The Big Picture With Fr. Bob



Dear Friends,

Last week Fr. Matt shared with us how he discovered, while watching a home video of his Baptism, that he was not validly Baptized. A recent Vatican document stated that if the proper words are not said at a Baptism by the person performing the Baptism, then it is not valid.

Upon reading this document, Archbishop Vigneron acted swiftly to have Fr. Matt Baptized, confirmed and receive Holy Communion and ordained to the Diaconate and shortly after, ordained to the Priesthood. We are all very grateful this moved swiftly.

Fr. Matt, assisted by Fr. Paul, Fr. David and myself, are working to remedy the marriages and convalidations which were witnessed by Fr. Matt during his three years at Divine Child.

Perhaps you went to Fr. Matt for Confession once or many times while he was here. This can be remedied by going to Confession and sharing with a priest any serious or mortal sins you may have confessed earlier. It is not necessary to repeat any venial sins that were previously said to Fr. Matt.

If you would like to make an appointment with one the priests here at Divine Child, just call the parish office at 313-277-3110. We would be glad to meet with you for a private confession.

You might be thinking, "How can I remember everything I confessed to Fr. Matt?" Do not be afraid. Remember, all of our venial sins are wiped away and forgiven when we attend Mass. The grace from a Mass has the power to remove all venial sins from our soul.

It is not unusual for someone going to Confession to remember something from their past and say to the priest, "Father, I am not sure if I ever confessed this before, so I am going to confess it now." If after your next Confession, a serious or mortal sin comes to mind, then plan to go to Confession again in the near future and confess that sin.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is intended to bring healing and freedom to our lives. God does not want us to be anxious or suffering from scrupulosity.

The next time you go to Confession, begin by sharing with the priest that you had previously gone to Fr. Matt for Confession. The priest at Divine Child will be happy to help walk you through your Confession. God has already given you the desire to be reconciled with Him and so I know it will be both prayerful and healing.

May we all be at peace and encounter Jesus in this beautiful Sacrament of Reconciliation.

From the PAULpit



Of all the passages in the Bible, a small line from St. Paul to the Thessalonians was very significant in my process of reverting back to the Catholic Church from Evangelical Protestantism. St. Paul exhorted them, "Therefore, brothers and

sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught, either by an oral statement or by a letter of ours."

I was baptized as a Catholic but later in high school I began attending an Evangelical youth ministry. I was taught to believe everything that there is to know about Christ, how to live, and what the Church is, all written down in one place, the Bible. Nothing outside of the Bible is to be held as true when it came to matters of faith and morals. But St. Paul tells the Christians in Thessalonica to believe and live by not only the commands of his letters but also by other instruction.

As Catholics we believe the Bible to be the written Word of God and as such it holds a very significant role in our faith and much of what we know can be found in it – but not everything. The Bible is silent or very quiet on many things that we hold dear as Catholics. For example, we believe in a Triune God and the Immaculate Conception of Mary even though the word Trinity is never mentioned nor is Mary's conception. The Bible also does not speak specifically about many ethical and moral questions that arise from today's advances in technology and medicine.

As Catholics we hold firm to Tradition and the Scripture. They go hand-in-hand and work together, as St. Paul says. Jesus brought together the apostles and established them as the first leaders of the Church. In turn, they handed on their authority to men that came after them and so on and so forth until today. These leaders we call bishops and the bishops form, with the pope, the magisterium (teaching body) of the Church. We look to the Church to discern and distinguish right from wrong, truth from falsehood regarding our life as Christians. Jesus has assured us that the Church will always be safeguarded by the Holy Spirit. We can trust that everything the Church proposes when it comes to our faith and morality, that she is 100% right on the money!

PHASE 1: A PLAN FOR Safely RETURNING TO MASS

Dear parishioners - It is with jay in our hearts that we share Divine Child resumed public Masses on Tuesday, May 19, 2020. In alignment with the liturgical directives issued by Archbishop Allen Vigneron, we are committed to providing a safe and clean environment for the faithful to worship our Lord. The health of our parishioners is of utmost importance to us and new procedures and protocols have been put in place to ensure this. Please review the information below regarding how Mass will work and the role we all play in keeping each other safe. Thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation as we work through our new "normal" together. **Note: Dispensation from the Sunday obligation to attend Mass is granted to all faithful through Sunday, Nov. 22, 2020.** Let us keep each other in our prayers. - Fr. Bob McCabe

SECTION 1: WHO SHOULD ATTEND MASS

According to the Archbishop's directives, parish churches are <u>not</u> to exceed **25% of their total capacity** at one time that's **375 parishioners** at Divine Child. This means we must count the number of attendees at each Mass, and we must turn attendees away when we reach capacity. We believe all people who desire to worship our Lord should have the ability to do so. *See Section 2 for how we are working to ensure all can worship.*

SIGN UP FOR TEXT ALERTS!

