Year 12 EES Project Trip to Birmingham University

Day 1:

The first day started off with a registration and safety meeting, briefing the team on what they should expect for the rest of the day. Then we were escorted to the labs where we were introduced to the different technicians who would be assisting us during our work. After being showed to our work bench, we got started with our project, a way of recovering energy though vibrations in a car shock absorber by using the principle of moving a magnet through a coil of wire to produce electricity.

The first thing we did was separate into two teams, Ed and Ollie P would be working on the smaller demonstration model to show the concept works, while Henry and Ollie W worked on the actual shock absorber which would act as a display piece, showing the judges and



fellow students how the concept would be put into use. The first day consisted of a lot of measuring and cutting, our plan was to get our dimensions and then try to cut or measure as many as the pieces we would need as possible so that we could assemble it all and clean it up on day 2. By the end of day 1 all the steel pieces for the two stands were measured and cut, the shock absorber was gutted, display windows in the shock were cut and all the pieces for the working demonstration piece were cut. This left us in a great position going into the second day as all we had to do was assemble the demonstration piece, clean up the shock absorber, weld and paint.

Day 2:

Day 2 started off well, we arrived at the labs early and were able to seek the assistance from the technicians as there was no one else there. This meant that we got all our welding done early on

and were able to focus our attention on the smaller demonstration piece. We soon soldered and coiled the wire around the PVC pipe and attached the magnets to the wooden dowel meaning all we had left to do was attach the pipe to the stand, position the CAM underneath the wooden dowel and add an end cap to the pipe so that the wooden dowel doesn't accidently fly out of the top of the pipe. With the demonstration piece now ready for a motor to be added, we could finally add the finishing touches to the display piece, adding a sample of cut coil to the top and returning the shock itself to the body, meaning all that was left to do was paint both stands and attach a motor to the demonstration piece, which we decided to at home as we didn't need the university's equipment or facilities for those tasks.

Year 12 & 13 'Physics in Action' at Warwick University

On Wednesday 27th November, Year 12 and 13 Physics students went to Warwick University to attend the 'Physics in Action' event. This day out consisted of a series of lectures by professional physicists, all of whom were specialists within their field. Throughout this event we improved our knowledge in a range of subjects related to the overall topic of physics.

For most of us, the most interesting topics were presented to us by Dr Andrew Steele with superconductivity and they're potential future uses by eliminating resistance in his talk "resistance is futile", and Dr Jen Gupta, the astrophysicist, who talked about the invisible universe and the ways in which we can detect a birthing star. Michael De Podesta had the most engaging lecture and entertained the audience by introducing to us his own set of SI Base Units.

Overall, this trip was very interesting and we all managed to learn more about how physics is applied to the real world.

Department for Education statistics show that students with 100% attendance are 2.2 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs at 9-5 including English and Maths than pupils with lower than 90% attendance. Every day and every lesson matters!

'We know parents try wherever possible to not have medical appointments during the school day in order to avoid missed lesson time and a reduction in school attendance. However we appreciate this is not always avoidable, therefore please try to book appointments using student social times, such as between 10.30-12.30am mark which will use break and lunchtime and therefore minimises lost lesson times. This can ensure that students are in school for the other 4 lessons and only missing part of one lesson, rather than loosing morning or afternoon lessons. Thank you for your on-going support with this.'

Student Absence Procedure

If your child is unwell and cannot attend school please call the 24 hour Absence Line on 01926 645 611 before 8.50am, stating their name and form, your name and the reason. This must be done for each day they will be absent.

If your child is unable to attend school for any reason other than illness, planned or emergency (part day, full day or multiple days), please always complete a leave of absence form and send it by email to enquiries@kinetonhighschool.org.uk This form should - we all need to play our part. be used for all appointments (medical, dental, music exams or external sporting activities), holiday requests, religious observance dates and all other reasons or circumstances where your child will be absent from school.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the arrangements. parent(s).

Unauthorised Absence

There are times when children are absent for reasons, which are not permitted by law. Examples of unauthorised absence are parental illness, term time . holidays or a family day out. Where there is no explanation for an absence or where the explanation or reason for the absence is considered unsatisfactory absence will be recorded as 'unauthorised'. Unauthorised Absences have to be reported to the Local Authority. The Attendance Compliance Enforcement Team may contact you where unauthorised absence continues to be a problem. Unauthorised absence could result in a Fixed Penalty Fine or other legal action. We are always concerned about the amount of school time pupils miss as a result of term time leave. There is no entitlement to time off during term time. Leave of absence is only granted in The full Attendance policy can be found under exceptional circumstances at the discretion of the Headteacher in accordance with the school policy as agreed by the governing body.

We greatly appreciate parental support to reduce the total amount of days lost due to holidays. We are committed to working in partnership with you to enable your child to reach their academic targets and to support their social development. For this to happen we need to keep individual attendance as high as possible

It is our policy:

- Only in an exceptional circumstance will term time leave be allowed. Parents/Carers wishing to apply for leave of absence need to fill in an application form well in advance and before booking tickets or making travel
- If term time leave is taken without prior permission from the school, the absence will be unauthorised and you may be liable for a fixed-penalty fine or other legal action.
- Please remember that absence for whatever reason disadvantages a child by creating gaps in his/her learning. A good understanding of the work and good progress can only take place when the child is in the classroom regularly and on time.

If you think you have exceptional circumstances please talk to us without delay and before arrangements are entered into or money committed. If exceptional circumstances are accepted the Headteacher will determine how much absence will be authorised. Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Leave of Absence During Term Time 2019-20



The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the Where applications for leave of absence are made in case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time.
