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## Schedule:

The 2020-21 school year will commence using a 50% return to class model with students in Grades 10-12 in class every other day. When not in school, students will be connected to their classes via teacher direction. This may include various forms of technology or tasks for which students are responsible. This model is designed to provide students with

- an uninterrupted learning experience.
- the ability to shift from in-person to online instruction when necessary.
- minimal physical contact with other students while in the building.
- a regular connection between student and teacher.

We strongly encourage students and parents to consistently review our calendar, which includes our yearly schedule on the school's website and phone app.

Senior school students are expected to enter Blessed Edmund Rice using the door closest to the alumni gym (or the south door of Manrell Hall if their advisory is located in that building) to meet with their advisory group. Please consult the 2020 ADVISORY GROUPS GRADES 10-12 (found in the emailed version of the Friday, August 21, 2020 Parent Communication) to locate your Advisory and Learning Group. Groups are organized by grade and alpha. To find your Groups, use the appropriate tab at the bottom of the spreadsheet. These lists will also be posted on the wall near the entrance. Faculty and staff will be available to help students find their classrooms. Due to health and safety protocols, parents are not permitted in the building.

Students are expected to bring their lunch to school during the first week of school.

# **Daily Timetable:**

The Senior School daily timetable consists of four academic blocks per day with built-in transition times and a lunch period. Classes will take place in 14 alternate day blocks. Students will take up to four of their regular classes for 14 straight days followed by the next group of up to four classes for the next 14 days. The cycle then repeats. This year we have extended the timing of our Advising Block and it will take place weekly on Wednesday mornings. We will no longer host four shorter Advising check-ins per week. Advisories are now organized into grades and further into learning groups.

# RATIONALE FOR TIMETABLE

The alternating day block model of learning offers the following:

- Close mirroring of a regular school day
- Coursework spanning the entire year allows for consistency of learning
- Limited mixing and physical contact with students while in the building
- Equity across all courses
- Routine and predictability while keeping cohorts separate
- Opportunities for deep cleaning of school facilities

When not in a class, students are expected to be working on assigned tasks for each respective class. These tasks take place asynchronously.

To ensure we can socially distance and maintain the proper flow of our students we will also institute a staggered arrival and dismissal time for Senior School students based on their grade level.

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This means that students at each grade level are expected to be sitting at their desks prepared for class by the above time. For example, a Grade 10 boy would arrive at school after 8:00 am and be sitting at his desk by 8:15 am. Teachers will be in their classrooms at this time.

The above Senior School Timetable will remain in place for this academic year.

# Lockers:

Students will not have access to a book locker at the beginning of this school year. This will be reviewed as the year progresses and decisions will be based on health and safety protocols. These areas are high-risk areas that impede the flow of student traffic in our hallways. All students are asked to come to school with a backpack that will aid in the transport of their belongings. Students will be able to use the Physical Education (PE) lockers in the Rice Building before and after PE classes. Students are asked to bring a lock to school on the days they have PE.

A variety of precautions will be taken in our Locker Rooms to ensure the safety of our students and faculty.

#### Uniform:

Students are expected to take pride in their school community by ensuring that they wear their uniforms to code. Please review uniform expectations in your Student or Parent Handbook.

Appropriate uniform items include:

- regular black, dress shoes, with leather uppers, cut beneath the ankle. Black running shoes cannot be substituted for dress shoes.
- dress quality, black or brown belt. Students are expected to wear a belt to school.
- school-issued sweaters. This does not include Spirit Wear items, such as hoodies.

#### Lunch:

Students will eat lunch in their third-period class and not in the cafeteria. Students are encouraged to bring their lunch to school. Only one Learning Group of students will have access to the cafeteria each day.

# Electronic Device Use & Vancouver College's Acceptable Use Policy:

Our school aims to create an environment in which students can be focused and present, both in class and during non-instructional time. It is clear that smart devices offer many benefits, and we believe that we can all learn how to make the best use of these tools. However, it has been shown that excessive screen time also leads to many negative emotional and social side effects and can be harmful to school culture.

In the Middle and Senior School, students may bring cellphones to school, but are expected to have them off and away during class, unless a teacher asks them to use them for educational purposes. During social times (before school, at breaks, at lunch, and after school) and when in public areas with other students, students are expected to keep their devices off and away.' Gaming, outside of a club or intramural setting, is not permitted, and students will be asked to put away devices used for this purpose or to risk having them confiscated. Repeated infractions will lead to further interventions, which may include disciplinary consequences.

# Senior School Parent Orientation Evening:

All Senior School parents and guardians are encouraged to attend the Parent Orientation Evening on Thursday, September 17th. This evening will allow you to meet our Principal, Mr. Daryl Weaver; our President, Mr. Johnny Bevacqua; our Parents' Association President, Celia Courchene as well as myself and your son's teachers. We strongly recommend that at least one parent/guardian is in attendance

This year's Orientation Evening will take place online. Please await more information in our school's newsletter, sent out weekly each Monday.

Your <u>Parent Handbook</u> is an excellent resource for answering questions or clarifying any concerns you may have. #### Co-Curricular Activities:

As co-curricular activities are an important part of our school's culture, we will continue to offer co-curricular activities before and after school. Please note that co-curricular activities will likely involve students interacting outside of their learning groups and appropriate physical distancing is required in those circumstances. All staff have been informed of specific protocols relevant to each activity.

## **Grade Level Coordinators:**

These leadership roles are designed to further assist our boys in their development as a whole person, ensuring that each student is known and supported at their grade level. These faculty members coordinate various student life initiatives and grade-specific activities, provide academic support, deal with lower-level discipline issues, and provide referrals when further help is needed.

Andrea Prout-Bernett (Grade 10), Lillian Vernier (Grade 11), and Enzo Nardi (Grade 12) will continue to serve in these roles. Students will be referred to our Grade Level Coordinators (and me) from Advisory and subject-specific teachers.

Please speak to your son's advisory teacher or grade level coordinator should any social-emotional issues arise at school. Should any academic issues arise at school, please speak to your son's subject-specific teacher to discuss the matter.

Additionally, please know that you can always contact me to discuss your son and how to best support his needs.

### SUMMARY: A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A SENIOR SCHOOL VC STUDENT

- Senior School students will be at school every other day.
- Senior School students will be at home every other day where they will be working on asynchronous tasks as prescribed by subject-specific teachers.
- Regular contact with teachers and a cohort of classmates.
- School-based technology will include communication via email and Google Classroom (Learning Management System).
- Individual courses may utilize other software on occasion.
- Completing a medical pre-screening DAILY CHECK before arriving at school.
- Arriving at school during staggered times with controlled entrances to buildings.
- No locker access to begin the year.
- Masks to be worn in the school, hallways, shared public spaces, and classrooms.
- Follow physical distancing signage and markings as reminders.
- Physical distancing will be enforced in lines, cafeteria, classrooms, and hallways.
- Handwashing and sanitizing regularly upon entry to new areas.
- Carrying lunch, materials, clothes for each of his four daily classes in a backpack.
- Student engagement and social and emotional well-being to be prioritized in orientation, classes, and co-curricular experiences.
- Dismissal from school during staggered times with controlled exits from buildings.
- School-sanctioned activities or events will have expectations posted for distancing and hygiene.