To receive real-time text messages regarding when the church reaches its maximum capacity and cancellations of outdoor Masses due to weather, simply text the keyword DivineChild to 84576. **INDOOR MASSES** We are returning to our normal weekday and weekend Mass schedule. All parishioners must enter the church through the front doors (Silvery Lane). Only 375 people will be admitted at once, and an attendant will be keeping count at the door. Attendees beyond that will be asked to proceed to the corresponding outdoor Mass at 10:15 AM or 12:45 PM, or to watch the weekend's streamed Mass.

OUTDOOR MASSES Weather permitting, we will be <u>adding</u> two outdoor Sunday Masses at 10:15 AM & 12:45 PM on the football field. Attendees may enter the football field through the gateway building, through the North-West gate from the elementary school lot, or through the South-East gate. Attendees will be seated on the field facing the home bleachers. <u>Those who attend the outdoor</u> Masses are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or a blanket. No seating will be provided. You may also consider bringing a hand-held umbrella for shade. Don't forget your sunscreent Face-coverings are not required at outdoor Masses as long as social distancing is maintained. * *Note: Outdoor Mass cancellations due to weather will be communicated to parishioners by 7AM via text, social media and email.*

LIVE STREAMED MASS For those unable to attend Mass in-person, the weekend live stream will continue, but is **moving to** Saturday's 4:30 PM Mass. Watch the Mass in real-time or any time retroactively by visiting <u>Facebook.com/DivineChildParish/Live</u>.

SECTION 3: HOW MASS WILL WORK

FINDING A SEAT To ensure proper social distancing and sanitizing of pews, parishioners will be asked to adhere to a seating chart for each Mass. Pews will be marked with alternating color coded letters. Please sit in these colored/lettered pews for the following Mass times. Attendants will also be present to assist parishioners.

WEEKDAY MASSES:

6:30 AM - Orange/A pews only 8:30 AM - Yellow/B pews only

SATURDAY MASSES:

8:30 AM - Orange/A pews only 4:30 PM - Yellow/B pews only

SUNDAY MASSES:

8 AM - Orange/A pews only 10 AM - Yellow/B pews only 12:30 PM - Green/C pews

OUTDOOR MASSES:

Please sit on or near the ten yard lines in order to provide adequate social distancing. Orange cones will be placed along each ten yard line to mark the amount of space to the front and back of attendees. <u>Those who attend the outdoor</u> <u>Mass are encouraged to bring lawn</u> <u>chairs or a blanket</u>. No seating will be provided. You may also consider bringing a hand-held umbrella for shade. **OFFERTORY** There will not be a collection during Mass. Upon the conclusion of Mass, please place your offertory in the collection baskets located in front of the altar, in the gathering space or at any exit of the football field. Alternatively, donations can be made online through <u>FaithDirect.net</u>, or mailed to/dropped off at the rectory (1055 N. Silvery Lane, Dearborn, MI 48128).

COMMUNION A limited number of Eucharistic ministers will be on hand for each Mass to distribute communion to multiple pew banks/yard lines. Thank you in advance for your patience as we expect communion to take longer than usual. Communion procedures will be explained just before the reception of the Holy Eucharist. If you wish to receive the Eucharist, please adhere to the following guidelines:

- Attendees should maintain 6 feet of distance from other attendees while proceeding to the front of church/field.
- All attendees should remove masks and gloves as they approach the minister. No gloves may be worn when receiving the Eucharist in hand.
- Attendees should bow and reply "Amen" at a distance of 6 feet from the Eucharistic minister and then approach to receive the Eucharist.

For your safety, if a Eucharistic minister accidentally touches the hand or mouth of a parishioner, he or she will sanitize his or her hands instantly with rubbing alcohol at a sanitizing station located near each Eucharistic minister's station.

* If you are uncomfortable receiving the Eucharist at this time, please know that there is no obligation to receive the Eucharist whenever you come to Mass.

Dear Divine Child Parishioners,

On August 6, 2020, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued a response to questions regarding the validity of Baptisms in which the words used by the priest or deacon are different than those in the approved liturgical text. Specifically, in order to be valid, Baptisms must be performed using only the words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

Deacon Mark Springer, while ministering at St. Anastasia Parish in Troy, used incorrect words during Baptisms from 1986-1999, meaning that those Baptisms were not valid. One of those invalidly baptized by Deacon Springer was Father Matthew Hood when he was an infant. As a result of that invalid Baptism, Father Hood was not validly confirmed, nor was he validly ordained a priest in 2017. The proper steps have been taken to remedy his situation and by the grace of God he has now been validly baptized, confirmed, and ordained.

