were with me, but I was not with you. Created things kept me from you; yet if they had not been in you they would not have been at all. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance on me; I drew in breath and now I pant for you. I have tasted you, now I hunger and thirst for you. You touched me, and I burned for your peace." (from the Confessions of St. Augustine)

St. Augustine's prayer may have been written about 1600 years ago, but it still speaks to the heart of our relationship with God. Like St. Augustine, most of us (if not all of us) have that realization that "Late have I loved you Lord!"

Every saint is a reminder to us that whatever we do to draw closer to God is worth it! May we run the good race and make every sacrifice necessary in order to develop a profound, personal relationship with Jesus. The witness of all the saints reminds us we will not be disappointed. Rather, we will find immense fulfillment in Him.

From the PAULpit



This is the time of year (typically) when our fall athletes come back from summer break and get back into shape. The offseason is a much lower tempo and they are pushed harder to get the game ready in a jiffy! And the coaches often drill their players at the

beginning of the season in the basics to remind the body and mind what it has not done in a while.

This is a great image of where we might be at. This season of our lives – the virus – feels like we are in an offseason. What we like to do, our routines, our spiritual lives, etc. might feel *off*. Things are probably not where we'd like them to be because of the pandemic, I know that's true for me. So let's get back to the basics! A simple and straightforward spirituality is a sure way of getting us through this time. In fact, it is the *perfect* way. In the 19th century, an Anglican priest in England

In the 19th century, an Anglican priest in England named John Henry Newman converted to Catholicism – a HUGE affair in England in that day and age. It was more or less akin to giving up your national identity and turning to the devil. He was a prolific writer and a master of the spiritual life. One of his passages is called, "The Short Road to Perfection." I think this is very appropriate for us today. It's about the basics and a simple approach to God. He writes, "If you ask me what you are to do in order to be perfect, I say, first – Do not lie in bed beyond the due time of rising; give your first thoughts to God; make a good visit to the Blessed Sacrament; say the Angelus devoutly; eat and drink to God's glory; say the Rosary well; be recollected; keep out bad thoughts; make your evening meditation well; examine yourself daily; go to bed in good time, and you are already perfect."

These are all things within our grasp and will get us "in shape" spiritually if we have been floundering in this time.

In alignment with the liturgical directives issued by Archbishop Allen Vigneron, we are committed to providing a safe and clean environment for the faithful to worship our Lord. The health of our parishioners is of utmost importance to us and new procedures and protocols have been put in place to ensure this. Please review the information below regarding how Mass will work and the role we all play in keeping each other safe. Thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation as we work through our new "normal" together. **Note: Dispensation from the Sunday obligation to attend Mass is granted to all faithful through Sunday, Sept. 6, 2020.** Let us keep each other in our prayers. - Fr. CHURCH OF THE DIVINE

SECTION 1: WHO SHOULD ATTEND MASS

According to the Archbishop's directives, parish churches are <u>not</u> to exceed **25% of their total capacity** at one time that's **375 parishioners** at Divine Child. This means we must count the number of attendees at each Mass, and we must turn attendees away when we reach capacity. We believe all people who desire to worship our Lord should have the ability to do so. *See Section 2 for how we are working to ensure all can worship.*

SECTION 2: SCHEDULE OF MASSES

SIGN UP FOR TEXT ALERTS!

To receive real-time text messages regarding when the church reaches its maximum capacity and cancellations of outdoor Masses due to weather, simply text the keyword DivineChild to 84576. **INDOOR MASSES** We are returning to our normal weekday and weekend Mass schedule. All parishioners must enter the church through the front doors (Silvery Lane). Only 375 people will be admitted at once, and an attendant will be keeping count at the door. Attendees beyond that will be asked to proceed to the corresponding outdoor Mass at 10:15 AM or 12:45 PM, or to watch the weekend's streamed Mass.

OUTDOOR MASSES Weather permitting, we will be <u>adding</u> two outdoor Sunday Masses at 10:15 AM & 12:45 PM on the football field. Attendees may enter the football field through the gateway building, through the North-West gate from the elementary school lot, or through the South-East gate. Attendees will be seated on the field facing the home bleachers. Those who attend the outdoor Masses are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or a blanket. No seating will be provided. You may also consider bringing a hand-held umbrella for shade. Don't forget your sunscreent Face-coverings are not required at outdoor Masses as long as social distancing is maintained. * Note: Outdoor Mass cancellations due to weather will be communicated to parishioners by 7AM via text, social media and email.

