Mr Wicks and Mrs Hancock have been so impressed with the number of applications they had from pupils wanting to take part in the Go4SET engineering project.

Go4SET is a project-based scheme linking teams of 4-6 Year 8 and 9 students with an Industrial Mentor to complete an environmental, school-based project.

We are planning to enter two teams of 6. Designed to assist students in becoming more "work ready", and challenge the negative perceptions of industry, the scheme stimulates interest in STEM subjects by putting practical, softer skills into action within a project management scenario.



World Book Day Thursday 5th March

Matt Dickinson, Author, Adventurer and Film-maker, will be in school on Monday 2nd March to give a talk to our students and bring his own intrepid adventures alive with stunning pictures and video clips. Our students will be taken on a breath-taking tour of discovery to lands of ice and fire and the author will share how these experiences have inspired his writing. He will also run two workshops in the library.

















Matt Dickinson is an award-winning writer and filmmaker with a passion for climbing and adventure. During his filmmaking career he has worked as a director/cameraman for National Geographic television, the Discovery Channel, the BBC and Channel 4. His film projects have taken him to Antarctica, Africa and the Himalaya, often in the company of the world's leading climbers and expeditioners. His most notable film success was 'Summit Fever' in which Matt reached the summit of Everest via the treacherous North Face. His book The Death Zone tells the true story of that ascent and has become a bestseller in many different countries.

Recently Matt has started writing fiction for teenage readers. His debut thriller series Mortal Chaos was well received by critics and readers alike. Matt has followed this up with The Everest Files, a dramatic and popular trilogy set on the world's highest mountain. Lie Kill Walk Away is his latest teen thriller, which won the Warwickshire Secondary Schools Book Award in 2018 and was a firm favourite with our students.

When he's not writing, Matt tours the UK, speaking at schools and colleges and inspiring a new generation of adventurers.

There will also be various activities during the week such as quizzes and readings in the library, and all students will be given a WBD token which they can swap for a WBD book or get £1 off a book of their choice (in book shops or some supermarkets).

On Thursday 5th March Year 7 will have a reading assembly and there will be a "story in a day", with teachers reading at the beginning of each lesson.

Bronze Training Day

Sunday 9th February saw the bronze group head out in to the wind and rain to start their navigation training. Unfortunately due to the weather we had to adapt our plans but still managed to get out and learn some map reading skills.

They were split into 3 groups each accompanied by school staff and qualified trainers from Venture Outdoor. Groups walked in the local area coping with lots of mud, wind and rain, and with help from the trainers students learnt how to orientate their maps, use their compass to work out the direction they should travel in and other landmarks that might help them find their way. It was a challenging day for them but all seemed to finish in good spirits if a little bit wet and cold. They are looking forward to the practice expedition when they will be in their own smaller groups finding their own way.

Gold Training Weekend

Friday 31st January to Sunday 2nd February was a fantastic weekend which started with us being dropped off at our destination and then we began a 5 hour trek to our youth hostel. We started by doing map reading in pairs and became familiar with compass work and map placement. After a few wrong turnings and arguing with our partners we finally found ourselves at the youth hostel and played cards till late enjoying the neighbours, working on our teamwork building human pyramids. On the second day we set off at 12 after route planning all morning for our following practicing expedition in April. We set off as a group and took it in turns to lead the team. We had a very steep uphill climb which we struggled with but made it nonetheless. We learnt things along the way such as appropriate places to camp, what to do in emergency situations and how to tell if waters drinkable. We carried on walking until it was pitch black (this was planned as we needed to learn night navigation skills) and at around 5 o'clock began to start walking back down. This was the most challenging part as the wind was so harsh and you could only see with your head torch. We made it back home at 7 o'clock after 7 hours of walking.

The following morning we had a big lie in as we were all aching. We began at 10 o'clock in our individual groups which we would be completing the qualifying expeditions in. We had to make our own decisions to get to the mini bus and after a few hours of sliding down hills we made it back to the mini bus covered in mud.

In conclusion, it was a brilliant weekend in which I picked up many tips such as how to read bearings, how to use a compass and just building up resilience when walking. I would recommend it to anyone considering doing this, despite being hard work it is amazing fun.

Leave of Absence During Term Time 2019-20



Student Absence Procedure

If your child is unwell and cannot attend school please call the 24 hour Absence Line on 01926 645 611 before 8.50am, stating their name and form, your name and the reason. This must be done for each day they will be absent.

If your child is unable to attend school for any reason other than illness, planned or emergency (part day, full day or multiple days), please always complete a leave of absence form and send it by email to enquiries@kinetonhighschool.org.uk This form should - we all need to play our part. be used for all appointments (medical, dental, music exams or external sporting activities), holiday requests, religious observance dates and all other reasons or circumstances where your child will be absent from school.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the arrangements. parent(s).

Unauthorised Absence

There are times when children are absent for reasons, which are not permitted by law. Examples of unauthorised absence are parental illness, term time . holidays or a family day out. Where there is no explanation for an absence or where the explanation or reason for the absence is considered unsatisfactory absence will be recorded as 'unauthorised'. Unauthorised Absences have to be reported to the Local Authority. The Attendance Compliance Enforcement Team may contact you where unauthorised absence continues to be a problem. Unauthorised absence could result in a Fixed Penalty Fine or other legal action. We are always concerned about the amount of school time pupils miss as a result of term time leave. There is no entitlement to time off during term time. Leave of absence is only granted in The full Attendance policy can be found under exceptional circumstances at the discretion of the Headteacher in accordance with the school policy as agreed by the governing body.

We greatly appreciate parental support to reduce the total amount of days lost due to holidays. We are committed to working in partnership with you to enable your child to reach their academic targets and to support their social development. For this to happen we need to keep individual attendance as high as possible

It is our policy:

- Only in an exceptional circumstance will term time leave be allowed. Parents/Carers wishing to apply for leave of absence need to fill in an application form well in advance and before booking tickets or making travel
- If term time leave is taken without prior permission from the school, the absence will be unauthorised and you may be liable for a fixed-penalty fine or other legal action.
- Please remember that absence for whatever reason disadvantages a child by creating gaps in his/her learning. A good understanding of the work and good progress can only take place when the child is in the classroom regularly and on time.

If you think you have exceptional circumstances please talk to us without delay and before arrangements are entered into or money committed. If exceptional circumstances are accepted the Headteacher will determine how much absence will be authorised. Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the Where applications for leave of absence are made in case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. Warwickshire Secondary School pupils recorded 6,651 half day sessions of absence due to holiday in the Autumn/Spring term during academic year 2018/19. This is an increase of 602 on the previous year.

Department for Education statistics show that students with 100% attendance are 2.2 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs at 9-5 including English and Maths than pupils with lower than 90% attendance. Every day and every lesson matters!

'We know parents try wherever possible to not have medical appointments during the school day in order to avoid missed lesson time and a reduction in school attendance. However we appreciate this is not always avoidable, therefore please try to book appointments using student social times, such as between 10.30-12.30am mark which will use break and lunchtime and therefore minimises lost lesson times. This can ensure that students are in school for the other 4 lessons and only missing part of one lesson, rather than loosing morning or afternoon lessons. Thank you for your on-going support with this.'