I know this news raises many concerns for our entire parish community, particularly those who sought sacraments from Fr. Matt, but I want you to know that Fr. Matt, the Archdiocese of Detroit, and the staff here at Divine Child are working to contact those impacted to address their situations while offering pastoral care. **Before going further, I want to assure you that all baptisms celebrated by Fr. Matt during his time at Divine Child are valid.** It is a teaching and Tradition of the Church that anyone can baptize – even someone who has not been baptized himself – provided it is done correctly. Fr. Matt baptized correctly while he was with us here at Divine Child.

For those parishioners who requested a Mass intention that was offered at a Mass celebrated by Fr. Matt, an additional Mass will be offered as soon as possible to fulfill those particular intentions.

The Archdiocese of Detroit has set up a special website, aod.org/sacramentsupdate, with a letter from Archbishop Vigneron to the faithful, a list of frequently asked questions, and a form to request a phone call from an archdiocesan priest for those who have additional concerns or questions. I encourage you to read the letter from Archbishop Vigneron and to review the frequently asked questions on the AOD website.

I would like to offer my sincere sympathy, both to those directly affected and to the entire parish, for the disruption caused by this error. We can, however, take some comfort in the fact that, while God bound Himself to the sacraments, He is not bound **by** the sacraments. This means that those who received any invalid sacrament, having approached our Lord with love and in good faith, received some measure of grace.

If you have additional questions or concerns that you wish to discuss, you are more than welcome to contact me, Fr. Paul Graney, or Fr. David Pellican.

While these are unfortunate circumstances, we are grateful that this came to Fr. Matt's attention early in his ministry, and that by God's Divine Providence we were able to remedy his situation so quickly. Let us continue to pray for one another and for all those affected.

"Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Earlier this month, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued an important doctrinal note alerting the Church throughout the world that baptisms were not valid in which a particular word or words were changed. Specifically, to say "We baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" does not convey the sacrament of baptism. Rather, ministers must allow Jesus to speak through them and say, "I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Holy Spirit."

In making this clarification, the Congregation pointed to the Second Vatican Council, which established that no one "even if he be a priest, may add, remove, or change anything in the liturgy on his own authority."

One of our priests in the Archdiocese of Detroit received this news with particular devastation. Father Matthew Hood, a graduate of Sacred Heart Major Seminary who sought ordination to the priesthood in June of 2017, had recently viewed a family video taken at the time of his Baptism as an infant and realized the celebrating deacon decided to change the proper words (formula) to Baptism, using "We baptize" as opposed to "I baptize."

Father Hood immediately contacted the Archdiocese and the proper steps were taken to remedy his situation. He was recently validly baptized. Furthermore, since other sacraments cannot be validly received in the soul without valid Baptism, Father Hood also was recently validly confirmed and validly ordained a transitional deacon and then a priest. Let us give thanks and praise to God for blessing us with Father Hood's ministry.

The difficulty of this news is also in its impact upon the rest of us. The deacon who first attempted to baptize Father Hood, Deacon Mark Springer, used this invalid formula while assigned at St. Anastasia Parish in Troy, during the period from 1986-1999. The parish and Archdiocese of Detroit will make efforts to contact those whom the deacon attempted to baptize, so that they may receive valid sacraments. The Archdiocese has made the deacon's identity known in an attempt to alert people whom we may not have a way to contact.

This news also impacts many who have interacted with Fr. Hood during these last three years, during which time his ability to celebrate valid sacraments has been greatly limited. More information is at http://aod.org/sacramentsupdate about the effect on each sacrament. The parishes where Fr. Hood has been assigned – Divine Child in Dearborn and St. Lawrence in Utica – will be working with the Archdiocese to contact those who sought out the sacraments with Fr. Hood, so that each individual's circumstance may be examined and rectified.

As is always the case with Christ, there is hope amid this darkness. The Church, following the thought of St. Thomas Aquinas, recognizes that God has bound Himself to the sacraments, but He is not bound by the sacraments. This means that while we can have certainty that God always works through the sacraments when they are properly conferred by the minister, God is not bound by the sacraments in that He can and does extend His grace in a sovereign way. We can be assured that all those who approached Father Hood, in good faith, to receive the sacraments did not walk away empty-handed. We know that Our Lord, in his unending love for us, supplied some measure of grace. God is drawn to hearts that are open to Him in love.

At the same time, the sacraments, when properly administered, are visible rites and efficacious channels through which the sanctifying grace of God flows to those who receive them with the proper disposition. Sanctifying grace is necessary for a soul to spend eternity in heaven, and valid sacramental baptism guarantees that this grace has been placed in the soul. Sin is a loss of sanctifying grace, but all the sacraments work according to their purpose to give and fortify sanctifying grace in the soul. This grace is a treasure of treasures and we must do everything we can to protect the integrity of the sacraments through which we receive it. It is the duty of the local Church to ensure that everyone entrusted into her care has the full benefit and certainty that come from the valid reception of the sacraments, which have been given to us to keep us as secure as possible on the path to heaven.

