Longtime girls' cross country & track & field coach hangs up his whistle

If you attended DCHS in the 2000s, chances are you know Coach Tony Mifsud. From his fluorescent yellow shirts and his hot pink shorts to his infamous chant, "hubba, hubba, walla, walla," Mif is hard to forget!

Under his leadership, the Divine Child girls' cross country team won eleven Catholic High School League titles, eleven Regional Championships and three Track State Championships (2010, 2012 & 2013), while maintaining a positive, supportive team experience for all runners.

"Mif was the kind of coach who genuinely cared for every single runner on his team. He kept track of all of our personal achievements, both in the sport and outside of it, and encouraged all the girls to celebrate each other's accomplishments. He made sure we weren't just a team, but a family," shared Mackenzie Brewis '12.

Mif made a difference in the lives of countless student-athletes and provided a powerful example of how to embrace life with excitement and to always have fun!

From coaching to directing the Annual Mark

Carpenter Falcon 5K, Mif dedicated a huge part of his life to his runners, and for that reason, he was recognized by MHSSA as Coach of the Year four times, and by the CHSL as Coach of the Year once. He was also inducted into the CHSL Hall of Fame.

Coaching partner Jack Benitez shared, "Coach Mifsud always puts the girls first and has been a dedicated coach. The Divine Child community thanks Tony for his many years of coaching and shaping our young runners on the track and off."

Tony Mifsud hit the track scene when he ran a 52-second, 440-yard dash leg on a medley relay team as a sophomore at Cody High School, after moving to Detroit from Malta in 1950. Upon graduation, he made All-American as the anchor leg of the 4-mile relay at the U.S. Track and Field News Magazine meet. From there, he made a name for himself at Spring Arbor Community College and Henry Ford Community College. Coach Mifsud attended Eastern Michigan University where in 1966 he set an EMU record for the indoor 2 mile (9:07.04). That year he became a U.S. citizen and as the 1968 Olympics

approached, Mifsud decided to file for dual citizenship, so he could run for Malta in the 10,000 meters. But, tragedy ended his attempt. He was involved in a 15-car accident on Labor Day 1967, landing him in the hospital with a lumbar fracture that kept him in the hospital with lower back paralysis for eight weeks. But, Mif's positive spirit, drive and determination helped him to overcome obstacles, and in 1977 he laced up his running shoes and began running again, while coaching at Henry Ford Community College.

Prior to making his way to Divine Child, Mif coached at U of M Dearborn, Henry Ford College, Allen Park High School and Southgate High School.

Remembering a CATHOLIC LEAGUE

On May 6, 2020, Joe Charnley, Catholic High School League Hall of Famer, former CYO Director of Athletics and former beloved DCHS Boys' Basketball Coach, was called home by God. Joe began his coaching career in 1974 at Catholic Central High School and continued his career at Riverview Gabriel Richard (1977), Redford St. Agatha (1979-1984), Detroit Benedictine (1984-1987), before coming to Divine Child in 1987. He has won over 300 games, 15 district titles and 3 regional titles. During his time at Divine Child, he led the boys to Regional Championships in 1991 and 1992, and District Championships in 1987, 1991, 1992 and 1995. He was inducted into the Catholic High School League Hall of Fame in 1997 and named Detroit News Coach of the Year in 1992, both honors received during his time at DC.

Charnley has served as the director of Catholic Youth Organization athletics since 1999 and has introduced the sports of cross country, bowling and lacrosse. He is a 1972 graduate of Shaw College and a 1968 graduate of Detroit St. Gregory High School, where he earned All Catholic Basketball, All State Basketball and All Catholic Baseball honors. Joe is survived by his wife Kathy, their two children Joe and Jen, and his grandchildren Madeline, Kassidy, Ryan and Isabella.



When the global pandemic flipped our world upside down, countless essential workers bravely stepped up to support, save and protect our families, friends and communities. These are the accounts of seven Falcons from the frontline.

