Sometimes we can get lost or sidelined in what is not most significant and important. I know of heated discussions where in the end, neither party could remember the original reason for the discussion. The need to be right should never supersede the respect for the person with whom we are discussing or replace the focus on what is most essential for our faithful Christian living. One’s character should always be at the heart of an encounter and not how the other looks or sounds. One’s dedication to Christ and the Church should be honored even if we disagree over non-essential aspects of faith. Love requires this of us.