LIVE STREAMED MASS For those unable to attend Mass in-person, the weekend live stream will continue, but is **moving to** Saturday's 4:30 PM Mass. Watch the Mass in real-time or any time retroactively by visiting <u>Facebook.com/DivineChildParish/live</u>.

SECTION 3: HOW MASS WILL WORK

FINDING A SEAT To ensure proper social distancing and sanitizing of pews, parishioners will be asked to adhere to a seating chart for each Mass. Pews will be marked with alternating color coded letters. Please sit in these colored/lettered pews for the following Mass times. Attendants will also be present to assist parishioners.

WEEKDAY MASSES:

6:30 AM - Orange/A pews only 8:30 AM - Yellow/B pews only

SATURDAY MASSES:

8:30 AM - Orange/A pews only 4:30 PM - Yellow/B pews only

SUNDAY MASSES:

8 AM - Orange/A pews only 10 AM - Yellow/B pews only 12:30 PM - Green/C pews

OUTDOOR MASSES:

Please sit on or near the ten yard lines in order to provide adequate social distancing. Orange cones will be placed along each ten yard line to mark the amount of space to the front and back of attendees. <u>Those who attend the outdoor</u> <u>Mass are encouraged to bring lawn</u> <u>chairs or a blanket</u>. No seating will be provided. You may also consider bringing a hand-held umbrella for shade. **OFFERTORY** There will not be a collection during Mass. Upon the conclusion of Mass, please place your offertory in the collection baskets located in front of the altar, in the gathering space or at any exit of the football field. Alternatively, donations can be made online through <u>FaithDirect.net</u>, or mailed to/dropped off at the rectory (1055 N. Silvery Lane, Dearborn, MI 48128).

COMMUNION A limited number of Eucharistic ministers will be on hand for each Mass to distribute communion to multiple pew banks/yard lines. Thank you in advance for your patience as we expect communion to take longer than usual. Communion procedures will be explained just before the reception of the Holy Eucharist. If you wish to receive the Eucharist, please adhere to the following guidelines:

- Attendees should maintain 6 feet of distance from other attendees while proceeding to the front of church/field.
- All attendees should remove masks and gloves as they approach the minister. <u>No gloves</u> may be worn when receiving the Eucharist in hand.
- Attendees should bow and reply "Amen" at a distance of 6 feet from the Eucharistic minister and then approach to receive the Eucharist.

For your safety, if a Eucharistic minister accidentally touches the hand or mouth of a parishioner, he or she will sanitize his or her hands instantly with rubbing alcohol at a sanitizing station located near each Eucharistic minister's station.

* If you are uncomfortable receiving the Eucharist at this time, please know that there is no obligation to receive the Eucharist whenever you come to Mass.





Dismemberment Abortion Petition Comes to End; Catholic Conference Pledges Continued Efforts:

This week, Right to Life of Michigan ended its efforts to bring a citizen-initiated ban on dismemberment abortion before the State Legislature. Sadly, the Michigan Values Life petition drive was found to have an insufficient number of valid signatures. In light of the news, Michigan Catholic Conference (MCC) expressed appreciation for the efforts of the pro-life community: *"After countless*"

hours and with myriad people volunteering at hundreds of Catholic parishes across the state to collect signatures that this outcome is disappointing. Each and every person who assisted in this petition drive is cherished and thanked. We have incredible gratitude for their pro-life dedication and the tremendous effort to raise awareness while gathering signatures. Saint Teresa of Calcutta taught us that God does not require us always to be successful, but rather to be faithful; indeed, the effort to protect human life through this petition drive was immense. Despite this setback, the drive to protect unborn human life will continue in earnest. Women and children deserve better."

While similar legislation passed both chambers during the 2019-2020 session, Governor Gretchen Whitmer has indicated she would veto any pro-life legislation, including a dismemberment abortion ban. MCC will keep Catholic Advocacy Network members updated about future opportunities to support women and children within this state. *www.michigancatholicconference*

PRAY WITH THE KNIGHTS

The 5th Sunday Rosary is one of the Faith Programs that the Knights host to support the Divine Child Parish. Now more than ever, we recognize the importance of prayer in our family and community.