ALEXI (ANDRUS) KONEIG '03

Registerd Nurse

Ascension St. John Hospital | Detroit, MI

I am a fairly new nurse. My unit is ortho/neuro surgery. Most patients we encounter come to recover from elective surgery. Before COVID-19 hit I had witnessed, or been involved in two codes total. I can no longer give a number as I've lost count as to how many I've experienced over the last 8 weeks. I do realize COVID-19 did not hit every city or state the same. I also know Detroit was one of the hardest hit; not just by statistics, but because I experienced and witnessed it.

I was a person who doubted all the COVID-19 hysteria and blamed the media for causing much of it; I still do to an extent. I rolled my eyes, told family and friends to continue washing their hands, and just encouraged everyone to be cautious. I had no idea what was ahead of us.

It was the third week of March, and it was finally "hitting home". My unit started being assigned "PUI" (person under investigation) COVID-19 patients. Even through my skepticism I remember thinking, "I'll be grateful if I can avoid having those patients under my assignment." Nothing could have prepared me for what was about

to transpire. I watched as my newer, 33 bed, private room unit became unrecognizable within days.

The CDC regulations were changing constantly and the result of new expectations was unsettling to say the least. I found myself looking at our "seasoned" nurses, the ones with 20+ years of experience and whose auras were always reassuring, and they were scared. Seeing their fear, in turn, made me terrified.

It was hard to keep up with the rapidly changing regulations. One day we were scolded for wearing surgical masks in the hallways outside of patients' rooms and hours later we would be told everyone needs to have a mask on. We watched patients go from talking perfectly fine on room air to needing to be intubated within 12 minutes. We quickly learned that COVID-19 does not discriminate against age, race or comorbidities. New protocols were constantly being presented and needed to be implemented immediately.

On top of our patient care taking a 180 degree turn, we didn't know (or trust) whether or not our well-being was being protected. We are a unit that is never strict with visiting hours. At any given moment, you could have seen one of us either hugging our patient or their

family members. Our new norm was to call the rooms of our patients to talk to them before going in. We had to cluster our care more than any of us would ever want. We looked to one another to help ensure that we were properly protected before going into rooms. We'd go through the checklist: Is our bare skin covered? Are we double gloved? Is our aown tied? Is my hair sticking out? Are we doing everything properly before we go into this patient's room? We were reassuring each other that the above precautions were keeping us safe, but none of us actually knew if we were. That was a fact we tried to put out of our

Throughout those 8 weeks, my co-workers and I witnessed the unspeakable. We picked one another up, literally and figuratively. The perseverance I witnessed amongst my co-workers was my lifeline through this. We also experienced more support than we ever knew existed. We are forever grateful. Today, we don't really talk about what we went through. I'm not sure any of us have truly dealt with the trauma or the toll it's taken on us yet. The fear of another surge is always lingering. We will continue to pray for our co-workers, family, friends and community.

RISING ABOVE THE PANDEMIC ALUMNI FEATURE

One can only imagine my emotion when I was asked to cover a COVID-19 floor at Ascension Providence Southfield Hospital on April 1st. The anxiety was palpable. I don't recall aettina much sleep that night as I feverishly researched the disease and panned through old "on call" resources to prepare for what was to become one of the most challenging, downhearted and gratifying moments of my 20-year career in medicine.

I am a family medicine and sports medicine physician, and as a result haven't done inpatient medicine since my residency days 20 years ago. I didn't know the hospital documenting/charting system very well or how to place orders in the system, but soon realized, after some tutorials by the family medicine residents, it was like "riding a bike."

Providence Hospital in Southfield was basically a "ground zero" hospital and was hit very hard by COVID-19. We were at maximum capacity and as soon as you discharged a patient there was another one coming up from the ER. Fortunately, we had enough resources and personal protection equipment, but most days we were asked to conserve supplies by using only one mask, face shield or gown when seeing patients.

The nurses were really the true heroes. It was awe-inspiring witnessing the care they provided without any fear. Rounding on patients was very nontraditional. We would actually call patients on their phone and interview them from outside their room (ask them how they were feeling, changes in symptoms etc.) in order to minimize exposure. Then we would go inside the room and examine them. Unfortunately, many patients weren't coherent enough to do this protocol, so you had to resort to spending more time in the room.