On behalf of our local Church, I am deeply sorry that this human error has resulted in disruption to the sacramental lives of some members of the faithful. I will take every step necessary to remedy the situation for everyone impacted. This commitment is, in part, why I write to you today, with the hope that you may assist me in identifying those in need of the sacraments. If you believe your own sacramental record may be tied to either Deacon Springer's or Fr. Hood's ministry, please visit aod.org/sacramentsupdate to contact the Archdiocese or call your parish for more information about how to proceed.

I ask that you join me in praying for Father Hood, Deacon Springer, members of the faithful directly impacted by this situation, and for the entire Catholic community of southeast Michigan. In the words of St. Paul to the Philippians: "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

If you receive an email appearing to come from Archbishop Vigneron, but is sent from a gmail address with the subject line "OUR LORD BLESSINGS BE WITH YOU," please ignore and delete it. While there is no request for money, the email is, in addition to being from an imposter, almost certainly a phishing attempt. Should you receive such an email, please do not reply, but delete it. **COVID-19 UPDATE** Dispensation from the Sunday obligation to attend Mass has been extended to all faithful through Sunday, November 22, 2020.

In light of the continued spread of the Coronavirus in southeast Michigan and the impossibility for parishes to safely accommodate all Catholics for Mass on Sundays, Archbishop Vigneron has extended **the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on** Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation for all the faithful in the Archdiocese of Detroit, as well as for all travelers during their time within the territory of the Archdiocese of Detroit, until Monday, November 23, 2020.

While the dispensation from the grave obligation to attend Sunday Mass is in effect, all baptized Catholics are reminded of the grave necessity they have to keep holy the Lord's Day.

Archbishop Vigneron wrote a pastoral note entitled "The Day of the Lord" little more than one year ago calling to mind this important spiritual obligation. As the day of the Resurrection of our Lord, Christians from the earliest days set Sunday apart as a day unlike others. When it is not possible to participate in person in the Sacrifice of the Mass, it is vitally important for every member of the Catholic Church to nourish his or her soul during these days. This means cultivating a prayer life in their homes, reading Sacred Scripture – especially the prescribed readings for the Sunday Mass - and making Christ the center of one's home and being his disciple the central identity of one's life. It also means continuing to understand Sunday as a day set apart for the Lord. This means activities on Sunday should be different from the pursuits of the rest of the week. Prayer and time for God, time for family, and works of charity should be central to a Catholic's Sunday.

<u>RECIPE OF THE WEEK:</u> Cherry Chocolate Chip Ice Cream

Legend has it that while St. Gregory was celebrating St Mark's feast day (April 25), he had a craving for cherries. Unfortunately, none of the cherry trees in his area were bearing fruit. The servants and gardeners were at a loss. As the legend goes, one gardener was wandering the gardens and was visited by St Mark. The Saint heard

1 ½ cups heavy cream
¼ teaspoon salt
½ cup white sugar
1 vanilla bean, split and pods removed
½ teaspoon vanilla extract
3 egg yolks
¼ cup Bing cherries, pitted and chopped fine
4 ounces chocolate chips

In a medium saucepan over medium heat, combine cream salt, sugar, and vanilla bean and pods. Cook until sugar is dissolved and bubbles form at the edge of the pan. In a small bowl, whisk the egg yolks and add about a ladle full of hot cream to the yolks. Stir to combine and temper the eggs. Add the eggs to the milk mixture and cook for about 5 minutes or until the mixture thickens enough to coat the back of a wooden spoon and a finger swiped through coating should leave a clean line. Strain into an airtight container and add the vanilla extract. Chill overnight.

The next day, churn ice cream according to manufactures instruction. In the last few minutes of churning, add cherries and chocolate chips. Freeze for at least 3 hours before serving.

Meet Our Extended Family:

St. Gregory the Great (Feast Day September 3) 540 – MARCH 12, 604

Gregory was the prefect of Rome before he was 30. After five years in office, he resigned, founded six monasteries on his Sicilian estate, and became a Benedictine monk in his own home at Rome. He was ordained a priest and then went on to serve six years in the East as a papal representative in Constantinople. At the age of 50, he was elected pope by the clergy and people of Rome. During his papacy, he greatly surpassed the emperors in improving the welfare of the people of Rome. Gregory was direct and firm. He removed unworthy priests from office, forbade taking money for many services, and emptied the papal treasury to ransom prisoners of the Lombards and care for persecuted Jews and the victims of plague and famine. He was very concerned about the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his own monastery. He is known for his reform of the liturgy and for strengthening respect for doctrine. The mainstream form of Western chant, standardized in the late 9th century, was attributed to Pope Gregory I and so took the name of Gregorian chant.