As Knights, we turn to the gentle and glorious Virgin Mary, our Queen and our Mother. Mary's love encircles us and draws us closer to her Divine Son. Under the mantle of her protection, we take up her Holy Rosary. During the first step in our journey toward Knighthood, we are given a Rosary. We are asked to always carry a rosary in our pocket, and we are encouraged to pray the Rosary as often as we can as a devotion to Mary, the patroness of the Knights of Columbus. What challenge can we not face or what victories can we not achieve with Her Holy Rosary in our hands and the "Hail Mary" on our lips?

The Rosary is a <u>powerful</u> prayer and through its recitation, our hearts and minds are settled. It is a scripture-based prayer and in the 5 decades we follow the life of Jesus and Mary through the Mysteries. On Sundays, we focus on the 5 Glorious Mysteries, The Resurrection of Jesus Christ, The Ascension of Jesus to Heaven, The Descent of the Holy Ghost, The Assumption of Mary into Heaven, and Mary is Crowned as Queen of Heaven and Earth. The Glorious Mysteries are also used as the meditation during the wake of a Catholic funeral and praying the Rosary with the families of our departed brother Knights is a special way to honor them.

On a personal note, I was recently given a Rosary by a fellow Divine Child parishioner, **Suzanne**. She quietly and respectfully approached me after a Sunday morning Mass while I was serving as a Coordinator. Suzanne pointed to the Knights of Columbus emblem on my Foley polo, smiled through her mask, and said that I was the right person. She informed me that she rescues rosaries and the rosary that she held in her hand needed a home. The

<u>RECIPE OF THE WEEK:</u> St. Bernard of Clairvaux Dijon Chicken

St. Bernard of Clairvaux was born in Fontaines-les-Dijon, France in 1090. Dijon is the capital of the Burgundy region in France. The region is world famous for its Burgundy wine and its mustard. It had become a recognized center for mustard making by the 13th century. It seems a fitting feast day meal for this recipe.

½ cup butter
2 cloves garlic
2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
¾ cup dry breadcrumbs
¼ cun grated parmesan chees



- ¹/₂ cup grated parmesan cheese (fresh or jarred)
- 2-3 tablespoons dried parsley flakes
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut in strips

Heat oven to 375 F. Melt butter in small saucepan with minced garlic. After garlic has sautéed, add mustard and mix. Let cool and whisk mixture to combine until creamy. Mix breadcrumbs, parmesan cheese, and parsley in shallow bowl or pan. Dip chicken into butter/mustard mixture, then dip in bread crumb mixture to coat both sides. Place in glass 9x13 pan. Bake uncovered 25 to 30 minutes, until juice of chicken is no longer pink when centers of thickest pieces are cut.

Meet Our Extended Family:

St. Bernard of Clairvaux (Feast Day August 20) 1090 – August 20, 1153

At the age of 20, Bernard left his home to join the monastic community of Citeaux. His five brothers, two uncles, and some 30 young friends followed him into the monastery. Within four years, a dying community had recovered enough vitality to establish a new house in the nearby valley of Wormwoods, with Bernard as abbot. The valley was soon renamed Clairvaux, the valley of light. Bernard developed a rich theology of sacred space and music, writing extensively on both. He was instrumental in reemphasizing the importance of lectio divina and contemplation on Scripture within his order. His ability as arbitrator and counselor became widely known. More and more, he was lured away from the monastery to settle long-standing disputes. Bernard intervened in a fullblown schism and settled it in favor of the Roman pontiff against the antipope. The Holy See prevailed on Bernard to preach the Second Crusade throughout Europe. His eloquence was so overwhelming that a great army was assembled, and the success of the crusade seemed assured; however, the project ended as a complete military and moral disaster. Bernard felt responsible for the outcome of the crusade. This heavy burden possibly hastened his death, which came August 20, 1153. In 1830, Pope Pius VIII bestowed upon Bernard the title "Doctor of the Church."

Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thy intercession was left unaided. Inspired with this confidence, I fly to thee, O Virgin of virgins, my Mother; to thee do I come; before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hear and answer me. Amen.