One patient I will never forget, had mild dementia and was blind from years of alaucoma. He couldn't find the phone or even his food to eat or water to drink so I would spend extra time with him just making sure he was able to get his nutrition and stay hydrated. Long hours were spent on the phone with patients' families updating them



on their loved one's progress or many times, unfortunately, their decline. That was very emotionally draining for me having to watch a patient spend their last moments alone. We would try and FaceTime or call family members and hold the phone so they could at least provide some final words of comfort.

Egos were set aside for one common purpose. Everyone . . . did their part, without any hesitation.

At the opposite end of the spectrum were the patients who seemingly had little chance, but were able to recover and return to their homes and loved ones, knowing that you had a little something to do with it. I ultimately covered nine shifts (7AM-7PM) during the month of April, typically 3 days on, 3 days off. I have never been a member of a team that functioned in such unison. The cooperation between the primary care doctors and the specialists was especially

Egos were set aside for one common purpose. Everyone, including, but not limited to, the nurses, respiratory therapists, physical therapists, occupational therapists, social workers, pastoral care, doctors, residents, and custodial staff all did their part, without

any hesitation. Even the community support was amazing. The flood of lunches and dinners from the community shed a different meaning to COVID-19! Again, it was an experience that encompassed a range of emotions and one I will never forget.

Nurse Practitioner MSN, ANP-BC ACHPN Optalis Health Care | Southfield, MI

Optalis Health Care has nine skilled nursing facilities and three assisted living facilities. When COVID-19 arrived, our worlds stopped all normal function. Our patients suffered without family contact. Staff suffered with fear of the illness and learning to work with PPE equipment on. Our workforce suffered as many would not come to work out of fear for themselves or family members. About 10-15% of our workforce was affected directly by the virus at some

We had two of our facilities designated as regional hubs, but seven of our facilities had COVID-19 units. In the beginning we battled, begged, and bartered for PPE equipment (masks, gowns, gloves, & hand sanitizer). Now supplies are adequate. We had daily changes to regulations and guidance trying to keep up knowing frequent visits from surveyors were coming. Work stress was high. Our owners were supportive and really showed it to the staff.

Katie, my 18-year-old daughter just finished her first year of college and is pursuing Nursing. She signed up for the COVID-19 unit at one of the regional hubs having no idea what to expect from this new world of health care. We moved out of the house knowing we would be in constant contact with the virus. The units themselves were exhausting, but not scary. We are often asked what people look like? They look like your mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers, grandparents and friends. They could change condition in a few minutes time, so when working on the unit, focus was needed. There were sweet moments and patients so thankful for the personal connection. So many lives have been affected in so many ways. We are happy to say we had less that 5% of staff on any of our COVID-19 units contract the virus. Our protective measures work.



My time with my daughter was greater than either of us anticipated. College years seem to bring the natural push away, but the intensity of the days and her learning firsthand what I did at work was special and seemed to bring a new closeness. To see her fearlessly care for the patients and offer a We have given COVID-19 proper attention raking in the marriage proposals from those over 80, but has managed to resist and stay grounded.

Back at home was more difficult. We did not see my husband Blair and my other two kids, Kayla and Noah, for two months. At Ascension St. Vincent Indiana North Region, the COVID-19 pandemic changed healthcare forever. It shook the foundation of everything we do and, in some ways, we will never return to old habits. It forced us to find new ways to deliver excellent care to those most vulnerable. COVID-19 made us reassess how we do everything at every point in the care continuum, literally. We postponed a large segment of our operations, and limited entrances to our hospitals to focused entry points. We implemented visitor restrictions and used video conferencing so patients and loved ones could see each other. Telemedicine grew from a rare encounter to over 3,000 visits daily. We scaled our physician capacity by several-fold with new and innovative approaches.

We created protocols and procedures at an incredible pace based on rapidly developing information. Multidisciplinary teams across all of Ascension were quickly formed across the system to take in information, evaluate options and develop solutions. Our ability to pivot based on new information coming in from around the country and locally was unprecedented.

We no longer saw obstacles, rather we created solutions to seemingly insurmountable barriers.

Every day the delivery of healthcare improved. COVID-19 provided us the opportunity to innovate, to see new pathways. We no longer saw obstacles, rather we created solutions to seemingly insurmountable barriers.

I believe the underpinning to this success and growth lies in our President and CEO, Joe Impicciche, who at the outset declared our priority was to take care of patients and to take care of our associates, including a pay continuation for all associates.

I have never been more proud to be part of an organization so committed to the loving ministry of Jesus as healer with special attention to those who are poor and vulnerable.

On the morning of March 17, we were paged overhead to intubate a gentleman that we were informed had Coronavirus. He coughed a lot during the intubation and that was when we realized that we need to develop our own plan to protect ourselves during this viral outbreak and we realized we needed to prepare ourselves to be doing many, many more intubations with COVID-19 patients. No one had any guidance for us at the hospital. We

scrounged up any protective equipment we could find (no one had enough to care for the volume of patients coming in!) and we developed a plan with the help of colleagues at different hospitals and from our professional organization.

It was a scary time at work. No one even looked at each other as we passed in the halls; we were scared of the patients, and we were scared of each other; we were terrified to take it home; and we didn't even know if we were protecting ourselves enough to not get it!

We scrounged up any protective equipment we could find (no one had enough to care for the volume of patients coming in!) and we developed a plan with the help of colleagues at different hospitals.

Six or seven of my co-workers came down with the virus in those first few weeks; one of them was critically ill and hospitalized with it. Thank God he has since recovered.

My co-workers all came together to provide for our patients in need of intubations and for those patients with coronavirus that needed surgery. We changed our schedules, some volunteered to be laid off, and some of us worked in the ICUs helping place lines or position patients on their bellies to help them oxygenate better. And a lot of us cried together.

That being said, we all felt the prayers and there was so much appreciation from the community. It truly helped to feel appreciated at a time when none of us wanted to go to work. It was hard hearing about how little there was to do because everyone had to stay home, yet we were going to the "front line" as it was called. It did feel like the front line - it felt like I was being called to duty when I didn't feel like I signed up for it! But at the end of the day, we were proud of ourselves for handling it so well. It isn't over;

Zoom is not an option for police officers responding to an assault in-progress. So, the COVID-19 pandemic has presented a unique and difficult problem for police departments across the nation. The need for a police response must now be weighed against the risk of officers contracting or spreading a deadly disease. When COVID-19 suddenly arrived in the Metro Detroit area, the Garden City Police Department, and all area law enforcement, were forced to adapt quickly to an uncertain and pressing problem.

At GCPD we quickly obtained appropriate personal protection equipment (PPE) for officers. We developed protocols for when officers needed to wear PPE. We developed COVID-19 screening and testing procedures. We adjusted the officer's schedules and moved workspaces to separate officers from each other. Our goal was that if we had an outbreak at GCPD we could minimize the spread and still have enough officers to step in to replace those that were infected. We also developed protocols for responding to calls for service that balanced the importance of an in-person police response

with the risk of infection or spread.

Calls for service involving in-progress crimes or the collection of perishable evidence continued to be performed in-person by officers wearing PPE. For other calls for service, we began taking reports over the phone, online, and even from the outside of a home through an open window. We reduced arrests and traffic stops, only making those that outweighed the risk of exposure to officers and the arrested person. Essentially, the COVID-19 Pandemic has been an exercise in finding ways to continue to deliver essential police services with less in-person contact.

It was not easy, but I think we have learned some valuable lessons and are much better prepared for any future outbreaks.

It was not easy, but I think we have learned some valuable lessons and are much better prepared for any future outbreaks. If I have learned anything, it's that the dedication of first responders, health care workers, and all front-line workers is amazing. So many of these workers, with no complaint, risked their health and the health of their families, to protect, care for, feed, and help maintain our communities. That should not be forgotten when things return to normal, whatever the new normal might be.
